**U. S. TREASURY
DEPARTMENT NEWS**

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

If you haven't read your tax instructions that you received in the mail about January 1, now is a good time to start. There are more taxpayers that cost themselves by simply failing to take time to read the instructions than there ought to be. These folks simply don't take the deductions that they have coming to them. Most of us don't like to read, but being lazy when it comes to reading tax instructions costs more than we can afford. If you start now, April 15 will be a nice beautiful day.

PERSONAL EXEMPTIONS

Every taxpayer is entitled to use his own personal exemption of \$600 in filing his Federal income tax return for 1964, John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer in the Lubbock office of Internal Revenue reminded today.

Document No. 5013 which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

FILING REQUIREMENTS

A Federal income tax return must be filed by every citizen or resident of the United States, including minor children, who had gross income of \$600 or more in 1964, John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer of the Lubbock office of Internal Revenue Service, reminded recently.

A calendar year taxpayer who is 65 or over, is not required to file unless his gross income in 1964 was at least \$1200, Mr. Sloan said.

Document No. 5107 which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

The new 1965 edition of "Your Federal Income Tax" is on sale at Internal Revenue Service offices. Internal Revenue has added a chapter on community pro-

erty this year. Community property gives the Texas taxpayer many tax advantages. You can't hardly go wrong in spending .50 for this book because you may save yourself a lot of taxes.

GATHER YOUR RECORDS

Financial records are important in preparing your Federal income tax return, Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., for the Dallas District said today.

The filing season began January 1—now is the time to get these records together. Mr. Campbell said that cancelled checks, receipts, records of contributions, and other papers would all be helpful.

Taxpayers who keep good financial records during the year will find it easier to prepare their Federal income tax returns, Mr. Campbell explained. Complete records are especially important to taxpayers who itemize deductions.

Copies of prior years' returns are good guides in preparing the new return, Mr. Campbell reminded.

FORM W-2

Employers are required to furnish Form W-2, showing income and social security information, to all their employees on or before February 1, according to John Sloan, Administrative Officer of the Internal Revenue Service in Lubbock.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

Every year the good tax folk complain that thousands of taxpayers send in their tax return without getting all their W-2's. In past years, a few taxpayers have sent in a new form 1040 or 1040A every time they receive a new W-2 from one of their many employers. You can't file but one time. It's what you made on all your jobs for the whole year instead of each job. Besides—Internal Revenue fuses at you if you don't do it right.
