THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

 Every new situation in an election seems to give Texas politicians a new and drastic interpretation.

Take the special US Senate election for instance.

The story of the Pool Bill is a familiar one to all who are interested in Texas politics. It is referred to again only because it is part of the picture.

Until 1957 there was a wide open field in the scramble for the election to the US Senate, with high man—even by one vote, if that should be the result—winning the place.

The Pool Bill was finally passed, after the heat of the 1957 special election, for the purpose of drawing the line more clearly between Republicans and Democrats. This was recognized in providing for a runoff. The theory, of course, was that a strong Republican candidate against a scramble of Democrats, would have had the odds-on chance of topping the field. In a runoff the Democrats could marshal their combined strength.

Now, in 1961 Special US Senate race, some Texans are saying there are no binding party lines; that candidates did not run on a party platform; that it was an individual affair; and that no party loyalty is involved.

This can't be argued when you consider that the Pool Bill final passage by the Legislature was for no other reason than to cut the issue squarely on a Democratic Republican issue.

And that is what the runoff is between Democrat William A. Blakely and Republican John Tower.

It doesn't seem probable that the Democrat Legislature would be tempted to come around eventually to a further change in the election laws to provide for a Republican vs. Democrat ticket in the special Senate or congressman at-large elections. This would give the Republican candidate an automatic entry in the runoff, whereas under the present law the Democrats could assure a party victory in the first election.

FROM AUSTIN

The Capitol City this past week took on international aspects when Vice President Lyndon Johnson brought Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to town to address a joint session of the Texas Legislature. A cheering crowd of 35,000 Austinites turned out to honor the 85 year old leader of free Germany, who Johnson referred to as, "one of the authentic leaders of our time" The Chancellor was obviously pleased with his tremendous reception and Texans should be proud that their traditional hospitality helped to make Adenauer's trip to the U. S. a decided success.

Success, however, is not easily achieved, as the Legislature discovered Tuesday when it settled back to the tasks at hand. After the House, by a vote of 130-16, and the Senate, by a vote of 28-1, had passed the trailer bill (HB 59), Governor Price Daniel exercised his first veto of the session to prevent this measure from becoming law. This bill was of substantial interest to the people of District 98 as it would have increased the exemptions from registration now accorded farm trailers and semi-trailers from the present 4000 pound class to 12,000

pounds. It would have added to the exemption trailers owned by cotton gins and grain elevators, when supplied without charge to farmers to haul agricultural products from farms to processing centers, market or storage.

In returning the bill to the legislature the Governor said the measure as finally passed would cost the state highway fund and the road and bridge funds of various counties approximately \$2,705,000. Several amendments added to the exemption all braking requirements exempted from registration water-well drilling machinery and construction machinery; and reduced the present registration fee to \$5 per vehicle on trailers up to 10,000 pound transporting liquid fertilizers. He said, "The purpose of the bill as originally introduced was so greatly expanded by subsequent amendments that public safety and State and county revenues would be severely decreased if the bill should become enacted into law."

With only about 40 days remaining in the regular session, there is a general feeling of urgency among the members of both chambers of the legislature. This was emphasized yesterday when the House changed its rules in an effort to speed action on tax measures. The House voted to give the Speaker authority to lay out tax bills on a single day's notice, providing the bills have cleared committee and are otherwise ready for consideration. This alleviates the problem that most of the tax measures have a high number, which places them far down on the calendar. By changing the rules these bills can now be brought before the House for consideration at the earliest possible date.

Let me emphasize again that your letters of response to the current problems concerning our state are my principal aid and support and that they are always welcome and appreciated. Let me hear from you.

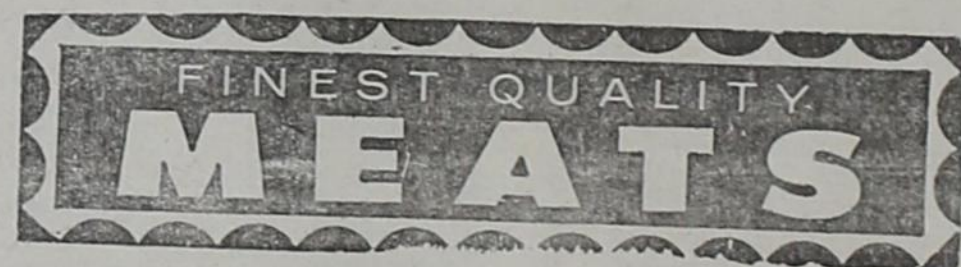

 PAG 485 and Funk's G-

711AA were the high yielding varieties in 1960, with 172 and 171 bushels per acre, respectively.

TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

A contract for 18.2 miles of construction on F. M. Roads 1294 and 168 in Hockley and Lubbock County has been awarded to a Fort Worth firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Ernest Loyd submitted the low bid of \$248,001 on the project. Grading, structures, bases and surfacing from U. S. 385 east to 4 miles west of Shallowater (FM 1294) and from FM 1294 south to S. H. 116 at Smyer (FM 168) is expected to take 160 work-

ing days, according to Oscar L. Crain, District Highway Engineer at Lubbock.

