COMPLETES TRAINING
GRAFENWOHR, Germany (AHTNC) — Army Specialist Four Gerald D. Watson, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen T. Watson, Ropesville, Tex., recently completed eight weeks of intensive field training with other members of the 4th Armored Division at the Seventh Army Training Area in Grafenwohr, Germany.

The training included day and night tactical exercises emphasizing mobility and chemical, biological and radiological warfare. An essential part of the training is range firing of individual and crew-served weapons including the Army's new M-60 machinegun and the 105 and 120 millimeter tank guns.

The 4th, a major element of NATO forces in Europe, plays an essential role in maintaining world peace.

Watson, a medical specialist in Company A of the division's 46th Medical Battalion in Hellbronn, Germany, entered the Army in April 1961, completed basic training at Fort Hood, Texas, and arrived overseas on this tour of duty in March 1962.

Let's Go Fishin'

The largemouth bass is one of the most sought-after gamefish of all the quick-tempered breeds, partially because he's such a good fighter, partially because he's good table fare, and partially because bass are found practically everywhere.

No matter where a fisherman travels—from Maine to California, from Florida to northern Michigan — largemouth bass fishing is all around him. It is true that bass grow larger in the South than in the North, but old linesides is still a largemouth, no matter where he is found.

Perhaps it is for this reason that he is so universally loved.

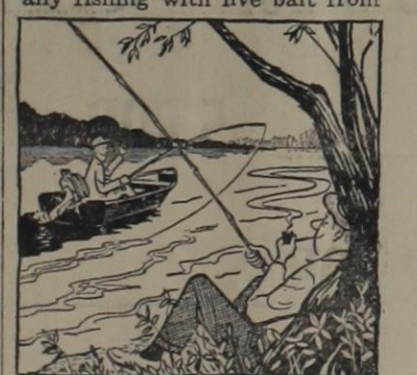
There is a segment of the fraternity that gets excited about bass bugs on fly rods, and goes after Mr. Bass with this equipment. To them there is nothing so entertaining as dropping a bug into a quiet spot beside a log or weed bed, and watching a nice bass smash into it.

Others troll, humming along as I like to do with my little Merc 110 barely turning over, dragging the lure alongside weed beds and other cover spots where bass like to hang out. It is in this method that the lure is presented to the most fish in the shortest time.

FAVORITE WAYS
Still other bass fishermen, lots of them, are convinced that a casting rod and lures are the only way to take bass, plugging away from morning till night with a variety of top-water and underwater lures that defy description. Then, too, there's the spinning man, who normally uses light tackle that is inherent with spinning, and is confident that this is the

"only" way to catch bass, flipping out tiny lures for amazing distances.

No listing of bass fishing methods would be complete without the cane pole man, that ubiquitous creature of the byways who catches fish when all the "fancy" methods fail. Normally fishing with live bait from



the bank of a lake or stream, this guy has been making suckers out of largemouth bass for generations.

BIG PICTURE
Perhaps another part of the total picture is the practice of most fishermen of using one or more of these methods throughout a bass fishing season, flyrodding when the mornings are calm, casting when a bit more heft is needed, spinning when the need arises for frequently taking up a cane pole to stretch a bass.

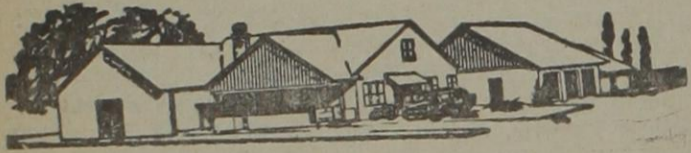

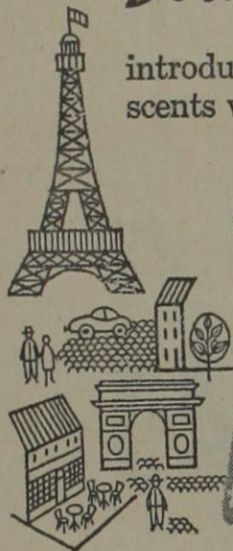
