Jack Stricklin Passes Away

We note with sorrow, and a feeling of loss, the passing of Jack Stricklin, Sr., of Brownfield, which sad event took place in a hospital in Snyder Friday afternoon of last week. Mr. and Mrs. Stricklin were visiting their daughter in that city when Jack was taken ill. He had passed his 81st birthday.

Since 1909, with the exception of the past few years, he was owner and editor of the Terry County Herald, which he sold to the Brownfield News in 1954. During those years he was instrumental in the building of the South Plains as well as Brownfield. When he first came to the South Plains it was, indeed, a pioneer country, and only one with a pioneer spirit could have survived.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the Crescent Hill Church of Christ in Brownfield, with Herman Johnson, minister of the Southside Church of Christ, officiating, assisted by John McCoy, of the Crescent Hill Church of Christ. Burial was in Brownfield Cemetery.

Mr. Stricklin was lovingly known throughout the South Plains as the "Old He". It was thus that he referred to himself in his editorial columns, and he was an editorial writer of the first water, never shirking a duty of telling the facts and commenting on them—in other words, he "hewed to the line and let the chips fall where they may".

Mr. Stricklin was not only respected in Brownfield and Terry County, but over the entire South Plains. His friends were as numerous as the folks who knew him. He came to Texas from Tennessee, and as we think back we don't think there would have been a Texas if it had not been for the men who came from that state.

During the time he was in the newspaper business in Brownfield we visited him often. He was a pleasant man to visit with; he was helpful and accommodating, and ever ready to aid those less fortunate than himself. He was dedicated to God and in as many ways as was humanly possible he walked in the path cut by the Lowly Nazarene; the One whose footprints appeared on the sands of Galilee, and whose doctrine, "love thy neighbor as thyself", revolutionized the world and brought civilization to the highest peak ever known. He was a man in every sense of the word; he was a faithful husband; he was a father whom his children respected and loved; he was a neighbor whom

neighbors respected; he was a citizen who gave his best to the community and the section in which he lived.

They broke the mold when he was made and there will never be another like him.

His had a long and useful life. He never stopped writing, his articles appearing in the Brownfield Shopper were read with interest up until the time of his death.

As we write this our memory of Jack Stricklin is very vivid. We can remember him sitting at his desk in a little cubby hole he had cut off in the front of his office—a man endowed with wisdom, and that wisdom flowed from his typewriter into his newspaper.

The last time we saw Jack was at New Deal. The front of a store had been torn off by a tornado, and while we were taking a picture we found Mr. and Mrs. Stricklin there. Even though he had retired, he was on the spot where the news was. If there is anything remotely resembling a newspaper office in heaven that is where you will find Jack.

So, as we wind up this final tribute to a man whom we considered our friend, we wish to extend our deepest sympathy to the bereaved family. There's been an irreparable loss yet, in death, we are told man gains and not loses—the grave is but the portal to life eternal—and in hours such as these, when human condolence means so little, the one solace is in the Bible, the very voice of God. So, we say farewell, Jack, for we know you are in a world better than ours.

RETURN HOME

Delegates from the Level-land Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses returned home this week following their three-day Bible meet in San Angelo, Texas, said Alfred Ferguson, presiding minister.

"Some 5,510 were in attendance at the Bible convention, which attracted delegates from a 12-state area," he said. "This was one of the largest conventions that San Angelo has seen."

"One of the highlights of the three days," Ferguson said, "was the public lecture 'Take Courage—God's Kingdom Is At Hand!', by W. R. Thomas, Watchtower Society representative."

"Thomas stressed the closeness of God's Kingdom as to earth's affairs," Ferguson said, "and he pointed out that God cannot wait for Christendom to convert the world first as WORLD ALMANAC figures show the world's population has, in a seven-year period, 1955-1962, increased 5.61 times as fast as the number of so-called Christians."

Ferguson added, "Thomas further stated that Christendom has been falling away from true Christianity herself, so could not be responsible to represent God. He also showed from the Bible the wonderful conditions God's Kingdom will bring to the earth—total peace, happiness and health."

