LIONS ROUNDUP MARCH 7th

Post Office and School Broken Into Wednesday

On Wednesday night of last week burglars entered both the Post Office and the High School, making off with an undetermined amount of money.

At the postoffice entrance was gained through the back door, and the burglary was discovered the next morning by Star Route carrier, T. J. Dunlap. He summoned the City Marshal, Dub Riney, and as they returned to the postoffice, the rural mail carrier, Roy Carpenter, arrived. Mr. Carpenter called the postmaster, Flora Martin, and Miss Martin notified the postal inspector, A. A. Slingerland of Lubbock.

Both the Postal Inspector and Deputy Sheriff E. W. Carter of Levelland investigated.

The safe door was literally torn apart, with the steel being rolled back as if you were opening a can. The entire contents were emptied on the floor, but nothing was taken except \$114.10.

It was only a short time after this it was learned the high school building was also broken into. Entrance here was in the same manner as at the postoffice. However, the damage on the interior

was much greater. The doors to the office and library were literally ripped from their hinges.

However, it is said in this instance that the safe was undamaged. It is not known how they gained entrance and the Plainsman has not learned the exact amount of money taken, but the allegation is made that it was more than \$400.00.

As this is written no arrest has been made, but the investigation is continuing.

To demonstrate the fact that it was professional and not an amateur job it is believed gloves were worn at the postoffice, and in the school building they carried rags about with them and wiped everything clean that they touched.

Austin, Jan. 25 - Men who receive orders from draft boards to report for armed forces service will no longer have their orders cancelled if they subsequently join reserve or national guard units.

This change in draft policy was announced Tuesday by Colonel Morris Schwartz, state Selective Service director.

A man will still be able to enlist in the regular active-duty forces under the same circumstances, Colonel Schwartz said, if a representative of the regular armed forces is prepared to enlist him on or before the date set for his induction.

The military survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor of December 7, 1941 are trying to perform a miracle by locating as many survivors as is possible in order to band together and form chapters in cities and states across the country as the "Pearl Harbor Survivors Association". 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
