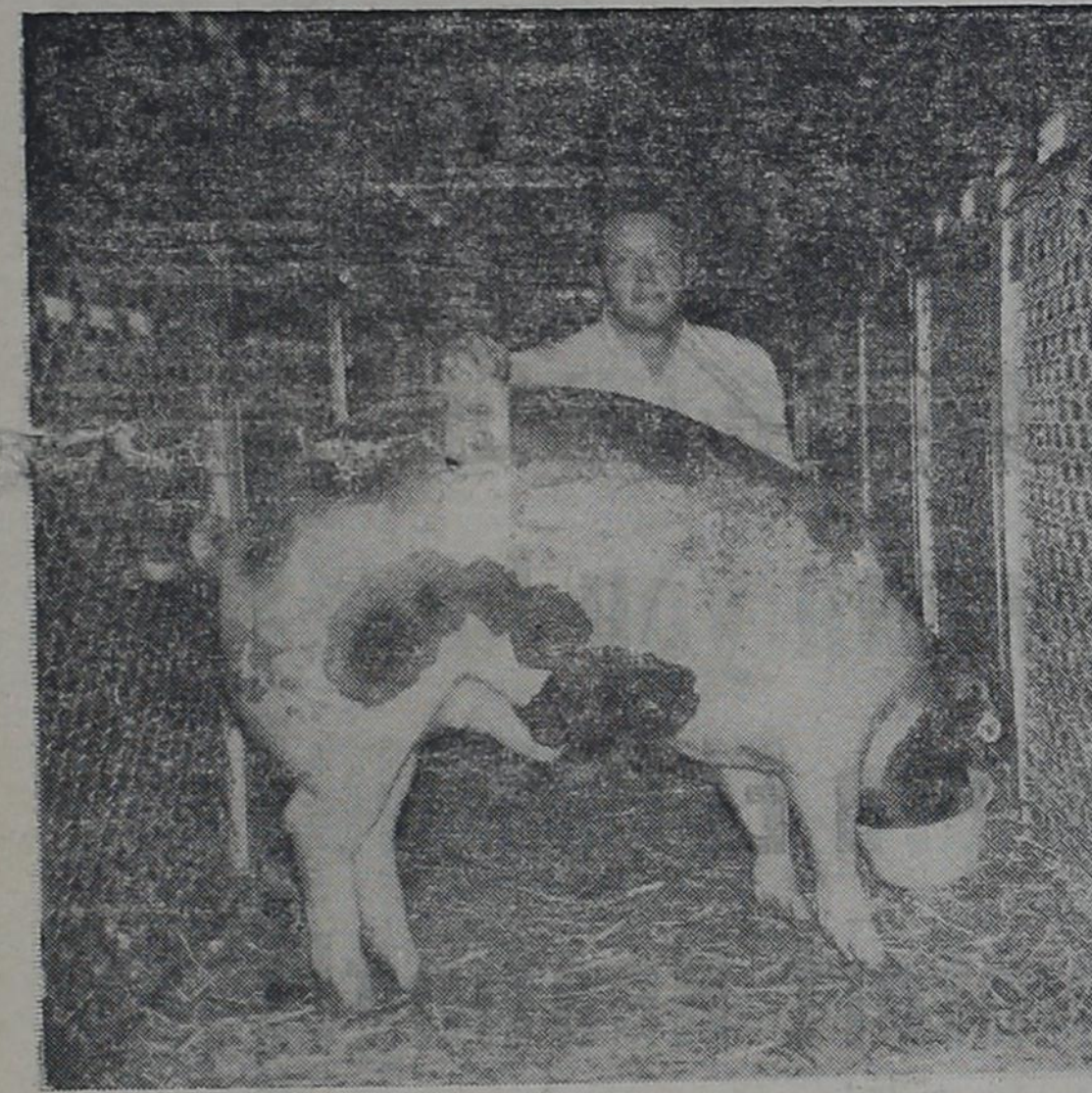

Charles Blair placed 9th with this medium weight Hampshire barrow. This is another home raised pig.



