ROPE COMMUNITY EDUCATIONAL AND RECREATIONAL CENTER

1. All reservations are taken on first come, first served basis.

- A. \$1.00 reservation fee.
2. \$1.50 additional for nighttime use.
- C. Reservation fee will not be refunded.

1250 ATTEND CO-OP MEETING AT MEADOW

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Meadow Co-op Gin, held Monday night of this week, more than 1250 were in attendance.

The meeting opened with a fish supper which was served to all present.

The report given to the stockholders showed that the gins had assets in the amount of \$542,270.43, while the liabilities were only \$123,293.96. The gross income of the gins this past season was \$298,071, while the expenses were \$180,607.19. The net margins or proceeds for allocation to patrons was \$180,607.19, which gave a net margin per bale of \$8.35.

J. C. Pointer, Gene McKee and Joe Schwartz attended the meeting from Ropes, and report it as an elaborate affair, which was hugely enjoyed by all present.

ROPE IS SETTING UP MODERN STORM WARNING SYSTEM

When the radio station at Ropes is set up, the community will have one of the most elaborate storm warning systems on the South Plains. This system will work in cooperation with civil defense and will also be used in case of enemy attack.

Similar radio stations are being installed all over the United States to be used for the same purpose.

Hulon Moreland, commissioner from this precinct, stated to the Plainsman, "I think you are doing a fine thing. This station, when in operation, may be the means of saving many lives."

As is known, this station is being bought with money donated by people of the community and more donations are needed. If you care to assist in this, contact Jack Ogle—even a dollar donation will be appreciated.

So that it will serve the entire community in time of storms the telephone will be used to warn the folks outside the city limits and who are too far away to hear the sirens.

Information on storms will come direct from the highway patrol who always have several cars in the vicinity of where storms are occurring, and from the weather bureau and civil defense.

And, if enemy attack should come, and it is likely, the same system will be used in warning the people. So, if you care to help with this system, bring your donations to Jack Ogle.

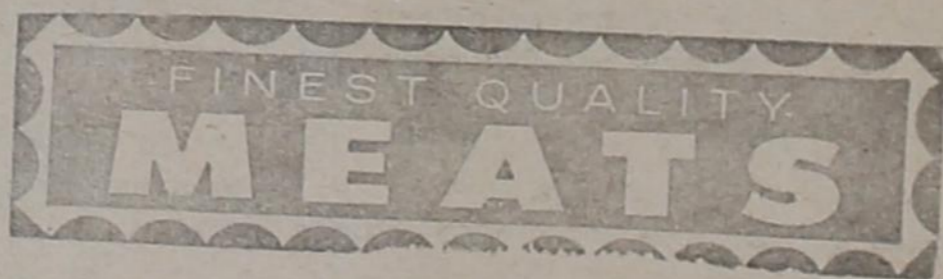

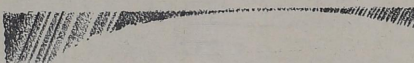

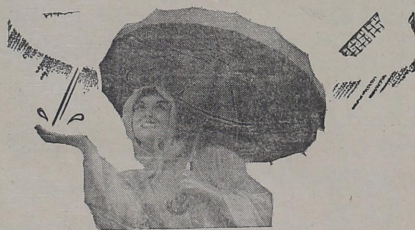
