TESTS SHOW SCHOOL DOING AVERAGE WORK

The achievement tests at the Ropes schools have been completed, and according to High School Principal Mr. Hannaford, they showed the school doing average work. "The tests are not conclusive," stated Mr. Hannaford, "but indicative of what the student is doing."

The points by grades are given below:

9th Grade: Reading 9.4; Math 10.1; Language 9.8.
10th Grade: Reading 10.1; Math 11.4; Language 10.2.
11th Grade: Reading 10.7; Math 11.6; Language 11.3.
12th Grade: Reading 10.8; Math 11.3; Language 11.3.

"By inspecting these grades," pointed out Mr. Hannaford, "you will find that the freshmen and sophomores are above average, juniors right on average, and the seniors below average. It will also be noted that the highest points are made in Math for all grades and the low grades in reading, indicating the excellent job the entire school is doing in teaching Math. The three

subjects treated are the fundamental tolls of education. The grades above also show that the Ropes schools are doing standard work. Further tests will be made in April and will indicate the progress made by the student during the school year.

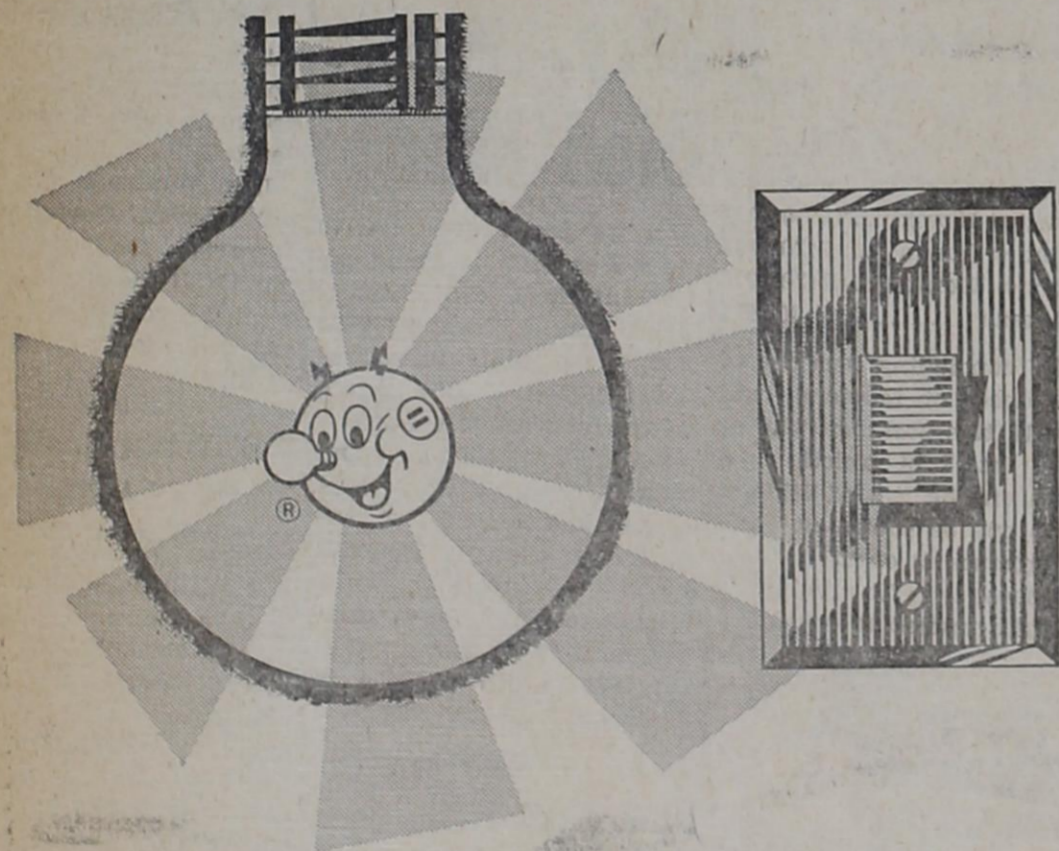

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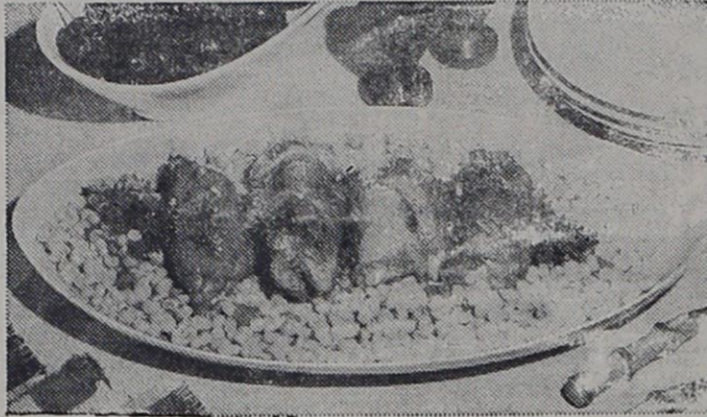