H. E. DeShazo, Resident Engineer at Lubbock, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

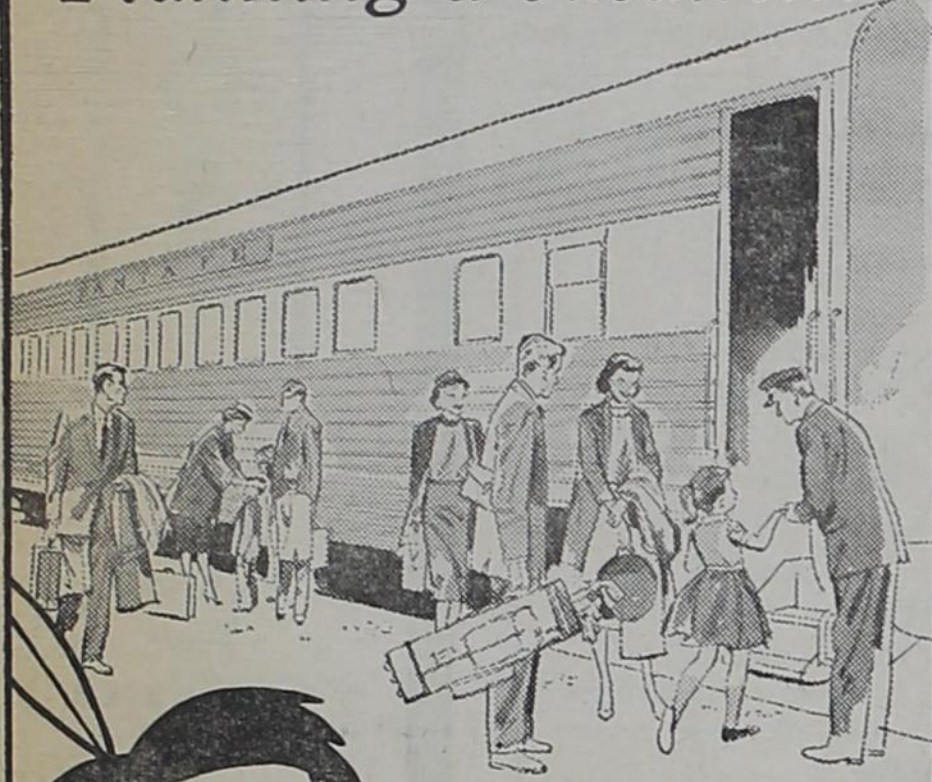

FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

qualify me for the program? Answer: 20 percent of the feed grain base acreage established for your farm.

Question: What is the maximum amount that can be diverted to payment?

Answer: This varies, based on the number of acres in the feed base, in three groups: (1) Not over 25 acres - it would be possible to receive payment on the entire acreage. (2) From 25 to 100 acres, the maximum would be 20 percent plus 20 acres. This provision of the law applies to these two groups. (3) From 100 acres up, the maximum is 40 percent.

Question: What crops are included in this program?

Answer: Only corn and grain sorghum.

Question: What farming practices are required on land diverted under this program?

Answer: It is required that a conservation practice such as summer fallow or planting of summer legumes be fol-

lowed. Crops that may be grown for harvest are: Safflower, Sesame, Sunflowers or Castor Beans. If these crops are grown, no payment will be made on diverted acreage. The farm will be eligible for price support.

Question: Will I be paid for carrying out a conservation practice?

Answer: Only under our regular conservation program. No special funds have been provided for this program.

Question: Will the land under an agreement in this program be measured?

Answer: Yes. It will be measured and positively identified on the ground and plotted on an aerial photograph.

Question: Can I graze a cover crop planted on this land?

Answer: No, with the exception of wheat seeded this fall for harvest in 1962. This may be grazed at any time.

Question: If a farmer has a feed grain base and does not agree to participate in the program, is a price support loan on grain sorghum available?

Answer: No. This also applies to any other small grain crop and corn grown on the farm.

Question: If a farm does not have a feed grain base, can grain sorghum be produced?

Answer: Yes. However, none of the grain from this farm, with the exception of wheat, if grown, would be eligible for a CCC loan.

Question: If I operate two farms and do not comply on one, would I be eligible for price support on the complying farm?

Answer: Yes, if you do not plant in excess of the base on the non-complying farm. If you exceed the base, you would be ineligible on both farms.

Question: What would be the eligibility of an operator who owns a farm and does not comply on his own farm?

Answer: He would be ineligible for any payment on his own farm. However, if

he did not plant in excess of his base acreage, both he and the owner of the other farm would be eligible.

Question: What would be the status of a landlord owning three farms, with three separate operators — one of whom who did not comply with the program?

