THE BONDS will be dated May 1, 1969, will mature on January 1, 1971 through 2001, and will bear interest at such rate or rates specified by the bidder, provided that no bid to purchase all or any portion of such bonds in blocks as specified below at an interest cost in excess of 5 per cent per annum will be considered.

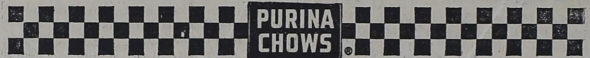

BLENDER SAUCE OR GRAVY

- 1 cup hot milk
- 3 slices bread
- 1-2 cup cheddar cheese, cubed

Pour milk into blender container. Break bread in pieces and blend in milk. Add cheese and blend on high speed about 20 seconds. For medium sauce, use 5 or 7 slices bread.

RAISIN MUFFINS

Add 1 cup seedless raisins to ingredients in blender container. Cover and run on Speed 4 until raisins are finely chopped.

Basic Recipe:

Mixing Bowl:

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 1-2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Blender:

- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1-2 cup soft shortening

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease 14 medium muffin tins. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar in mixing bowl. Put remaining ingredients in blender container; cover and run on Speed 4 (or low) until well mixed. Add to dry ingredients in bowl and stir just until all flour is moistened. Fill tins 2-3rds full. Bake 20-25 minutes or until done. Makes 14 muffins.

LOW CALORIE SOUR CREAM

- 1 T. lemon juice
- 1 T. vinegar
- 1 cup low fat cottage cheese

Blend on high until smooth and creamy.

CAKE MIXES

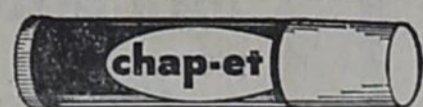
Use any packaged cake mix except sponge or angel cake. Preheat oven and prepare pans as directed on package. Put the liquid and any other ingredients called for on package in the blender container; add half the cake mix. Cover container and run on speed 6 (or high) for about 20 seconds. If necessary, stop blender during processing and push ingredients toward blades with rubber spatula. Add remaining cake mix; cover container and run on speed 6 about 30 seconds. Be careful not to overblend. Bake as directed on package. (We used the 10 cent size cake mix—you can have fresh cake in a jiffy and none left to dry out.)

Home Highlights

From: Jewel Robinson, County Home Demonstration Agent

During May, Mrs. Vivian Liner, Home Economist with Southwestern Public Service, and I have been doing demonstrations for the Home Demonstration Clubs on the use and care of the blender. I would like for you to have some of the ideas that were presented at these demonstrations. If you would like to have more recipes and information, it is available if you will call or come by my office.

Helpful Hints:

A blender works best when given small quantities, but should the blending action cease to draw the mixture down into the blades stop the motor and stir the mixture with a rubber spatula from the sides into the center. In this way, air will be introduced and the blending action will continue. If the mixture is too thick, you may need to add a little more liquid. Vegetables should be cut into chunks before adding to the blender; an apple in eighths or more; carrots into half-inch pieces (quartered or halved if very thick). Chop only one or two cups of vegetables in the blender at one time.

Cole Slaw is a quickie salad in a blender:

1. "Dry" chop coarsely cut cabbage (and other vegetables desired) into Blender container (about 1" chunks). Process about 1 cup at a time.

This may be used on certain blenders.

Set control dial at "Stir" - process about 5 seconds until all vegetables are coarsely chopped. Stop blender and use spatula, if necessary, to push any uncut portions into the blade.

2. Water Method (all models)
 - Fill blender container 3-4ths full of coarsely cut cabbage and other vegetables (1" to 1 1-4th" chunks, smaller for carrots). Fill with water to cover vegetables. Cover container. Process at chop for 2 or 3 seconds - only until all vegetables have passed the blade once. Pour shredded vegetable into a strainer and drain well.

When liquifying fruits and vegetables, always start with a liquid base. A good proportion rule is:

- 1 cup liquid to 1 cup soft ingredients.
- 1 cup liquid to 1-2 cup firm ingredients.

If you need a finer grain of sugar for fresh fruit or desserts, do it in your blender. Use it to prepare lunch box sandwich fillings and salads.

Ooo bits of food that previously might be left to spoil, will find their way into soups, sauces, dips, sandwich spreads, etc.

When you want to sieve an avocado - grate a cucumber - or mash a banana - the blender is your devoted friend.

Control texture of the finished mixture by the length of time the blender runs as well as speed. For a creamy, smooth base (i. e. Sharp cheese blended with cream cheese) with chunky pieces of other ingredients (such as olive, nut, or radish) process the smooth mixture first at faster speed. Add the other ingredients at lower speed
