WAYLAND BAPTIST COLLEGE REGISTRATION ANNOUNCED

Dr. Roy C. McClung, president of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, Texas announced today that registration for the fall term will begin on September 4th, and the term itself will start on September 7th. There are a limited number of openings still available.

In making this announcement, Dr. McClung pointed out three vital factors which make Wayland Baptist College appealing to students.

"The private nature of Wayland Baptist College emphasizes the free enterprise segment of higher education. The place of the private school is well established and the need for a good balance in the United States between public and private education has been recognized by Congress as well as business and industry. Strong private institutions are a further guarantee to the development of independent, free enterprise initiative on the part of budding young leaders."

Dr. McClung added: "Wayland Baptist College is small enough to provide education tailored to each individual's needs through personal counseling and individual attention. Expert teachers, including PhD's, deal with both freshman and sophomores as well as advanced groups. Because of its smallness, Wayland can provide a flexibility in its educational program not possible at larger institutions."

"An evidence of this flexibility is the innovation in the 1967-68 academic year. The fall semester at Wayland which begins on September 7th will close on December 22nd. The second semester will begin on February 1st and close on May 24th. During the month of January, an interim term is being used for the first time to give an opportunity for students to receive three hours credit in three weeks in a very personalized classroom experience. Each professor will teach one course and each pupil will take one course, allowing classes to move "where the action is" during this three weeks period. During this interim term, new and challenging methods of instruction will be utilized."

The third feature of Wayland Baptist College which Dr. McClung feels is important is that it provides church related educational development.

"Wayland fits into that tradition of developing character and leadership qualities; because with the campus life structure, along with the academic program, the possibilities for constructive experience toward effective leadership are extremely strong. The spiritual atmosphere of the campus is informal and relaxed with an honest and mature approach to the settlement of each individual of a philosophy of life springing out of the great Christian tradition."

Wayland Baptist College will be operating this fall in recently improved facilities with the classroom in Gates Hall completely modernized and each of the dormitories has been remodeled to give higher levels of comfort and pleasant group living. Thirty percent of the faculty this academic year hold doctor's degrees.

Dr. McClung's final statement is worthy of direct quotation:

"The end product of Wayland's educational process is an intelligent, cultured, socially involved, highly motivated, capable leader ready for maximum participation in the movements of late twentieth century society."

Dunavant was a graduate of Brownwood High School in 1963 and attended Tarleton State and Texas A&M for his preprofessional training.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Dunavant of Brownwood. The Dunavants and Mike are former residents of Ropes, and Mike attended the Ropes Schools.

Dear Readers - Nola's problems don't always come through the mail. At three o'clock this morning I was awakened by a friend standing at my door with two red suitcases and eyes to match. She was leaving her husband, whom she accused of having made a pass at another woman at a drinking party.

Doris' nearest relatives are 800 miles away. She has five children, the youngest of which is six. She dropped out of college in her sophomore year to marry her childhood sweetheart. During their twenty years together, she has helped him acquire the extensive training necessary to attain the status of a respected professional man which he now enjoys. Doris has recently resumed her college career.

In this situation, what would you have advised Doris? Would you have joined her in resounding condemnations of her husband, thus widening the rift? A few years ago, that's exactly what I might have done, but from writing this column, I have learned that in order to be the best help, sometimes all one needs to do is listen.

As Doris talked, telling me the story over and over, she reached the following conclusions:

1. She admitted that she did not doubt the strength and depth of her husband's love and loyalty. Had she seen him in the exact same situation with any other woman other than the one involved, she would not have considered his action an overt pass. She admitted feeling inferior and jealous of this particular woman and deduced that her own feelings had caused her to interpret what might have been an innocent action in the worst possible light.
2. She faced the fact that had her husband actually made an overt pass, it would not have been

more popular than an attitude of cold indifference.

3. After looking at her situation realistically, Doris realized that she was in a poor position to strike out on her own with the responsibility of five children. She had no means to support them; she recognized their need for a father; she little relished the idea of having no husband.

4. She admitted that both she and her husband were tired before they went to the party, they both had drunk too much and they had stayed later than they should have.

In short, Doris realized that she did not want to leave her husband. Fatigue and liquor had caused her to over-react to a situation that might have been completely innocent, but which, even if it were not, was relatively inconsequential. She decided to go back home, apologize to her husband, avoid the woman to whom she feels inferior, and observe a curfew and drink limit at parties in the future.

My only contribution to Doris was to listen while she worked out the solution she so desperately sought. The person who genuinely wants to help the troubled will make an effort not to become part of the problem.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."
