NUMBER OF EVENTS SLATED FOR EARLY SETTLERS

Plans have been completed for the second annual Hockley County Early Settlers Reunion, slated July 13 in Levelland.

Events ranging from a parade to a fiddler's contest to just plain visiting are scheduled for the celebration, designed to bring together early residents of the county for a day of reminiscing.

Officials of the reunion have declared anyone who lived in Hockley County prior to July 1, 1933, is an early settler.

Crede Rhea is president of the Early Settlers Assn.

A number of prizes are being offered early settlers in various categories. Merchandise certificates of \$25 will be awarded the oldest early settler attending the reunion. The early settler living the greatest distance from Levelland, the oldest early settler born in Hockley County and the earliest settler.

The most appropriately dressed.

Certificates for \$5 will be awarded for a number of distinctions, including oldest male and female graduates from the first class of each high school in Hockley County and the Whiteface School district, the early settler teachers who have taught the most years in county schools, and several other areas.

The schedule for the July 13 reunion includes opening of registration at 9 a. m., a parade at 10 a. m. fiddlers' contest at 11, closing of registration at 5 p. m. and presentation of prizes at 6 p. m.

A \$25 cash award will be presented to the best overall entry in the parade, while trophies or plaques will be awarded to the best riding group, best marching group, top auto entry, best implement entry, top float and most unique entry.

A \$100 prize will be awarded to the top fiddler in the open division and \$50 will be given to the best fiddler over 60.

Roy Rogers of Fort Cobb, Okla., will provide entertainment for the event. He is scheduled to arrive in Levelland a few days in advance.

During the week, city businesses will stage art and antique exhibits.

NEW POSTOFFICE TO BE BUILT SOON

Construction of the new post office at Ropesville, Texas, was further advanced yesterday with the announcement by Postmaster General J. Edward Day that a contract has been awarded to Mr. E. N. Exum, Route 1, Box 74, Ropesville, Texas, to build and lease the building to the Post Office Department.

Under the Department's Lease Construction Program Mr. Exum will construct a new building on the West side of Timmons Avenue and lease it to the Department for five years, with an option to renew the lease for an additional five years.

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, and the building will remain under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes. "This formula," Mr. Day said, "utilizes the resources and investment funds of private enterprise for needed postal buildings."

The new Post Office building at Ropesville will contain 1200 square feet and will have approximately 3100 square feet at its disposal for parking and maneuvering. It will be equipped with adequate refrigerated air conditioning and fluorescent lighting. The new building should be completed by October 1, 1963 and ready for occupancy by the Post Office Department, at which time the present post office quarters will be made available for other purposes.

