## This Week In Austin

Legislators here in Austin are saying that one of the hardest floor battles of the session will come on the loan shark bill. And they don't see the big question as the interest rates to be set by law.

The big issue probably will be whether restrictions will be written to prohibit or restrict chain operation of the loan offices.

The State of Texas has a constitutional bar against chain or "branch" banking, which prohibits any group from operating more than one bank.

The pending bill on small loan firms puts licensing and supervision of leading agencies in the hands of the State Banking Department.

The Legislature has a free hand in setting up regulations and supervisory procedures, and in setting different interest rates for various types and size firms.

Groups of independent and local loan firms and the chain groups already have joined hands and the fight is expected to emerge in committee review of the enabling legislation to put the loan shark amendment into operation.

The proposed "uniform" plan calls for a maximum of 5 percent per month on the unpaid balances, on the smaller and more risky personal loans. The interest would scale down on larger loans and at some point fringe in the customary charges of commercial banks.

But proposed interest rates have not figured in preparations to fight out the other question: that of chain versus individual loan units.

# Heavy Snow Swamps South Plains Monday

An unannounced snow storm and near blizzard brought business and most traffic to a gringing halt Monday, Feb. 20th. One measurement made by L. A. Townsen, local Santa Fe agent, showed a depth of 12 inches, while another made by City Marshal Charles Russel showed 15 inches.

The bad weather started to form Saturday when tornadoes and high winds swept Oklahoma and the first sandstorm of the year plagued the South Plains. However, no one, not even the weather bureau, dreamed of such a snowstorm as visited the Plains on Monday. It has been dubbed a "sneak" storm—and it was.

Monday morning the storm swept in from New Mexico and at first it was a fine sleet. Shortly after this it was followed by snow—snow so thick that at times you could hardly see across the Ropes' 80-foot main street. The wind, never very cold, came in at no more than 25 miles an hour but it brought armful after armful of snow. By noon streets in Ropes were becoming impassable and cars stalling on level ground.

Rural roads were hazardous in a short time, many impassable. Taking in the situation, School Superintendent O. V. Fuller grounded his buses and pressed into service cars and pickups with chains. But, even this was not sufficient to get the children home. Students from the Lovington and Arnett communities were stranded in Ropes. Some forty students remained overnight and were not delivered to their homes until Tuesday afternoon after Commissioner Myrl Brock sent out maintainers to clear away the snow.

Stores in Ropes closed by six o'clock and many cars left on the street because they could not be moved and others stalled, being pushed and pulled, and some shoveling the snow.

At no time in the history of the South Plains has so much snow fallen in so short a time. The heavy snowfall was confined to a spot about 200 miles long and a hundred miles wide. It did not reach into the Panhandle and did not go too far to

the east or west, but where it did fall there was plenty of it. At Levelland 20 inches fell, and the compress building caved in. In Lubbock the Hub Furniture building was wrecked by snow on the roof, while numerous service stations and other buildings suffered damage.

Schools over the entire area were closed, and buses lost at Morton, Anton, Shallowater and Wolforth, and perhaps other points. But they were found and the children taken to safety. At Wolforth more than fifty were fed and sheltered, as two cross-country buses were forced to stop.

Mansfield Thomas, Joe Harris and others spent the afternoon and Tuesday pulling cars out of the snow.

Cut at Bill Foster's store, Bill told the Plainsman that J. C. Chitwood measured 17 inches of snow on the level. At the Tom Price place Tom told us, "We had between 16 and 17 inches.

Bill Fostes also told us, "The dirt roads are impassable for cars. Only pickups with chains can make it." Mrs. R. M. Mayfield said, "We're snowed in—I have never seen so much snow fall in so short a time."

B. J. Thomas, truck driver for Chambers & Son, coming in from Houston, said he ran into the storm this side of Post and that cars were stranded all along the way—what traffic was moving was barely crawling.

On Tuesday the sky cleared and about half the snow melted and again, Wednesday, as this is written, Old Sol is warming up the ground and snow is disappearing.

It is estimated that not only was this a freak storm, but it was unusually wet, the moisture being estimated at better than two inches.

The storm was predicted by old timers who took as their guide an old tradition handed down by the Indians. It is said that following unusual warm weather that within a short time we would be visited by cold weather—snow and ice. We do not know if this works every time, but it did this year.

## Texas Dept. Of Public Safety

The Highway Patrol investigated 7 rural accidents in Hockley County during the month of January, according to Sergeant E. L. Stroud, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for no persons killed, 6 injured, and a property damage of \$3,150.00.

**Meeting Successful  
At Levelland**

Jehovah's Witnesses' 20-congregation meet at Levelland was concluded Sunday when the District Overseer, R. L. Anderson, spoke on the subject, "Is God Interested in the Affairs of Men?"

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Artificial Recharge**

Water artificially recharged during 1960 at the High Plains Research Foundation's recharge well amounted to 45% of the total amount pumped from the Foundation's three wells. The three wells, including the recharge well, produced 324 acre-feet of water while 145 acre-feet were placed underground. This means that only 55%, or 179 acre-feet, of water was actually consumed from the underground

formation. Of the 145 acre-feet recharged, 134 acre-feet came from rains in June, July, September and October. The remaining 11 acre-feet came from run-off of irrigated crops in the area. The 12 inches of rain during the first week of July placed approximately 110 acre-feet of water in the lake. But, due to evaporation, only 79.8 acre-feet were recharged.
