On the Tuesday morning N-BC "Today" Show, I watched with dismay a heresy which must not be allowed to grow without protest. Too often we stand idly by while our cherished way of life filled with all its grand traditions slowly but surely erodes away from the inside. Till recently, in fact, until Tuesday morning, I was among the guilty and apathetic in letting the cin-spirators unleash their poison into the mainstream of our American way. Today, I have found the courage to stand up and be counted, to put my shoulder to the grindstone and my nose to the plow. I know not what course others may take; but as for me, I regret that I have only one column to give to this crusade!

Now before I unmask this shocking heresy for what it is and expose it to the light of our common sense and accepted ways of thinking about such things, I want to make one plea. Cut this column out and send it to ten of your friends who need to hear this message of truth. Prick their consciences with a little slip of newspaper. Even a tenth of this message is better than nothing.

Now right to the point of this thing: On TV this Tuesday morning, seen in millions of American homes, was a man demonstrating electrically driven automobiles! He called them the cars of the future. He actually bragged about the fact that they could be driven without the expense of petroleum products. He said they were cleaner and quieter and a lot of other frightening things. And what really woke me up was his final statement: "These cars can be built and put into operation right now!" Do you realize how far this conspiracy has been allowed to go already?

Now we all know that the old cars are the best cars! Our aim ought not to be to develop more modern cars; rather we ought to dedicate ourselves to rediscovering the traditional car, the car of our heritage. Henry Ford is our inspiration and example. Do you think for one minute that Ford would have any part in the heresies of these liberal innovators? He didn't waste money on air-conditioning and stereo radio and power features and a bunch of fancy colors. He built a car to do what a car is supposed to do: to transport people. Ford also knew the importance of the petroleum industry to our economy. That's why he built the internal combustion engine. If he had wanted us to drive electric cars, he would have made one. And what's more, he didn't waste taxpayers' money on all these safety features. Instead, he built slow cars. Every God-fearing man ought to say to himself several times each day: "A slow car is a safe car."

I must close with this personal testimony: I am hardly worthy to take up this cause since I drive a 1941 Packard. If I were any kind of a prophet at all, I'd sacrifice enough for the cause to buy a Model T. But doing the best I can with what I have, I'm resisting the future with all the courage and ingenuity I can muster. A final thought: An electric car is shocking. Question for further study: Would George Washington drive an electric car?