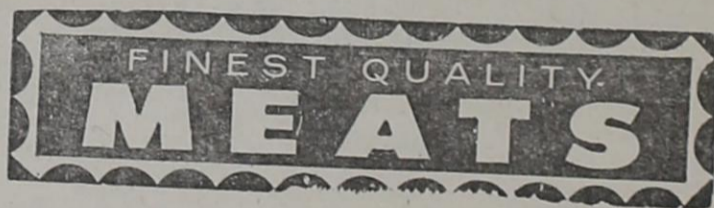

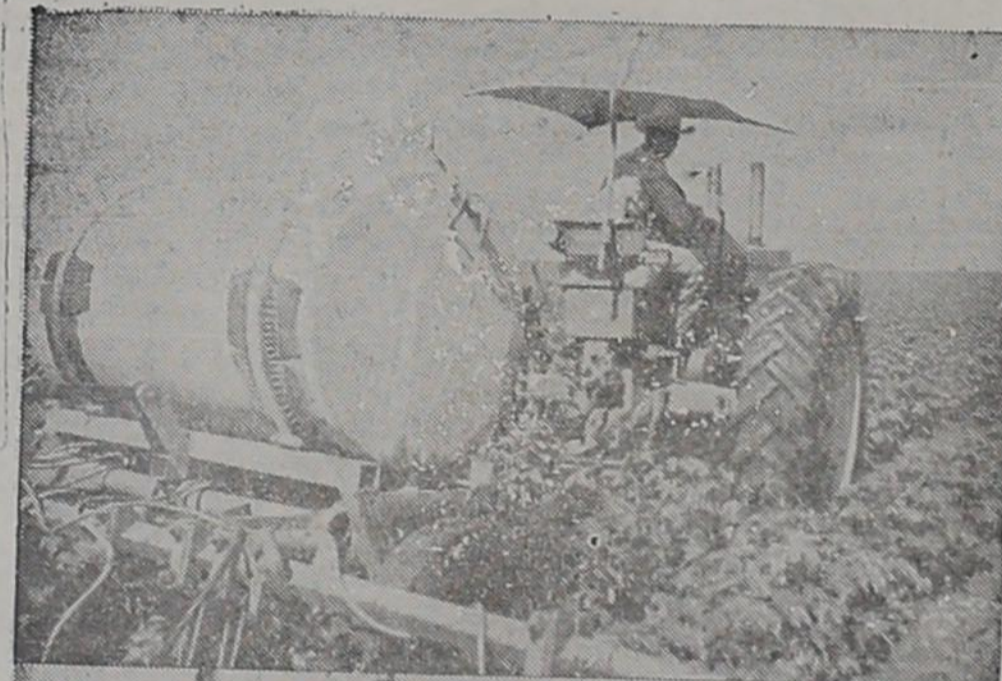

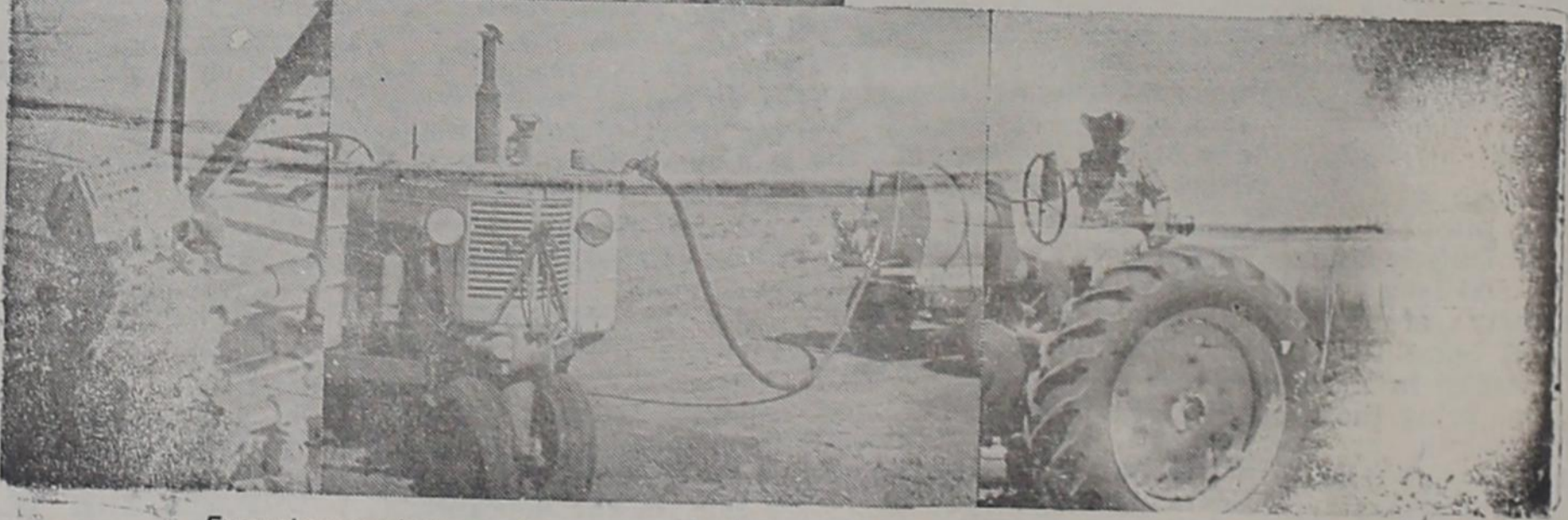
