Over the years, the Rural Electrification Administration, through 2 percent loans to electric ocoperatives, has done a good job in helping to bring electric service to the rural areas of the United States. However, the REA emphasis recently has changed to the financing of unnecessary generating and transmission facilities, practice which Congress has increasingly criticized and attempted to restrict.

Now, in a maneuver to get around Congressional restrictions, a Federal bank is proposed to provide supplemental financing for rural electric systems. 