NEW-Apple stuffing in tasty...
PORK BIRDS

1 cup very dry, toasted ½-in. bread cubes	½ teaspoon pepper
½ teaspoon ground sage	4 lean, boneless pork steaks or tenderloin slices, ¼ to ½ in. thick
1 teaspoon salt	2 Tablespoons hot shortening
¼ cup finely cut onion	¼ cup water
½ cup finely cut, unpeeled apple	1-lb. can whole kernel corn
½ cup PET Evaporated Milk	

In 1½-qt. bowl mix bread cubes, sage, salt, pepper, onion, apple and PET Milk. Let stand until bread soaks up all milk. Put ¼ stuffing mixture in center of each steak. Bring sides of each steak up over mixture and fasten with toothpicks at top. In 10-in. skillet, brown meat slowly on all sides in hot shortening. Pour water around meat in skillet. Cover and cook over low heat for 20 to 25 min., or until pork is tender. Serve on buttered whole kernel corn. Makes 4 servings.

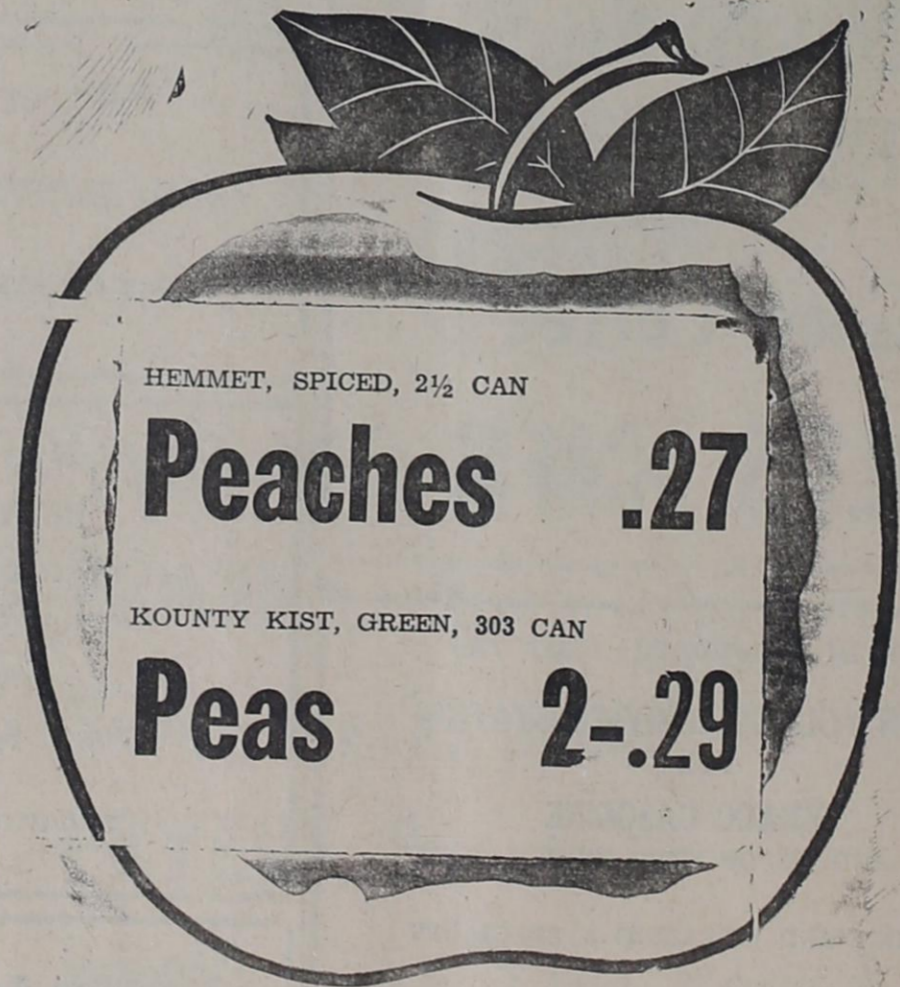
