## Cotton harvest 80 to 85 per cent complete

The South Plains cotton harvest was eighty to eighty-five per cent complete on Friday, January 14, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock.

Cotton harvest operations continued over the area during the week but began to decline slightly on Friday as the harvest neared completion.

The U.S.D.A. Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed 135,000 samples during the week ending Friday, January 14, bringing the season's total to 869,000. At this date last year the 1970 harvest was virtually complete and samples from 1,619,000 bales had been classed.

Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock office were about the same as those of the previous week.

Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 40 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 15 per cent, Low Middling 8 per cent and all Spotted and Tinged grades 28 per cent.

Staples were predominantly 29 to 31. Twenty-eight per

cent had a staple length of 29, 53 per cent stapled 30 and 11 per cent was 31.

Only three per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 5 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 26 per cent 3.0 through 3.2, 44 per cent was 2.7 through 2.9, and 22 per cent was 2.6 and below.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported increased trading in the new crop cotton. Cotton prices fluctuated during the week but ended the week \$5 per bale lower. Prices ranged from 28 to 32 cents with most cotton selling between 29 and 31 cents.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.0 to 3.2 micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 30-31.05, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 31-31.20, Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 30-30.65, Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 31-30.85, Low Middling Spotted, Staple 30-29.60 and Low Middling Spotted, Staple 31-29.60.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$40 to \$70 per ton with most prices in the \$48 to \$54 range.

## Evangelistic services at Church of Nazarene

Attending Eastern Nazarene College, he received his ministerial training, and turned down an offer for professional baseball to enter full-time gospel ministry.

His first pastorate was in Pennsylvania, his home state. In 1970, after serving for over 25 years in an active pastoral ministry in Massachusetts, Connecticut, Maryland, Kentucky and Texas, he resigned to enter into full-time evangelistic work.

In addition to his pulp ministry, he has been active in district assignments and has contributed written articles to the "Herald of Holiness" and the "Nazarene Preacher."

Traveling with him in his evangelistic work is his wife, Jean, who assists in the meetings as organist and pianist, and accompanies her husband in his solo singing. Mrs. Bell studied music in Eastern Nazarene College and has been active in church work as a



musician.

A singing will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday afternoon with a group from Lubbock and the Rev. and Mrs. Bell attending.

## Home highlights

### GARDEN CHECK LIST FOR JANUARY

This is Mr. Everett Janne's check list. Janne is Landscape Horticulturist at A&M University.

— If there are any bagworm pouches or bags hanging on the junipers and other shrubs, try to remove them and destroy by burning. The insect eggs over-winter in the bag and starts the cycle again by emerging in spring and laying eggs on the plant foliage.

— Don't neglect to water evergreen plants in the landscape. This is very important in Central, West and North Texas. Those plants located beneath the roof overhang are often overlooked during periods of adequate rainfall.

— The bare-root plantings should be completed this month in South and Central areas. In North Texas they may be safely planted through February and early March.

— Don't delay any longer the spading-up flower and vegetable beds in preparation for spring planting.

— The necessary pruning of trees and shrubs can be started this month. Delay pruning spring flowering trees and shrubs until after they bloom to avoid loss of flowers. Prune hybrid tea roses about three weeks prior to the average date of the last killing frost in your area.

— Be sure to rake any remaining leaves from the lawn and place in the compost pile.

— There is still time to make the last planting of gladiolus corms in South Texas.

— The grafting of Broadleaf evergreens should be done this month.

— Consider the use of a dormant oil spray on landscape plants for controlling scale. Be sure to follow instructions on container for recommended strength and also temperature restrictions.

— If you overseeded the lawn to annual rye grass be sure to keep it mowed. Also use a nitrogenous fertilizer to keep it green and prevent nitrogen starvation of your permanent grass. About 1/2 pound of actual nitrogen every six to eight weeks should be sufficient.

— Young, tender plants may need protection against a sudden severe temperature drop. Cardboard boxes, newspapers or plastic sheets will provide good protection. If plastic is used, be sure to remove it before bright sunlight hits it or the plants may get too hot.

— An application of about one pound of 8-8-8 or similar complete fertilizer suited for your area should be applied to each 100 square feet of area of established pansy beds and repeated every four to six weeks.

— Treat hydrangeas to obtain in the desired flower color.

— Be sure to prune back bare-root plants at least one-third to one-half of their top growth to insure a successful planting.

— Have you allowed enough room for that small tree or shrub you planted? Remember, most plants will spread a distance equal to their height.

— Make dormant cuttings of crapemyrtle, rose, althea and other favorite shrubs this month if you need additional plants.

— Give a friend or shut-in one of your favorite pot plants. You will be surprised how much they will enjoy it and how much better you will feel, and present her a bulletin on care of House Plants. It's bulletin No. 82 — "Selecting and Growing House Plants," and it's free from the County Extension office at courthouse annex in Levelland.

### SOUTH PLAINS COLLEGE TO OFFER TAX COURSE

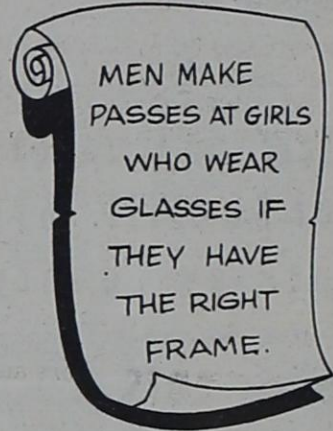