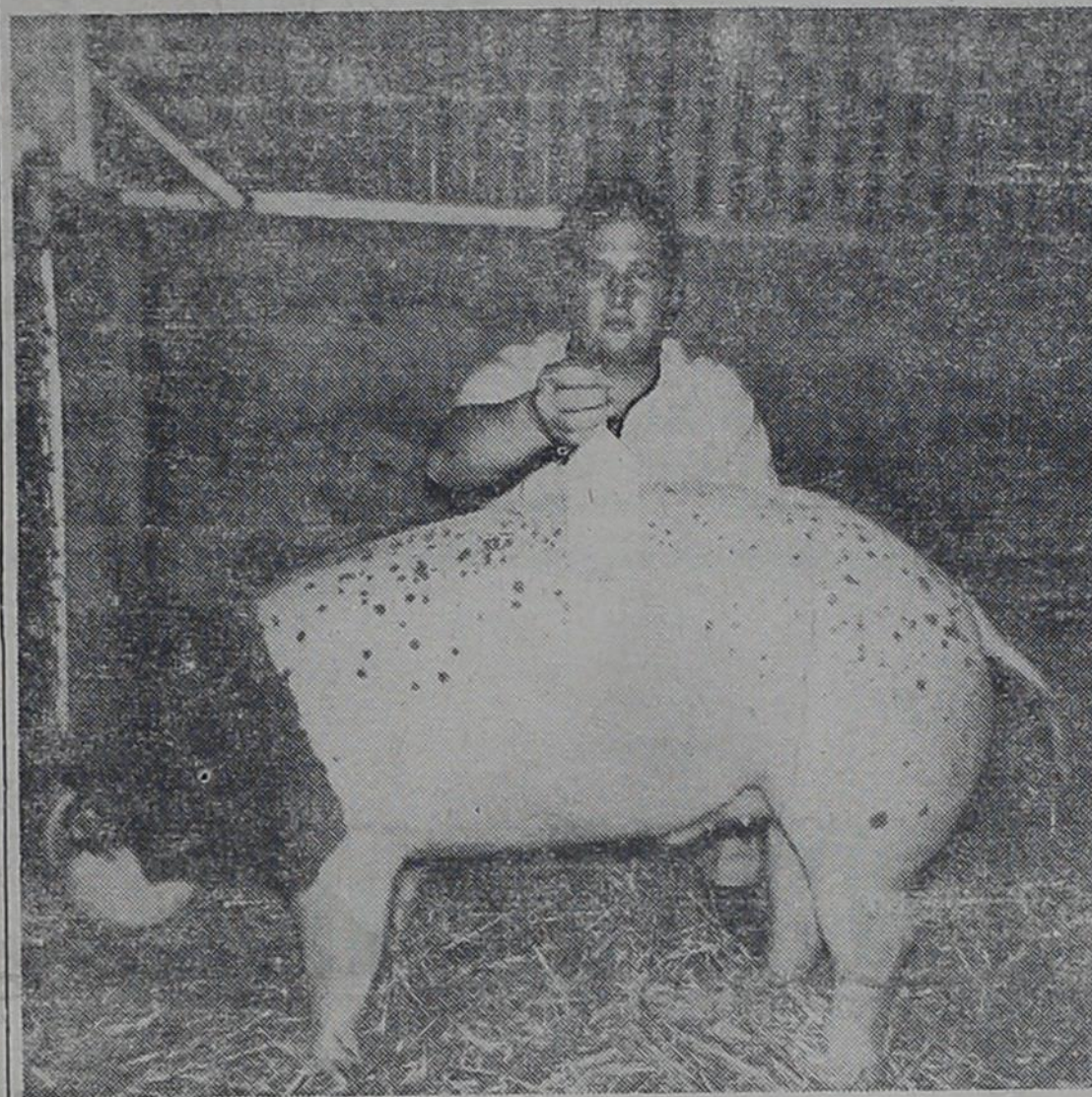
Bill McCormick placed third in the heavy weight Spotted Poland class with this barrow that he purchased from Parker Burford of Idalou.