Answer: Provided the farm not complying did not exceed his base, the owner would be eligible on the two complying farms, as well as the operators. If the non-complying operator exceeded his base, the owner would not be eligible for payment on any farm. The two operators on the complying farms would be eligible.

Question: Are there any provisions in the program to take care of the man who has never planted corn or grain sorghum?

Answer: No.

A COOPERATOR HAS THESE ADVANTAGES:

1. Price support will be available for his 1961 produc-

tion of corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats and rye.

2. The income from the acres diverted is assured regardless of drought, flood, insects, hail, or crop diseases.

3. For most producers of corn and grain sorghum, the payment on the diverted acreage will be greater than the net income on these acres.

4. Not to exceed one-half of the estimated payment will, at the cooperator's request, be made in advance, at the time of signing up or as soon as possible after that time.

THE NON-

COOPERATOR WILL:

1. Have no price support available for any of his 1961 feed grain production.

2. Not be assured of net income from any of his 1961 feed grain acreage.

3. Get only the market price, whatever that may be.

4. Get no part of his income from an advance payment this spring.

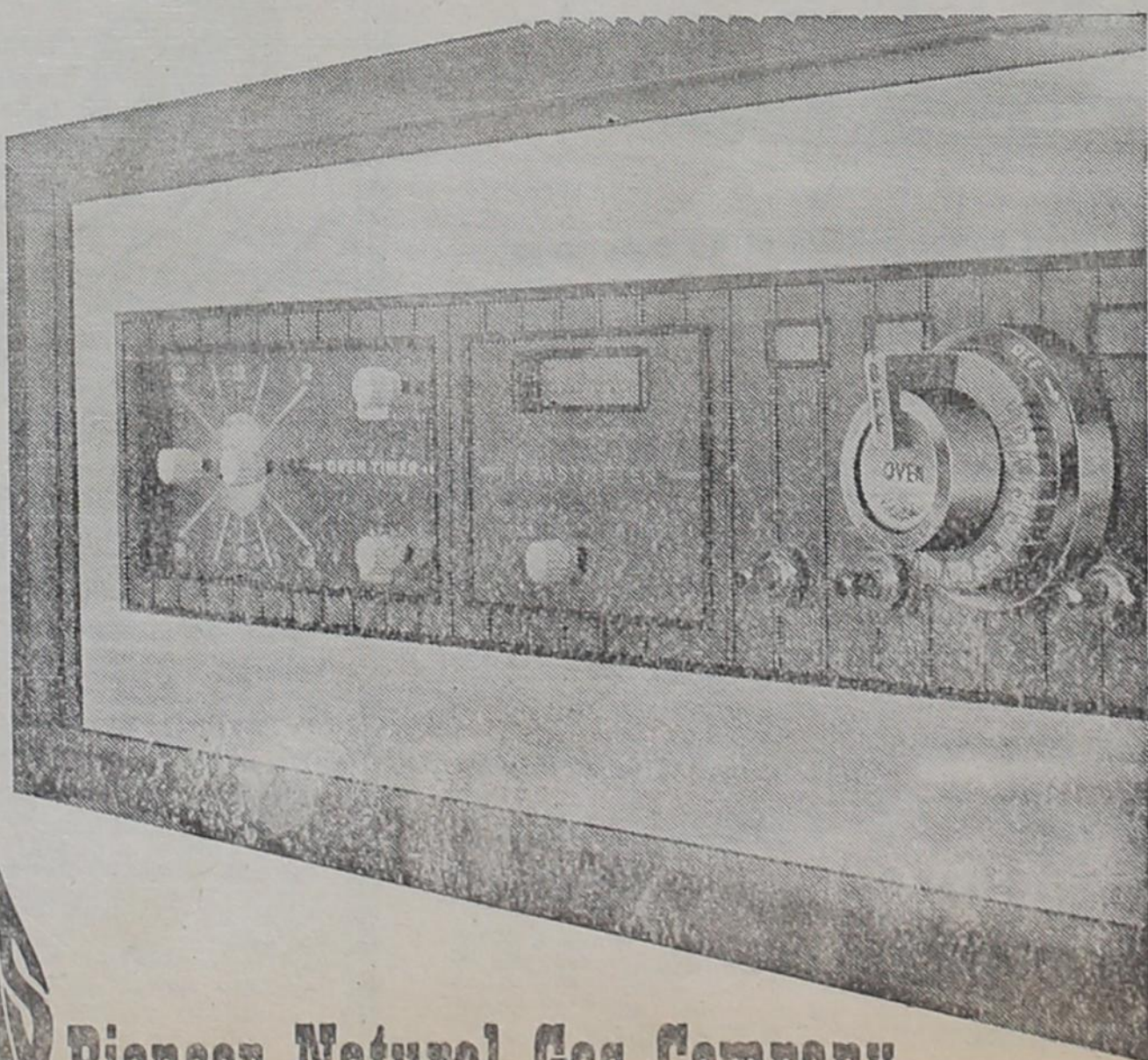
