#### FARMERS MUST FILE REQUESTS BY SEPT. 26

Texas farmers have until September 26 to file requests with their County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committees for their maximum rates farms under the 1959 conservation reserve part of the soil bank program.

Then, after the maximum rates are determined, farmers have until October 17 to apply for conservation reserve contracts, Joe M. Favor, administrator of the soil bank program in the county ASC office, said.

Favor pointed out that there will be no acreage reserve program in 1959. He urged that farmers become familiar with the conservation reserve.

Fifteen meetings in Texas this week will train county ASC personnel to handle the 1959 program. As soon as these meetings are completed, the county offices will be ready to accept applications for establishing the maximum conservation reserve rates. These rates will average \$12 an acre in

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOIED OR AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #30-Number Three on the Ballot.

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:

"Section 65. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fiftieth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Section 28. Vacancies In Offices Of Judges Of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.
"Vacancies in the office of judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next Gen-

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched was a sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the flusty from the following:

"Sec.1 The foregoing Constitution all ballots shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby.

DIVERSIFIED FARMER AWARD SET IN TERRY

BROWNFIELD — Eight nominations for the title of the "Most Diversified Farmer in Terry County for 1958" have been officially accepted by the Terry County Soil Conservation District.

The award winner will be announced during the district's annual field day-tour scheduled for September 18. A total of \$500 in cash and an engraved plaque will be presented to the winner.

The diversified farmer award will replace the program which has honored farmers who have produced the first bale of cotton in the county in the past, dis-

trict officials said.

Anyone can nominate a

Terry County farmer for the award, officials emphasized. The Brownfield Chamber of Commerce will have charge of the project.

Chartered buses will take farmers, businessmen and oth ers on the annual field daytour. The buses will embark from the courthouse square here at 9 a.m. Thurs day, September 18.

A barbecue lunch will be served at Coleman Park here that day. Wives are being urged to accompany their husbands on the tour this year.

Nominees for the diversified farmer award will be judged on a point system. A panel of seven judges from the Terry County SCD and the Brownfield Chamber of Commerce will select the winner.

Leadership in the community, local, county and state farm activities will be valued at five points under the scoring system. Willingness to help other farmers in a program of diversification and conservation will also be rated at five points.

The long-time plan of diversification and conservation on the candidate's farm will be given a 70-point value. A 10-point value will be placed upon the economic operation of the farm enterprise.

Concluding the scoring system will be a 10-point value placed upon the general appearance of the farm stead, including neatness, lawn, trees, outbuildings, care of wildlife and others.

Nominees for the award include Joe Keesee, Herbert Hicks, Weldon Mason and B. R. Parrish, all of Meadow; Raymond Green, Rt. 4; Herman Wheatley, Rt. 3; Grady Davis, Rt. 5; and Sam Oliver, Seagraves.
