

"My brother almost rode "And, when we saw them coming the doctor was beating his horse with one hand whiskey in the other. My father was set against whiskey, and I heard him say so much against it that I was determined not to tle from his hand, and it broke on the stone hearth of the fireplace."

As he remembers it, he recovered without much ill effect from the copperhead's bite. In later years he was again bitten by a copper-




