## OUR NEEDS

Our greatest need as men, women and children is to be able to expose ourselves—show what we really are—to one another. We need to know that someone will accept and love us despite the evil and the mistakes that go into making us what we are.

And yet, we fear to expose ourselves to one another. We are so afraid that someone will not like or not accept what they see that they will reject us, will cast us out, will condemn us, will ridicule us. Thus, we live in fear. We are afraid we will be laughed at, if we dare to be ourselves.

This is why many of us find it difficult to speak up in the classroom or in discussions of any sort. We are afraid that people will laugh at what we have to say. We dare not expose our thoughts for fear we will be ridiculed.

Since this fear is strongest as we are children, parents must take care not to laugh or ridicule their children's thinking or speech or actions. Loving reproval is necessary, perhaps, but not ridicule or rejection. Often a child who has been ridiculed or rejected for some of his thinking or actions will turn into a very obnoxious person. This is his way of saying, "Please accept me and love me no matter how bad I am." Or, the ridiculed child may become withdrawn. He may always be in the background—never daring to take the lead.

We need to be able to expose ourselves and yet we fear to do so. The Christian has an answer to this dilemma. The Christian lives on faith. He lives as if his exposure of himself will not be ridiculed.

He lives as if all men are God's children and since God is a good God, then those men God has created are good men. This is the faith of a Christian—to trust in God's creation.

Now, you may say, "I do not believe that God's creation is so good. I exposed myself to John Doe and he ridiculed me, he rejected me, he laughed at me."

My friends, that is the whole point of faith. Jesus of Nazareth went around preaching the goodness of God in the land of the living and he was rejected by men. In fact, he was crucified. And crucifixion is a more painful thing than being laughed at.

Faith is not proved like two plus two is proved to be four. I cannot prove that God's creation is good. I cannot prove that all men were created by a good God. I can only live as if this were true. This is what it means to live by faith. If I had to live by what I could prove, then I would believe that all men were liars, all men cheats, all men adulterers, all men alcoholics, all men cheaters. This is the kind of thing I deal with day by day. Although I see the badness of men, I have decided for Christ Jesus. This means that I have decided to try and live life by faith—faith that the goodness of God resides in the lives of men on earth in this moment and in the moment to come. It is only through this faith that I can dare to expose what is really me to my fellow man.

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## Ropes Schools Are Intergrated

In an election held Saturday of last week only a token vote was cast in the intergration election. There were sixty-eight who went to the poll, with fifteen of that number voting no, while the rest voted yes.

As pointed out by Supt. O. V. Fuller, we might have continued the Negro school this year without opposition, but it was only a question of time until we would be forced to intergrate. So it is better to do it voluntarily than to be forced to do it. There are fourteen Negro pupils in the district.

The school was declared intergrated at a meeting of the school board at its meeting on Monday night.

Also, at the Monday night meeting the budget was passed for the school year of

1964-65. In round figures \$334,777 was set aside for the operation of the schools. Last year \$757,138 was required, but this included the building program.

Mr. Fuller stated open house will be held for the new Junior High building on Friday, August 28, starting at 7:00 p.m. and continuing until 9:00 p.m. There will be no program, and while refreshments will be served, it will be a come and go affair.

Also at the meeting Monday night the bus drivers for the session were chosen: J. T. Allen, bus foreman; Robert Hall, Bob Whitlock, Dub Riney, Winfield Fry, Fred Sattler, white, W. O. Johnson and O. L. Harrison.

School will open on Monday morning, August 31.

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## George Named To Convention Post

The appointment of State Representative Jesse T. George as one of the "Young Citizens for Johnson Volunteers" for the Democratic National Convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey, was announced by Frank C. Erwin, Jr., Chairman of the Texas State Democratic Executive Committee. There will be 78 volunteers from Texas, 34 young women and 44 young men.

Erwin stated that "only outstanding, responsible young people between the ages of 18 and 35 have been selected."

George was one of two appointees from the 19th Congressional District named to participate in the Convention work. The announcement of Bill Mangold of Lockney was released last week. At the Convention, which will take place August 24-27, the volunteers will work at necessary service tasks such as sales, guides, drivers, hospitality aids, etc.

George, a graduate of Sul Ross State College, Alpine,

holds a Bachelor of Science degree in government and history, and is named to Who's Who In American Colleges and Universities. Valedictorian of Brownfield High School and High Ranking Graduate of Sul Ross, George served as Student Body President of Sul Ross and President of the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association.

Following college graduation George assumed a teaching position in the Midland Independent School District until March, whereupon he was granted a leave of absence to conduct his successful bid for State Representative from the 90th Congressional District. Presently he is employed as an administrative assistant at Texas Tech College.

Notified by phone of his appointment to the Convention, George stated, "I am truly honored to have the opportunity of witnessing this outstanding feature of American politics."

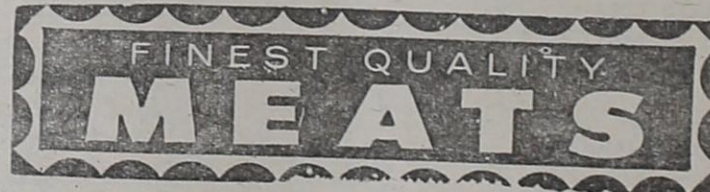

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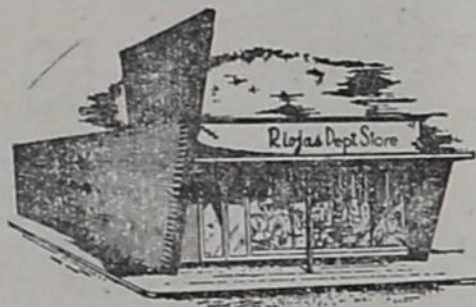