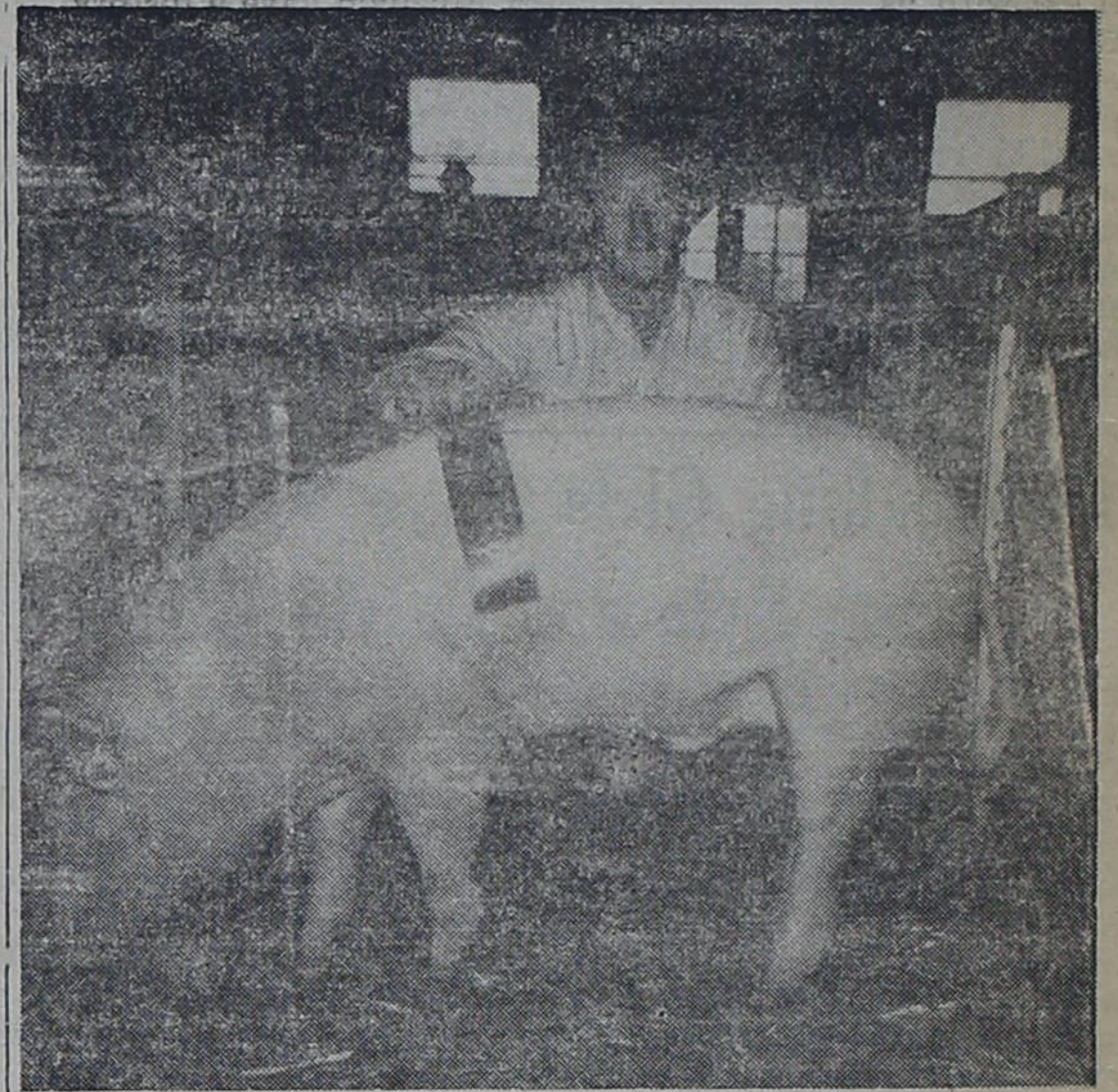
Larry Don Blair placed 10th with this medium weight Hampshire. The barrow was raised on the home farm.

Anyone who has ever played ball knows the importance of "follow-through." In baseball, it is especially important for a good pitcher to exercise the art of following through. When he lets the ball go, he must not stop his arm motion immediately or even worse jerk his arm back. Rather the pitcher must allow his arm motion to continue on in a smooth motion as the ball is thrown. In a like manner, a bowler must also concentrate on avoiding a jerky and inaccurate shot by practicing follow through in the direction of the pins. Follow through insures accuracy, smoothness of execution, and consistency in every type of ball game.

