## Rain, Hail and Wind Do Damage

Pin a medal on Bill Chandler, he predicted the weather accurately five days in advance—last Monday he said it would rain on Friday and Saturday and, perhaps, sooner—it rained.

On Thursday the South Plains went under a severe weather alert which extended to eight o'clock in the evening—this was later extended to 1 o'clock Friday morning. The first activity in the clouds started after five o'clock, with thunder and lightning, with the clouds forming in the south. At no time did much turbulence appear to be present, but one cloud moving from east to west carried a wallop—it was filled with hail and high wind which missed the city of Ropes but struck the Blankenship farm, worked by Julius Blair. Three-fourths of an inch of rain fell in sufficient amount to destroy the crops. The hail continued in a northerly direction.

Crops on the place worked by J. W. Chambers were severely damaged, crops on the Chitwood place were all but destroyed and other farmers reported from fifty per cent to a total loss of cotton.

The rain was general in the territory west of Ropes, with but a shower falling at the Ryals store east of Ropes. Eleven miles west Tom Price reported nine-tenths of an inch of moisture with some hail and wind. About eight miles west Royce Acuff reported six-tenths of an inch of rain with no hail. Herman Timmons, north of Ropes, reported half an inch of rain and no hail, but he said on the place he is working near Brownfield they had two and a half inches of rain.

If it had stopped here there would have been little damage—but Friday was a nice clear day, with Saturday giving the same promises, but in the evening clouds commenced forming and by 7 o'clock p.m. thunder was roaring in the territory. At first it appeared we were to have only light showers with the clouds passing from the southwest to northeast, but some of those clouds came back and hall set in—hall in Ropes, as big as golf balls, and in the territory, in some places, as large as baseballs. Thousands of acres of crops were beaten into the ground.

The wind came from three directions at one time and the trees twisted and bent to kiss the earth, with the heavens being split by jagged flames of lightning. Places that had not received hail on Thursday were covered by a sheet of ice. The hail extended to Clauene.

A report from Lockettville said they could not estimate the damage on the Lockett Farms because the fields were so wet they could not get into them, but it appeared almost a hundred percent loss.

At Lockettville, we were told, "We suffered from tornado winds which tore up small farm buildings and scrambled the cotton trailers on the gin lot. A ride through that part of the country showed the fields washed level and in many of them

Lakes of water were standing. Where before lakes had been dry, they were filled.  
Tom Price, north of the Lockettville Gin, said they had high winds, hail and

rain. "At one time," said Tom, "a door blew open and it took two of us to close it. I never before saw such turbulence in the sky, with the wind seemingly blowing from all directions."  
Frank Sylvester told the

Plainsman he suffered hail damage to his crops, while the hail knocked out two storm windows and beat the windshield out of his pickup.  
Joe Lemons, who lives south of the Busterville Gin, said the hail covered the ground, and the water washed his crops away.

Mr. and Mrs. Edd Russell sighted a tornado moving toward Busterville, and also watched a tornado which lifted the roof off the store at Needmore. The Needmore tornado was seen by a number of Ropes people.

Sunday we went over to view the damage at Needmore, about fifteen miles southwest of Ropesville.

The roof had been lifted from the store and scattered back of the store, and two-by-fours had been driven thru the walls of a house just back of the store.

Lonnie Green, operator of the store, told us:

"My wife and I were standing out in front of the store watching the cloud, which was northwest of us. Two Latin American men were with us and another came up and wanted something in the store, and the five of us went inside. We had no more than got in the building when we heard the roof ripping away, then the ceiling fell in on us."

The tornado came from the northwest. Mr. Green said: "There were no clouds to the west or south of us—there were practically no clouds overhead. There was never a roar; there was no hail nor rain before or after it hit. I thought there was always noise with such a storm, but not in this instance—it sneaked up on us. None of us saw it; none of us heard it—it hit and was gone. All five of us were bruised."

But there is no question but that it was a tornado. A mile or so north of the store a small outbuilding had been hit and tin was scattered all over the fields in the direction of the store.

It was small, but it had a punch—it was silent, but it was twisting as in indicated by the direction the debris was thrown.

We went down the farm-to-market road south of Meadow to Needmore and the fields were dry and the sand blowing. In many of the fields they were running sand fighters—seemingly the entire storm, except the small twister, was north of this point. In fact, it was a tornado that came out of an almost clear sky.

Showers fell, again, over the Ropes community on Tuesday morning.

## Freedom in Truth

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free"

Jno. 8:32  
The inspired writer, James, wrote, "But let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath: for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God." Jas. 1:19-20. We are living in a swift world. We travel fast, and do all things in a hurried manner. The almost universal advice of the doctors is, "slow down". James points out some interesting things in the above passage. First, he says, "let every man be swift to hear". This is EVERY individual. . . an individual responsibility. One cannot hear for the whole family. Let every man be swift to hear. Each individual is to have a quick ear: an ear eager to hear. Having an ear swift to hear, is simply eager to learn or be a ready listener. A man said, "I ain't learning anything while I am talking." He was

THINK on these things.  
"swift to hear. . . to learn". Second, James instructs, "every man. . . be slow to speak". Far too many people are quick with the tongue. They are quick to give advice, criticize; 'have tale—will tattle'. People of this type are in the wrong gear. Instead of being in high gear they need to be in slow gear. Third, James states we should be "slow to wrath, because the wrath of man cannot work the righteousness of God". We need to have a good control on the "temper emotion". The grace of patience and longsuffering will do much to control the wrath of man. Let's be swift to hear. It is a great art to be a good listener. Let's shift our speech down to "slow gear" that we may be able to say the right thing at the right time to the right person. Being "swift to wrath" is not according to the divine way of life.

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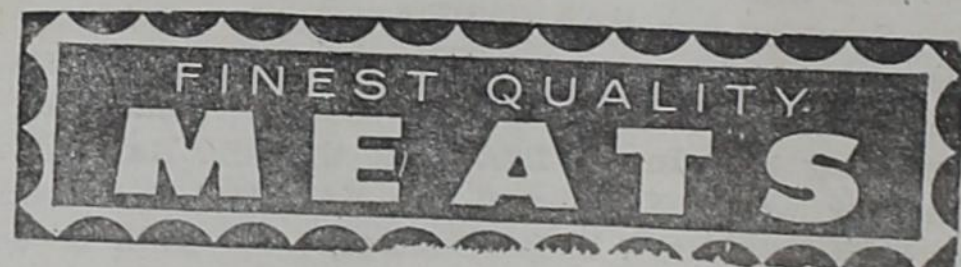