Moisture brings prospect of big crop

At, perhaps, no other time in the history of the Ropes trade territory has the crop outlook been as bright as it is now. There has been plenty of moisture over the entire section, and, now the sun is shining, and crops are growing at a fast rate of speed.

Cotton is blooming and putting on squares, maize is heading, giving promise of one of the best crops that has been harvested in this section in several years. The big rains have also cut a portion of the expense of raising the crop in that irrigation wells are not now needed.

One farmer told us that he believed there was sufficient moisture, with just a few cotton showers, to finish the crop.

In parts of the territory between seven and eight inches of rain have fallen, and at no place, we understand, has there been less than three

inches. This rain came as a drought breaker. There was a strip of country, including the Ropes farming belt, that had received very little rain, the moisture going to north and south of us. Of course, in a way we were fortunate, at that, as this section missed several big hail storms

which destroyed crops in other places. Actually, here, up to this time, there has been but two clouds that showed turbulence, and they either passed to the north or south of us. During the time we were getting the rain there was one clud that developed a small tornado out

south east of town but it never hit the ground. But, there was plenty thunder and lightning and did the rain pour, making everyone very happy.

So, unless there is an unforeseen disaster, we can look forward to a bounteous harvest this fall.

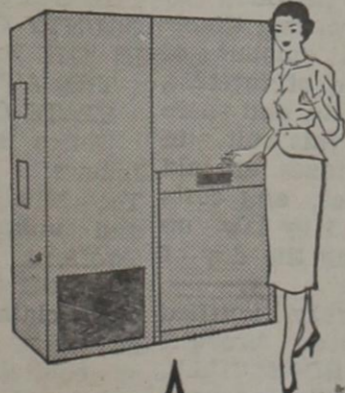
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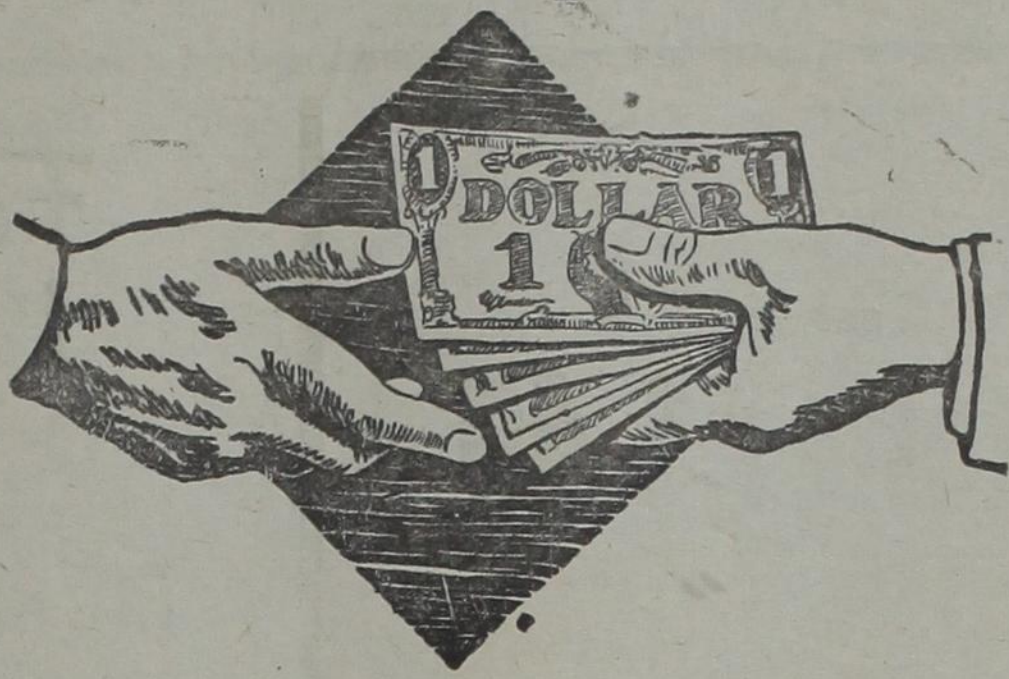