What is true for ball throwing is also true for the efforts and purposes of our lives. Most of us need to practice a little more follow through. How often we begin a project or seek to establish a new habit or routine only to discover that we do not have what it takes to follow through on our resolves. Daily we are all faced with new responsibilities, new commitments, new obligations. We are called upon to take leadership in a club or church or school. We accept with good intentions. Then come the difficult times of following through. Sometimes we simply bog down, lose enthu-

iasm, and stop our forward motion. Other times, we actually jerk back. "Why did I accept this job? I didn't have any business doing it in the first place. I don't even think I really wanted to." We mortals have a great talent for accepting futures responsibilities only to become irresponsible when future becomes present!

What do you suppose happens to some of the high-sounding political promises and party platforms after election day when the real time of testing and following through dawns? Where are all those church members who once stood before the congregations to commit themselves to church loyalty? What happened to those couples who once promised their faith and trust each to the other "until death us do part"? In your club, in your group of friends, in your service project, where are those people who told you last year that next year you could certainly count on them?

I suggest that they are still playing in the minor leagues of human relationships, throwing with a jerky, inaccurate, undependable motion. Hot one day, cold the next. Those of us who make the major leagues in our relationships, with our neighbors and with our community will be those

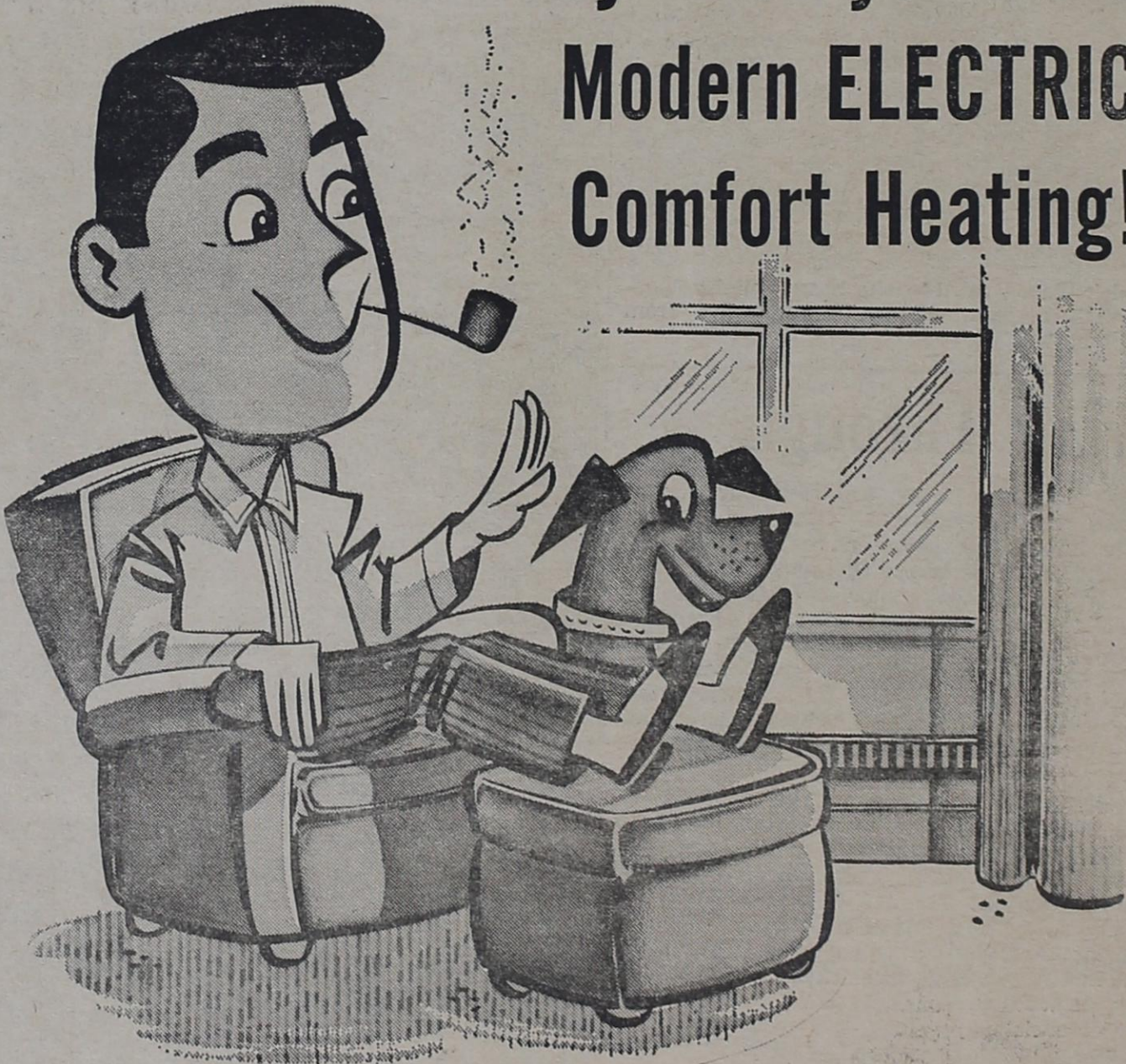

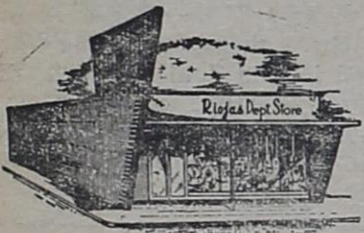

Lynda Darlene Snider, Community Action Inc. Young Homemakers Barry E. Hubbard Wed Met On Monday Night

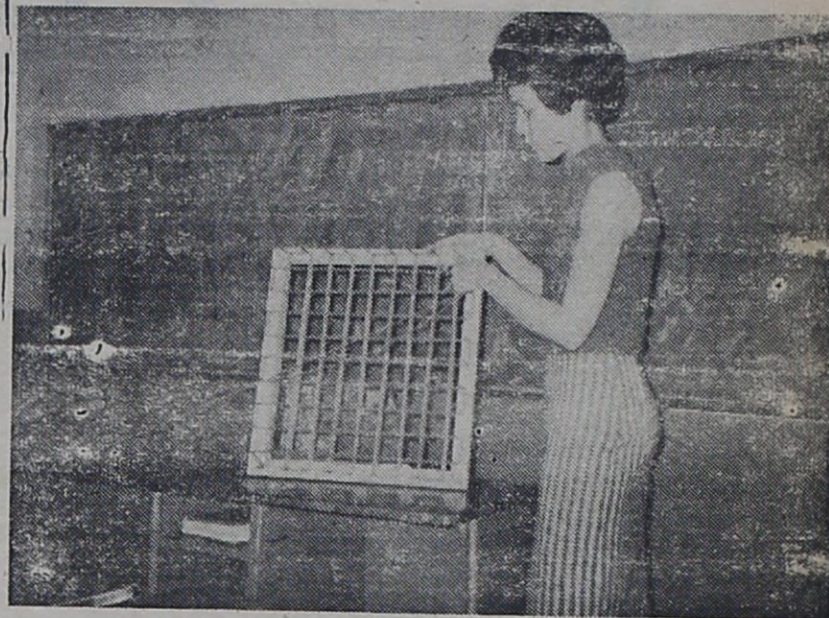


Monday evening at the Hockley County Community Action Committee, Inc. Board of Directors meeting, five representatives from Ropes were seated as official directors. At a public community meeting at the Community Building last Wednesday, February 8, Ralph Riojas, Homer Henderson, and Bob Sena were elected as representatives from Ropes to the county board of directors. O. V. Fuller and Alfred Ortega who were appointed earlier bring the number of Ropes representatives to five.

At the public meeting here, the 45 citizens present petitioned the county board to accept Ropesville as a target area for Community Action and as a location for a Community Action Center. The

three racial groups residing in our community were represented in attendance at the meeting: Latin, Anglo and Negro. Mr. Howard Maddera, Executive Director of Hockley County Community Action, presided over the meeting.

At the County Board Meeting, it was learned that a sum of \$2,500 may be immediately available for use in our community. Our five local representatives have the responsibility of submitting a budget in order to request these funds. Most of the money will most likely be used to establish a Community Action Center with a part time worker who can relate the poverty stricken in our community to the several self-help programs now available in our area.
