Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-



During May, Mrs. Vivian Liner, Home Economist with Southwestern Public Service, and I have been doing demonstrations for the Home Demonstration Clubs on the use and care of the blender. would like for you to have some of the ideas that were presented at these demonstrations. If you would like to have more recipes and information, it is available if you will call or come by my office.

Helpful Hints:

A blender works best when given small quantities, but should the blending action cease to draw the mixture down into the blades stop the motor and stir the mixture with a rubber spatula from the sides into the center. In this way, air will be introduced and the blending action will continue. If the mixture is too thick, you may need to add a little more liquid.

Vegetables should be cut into chunks before adding to the blender; an apple in eighths or more; carrots into half-inch pieces (quar- might be left to spoil, will find tered or halved if very thick).

Chop only one or two cups of vegetables in the blender at one time.
