



It is stated that the burner in the dryer had gone out and then came back on. The pilot didn't light it and when it did catch, the en-







1 cup very dry, toasted V2-in. bread cubes V2 teaspoon ground	1/2 teaspoon pepper 4 lean, boneless pork steaks or tenderloin slices, 1/4 to 1/2 in.
sage 1 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup finely cut onion 1/2 cup finely cut,	thick) 2 Tablespoons hot shortening
unpeeled apple 1/2 cup PET Evaporated Milk	1/4 cup water 1-lb. can whole kernel corn
