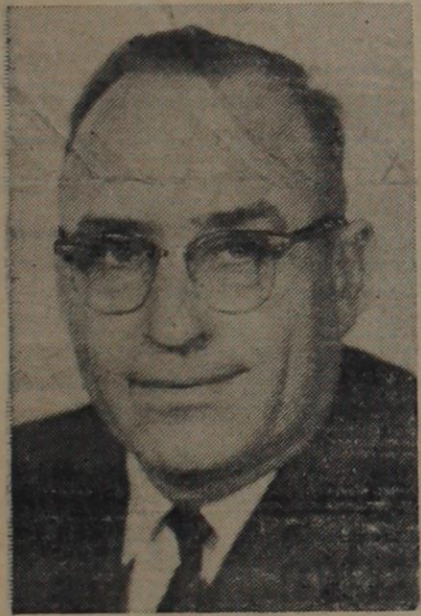
And as the election draws near, I'd like to point out that this vigorous campaign was based entirely upon the "records".

## Liquor-by-the-Drink

Does Texas need more alcoholism? If liquor-by-the-drink is legalized, we can expect the number of alcoholics to increase by one third. After liquor-by-the-drink was legalized in Iowa, automobile accidents increased by 20 to 30 percent which means Texas could expect 673 additional highway deaths each year if this law is passed.

Money that is spent for whiskey can't be spent for groceries, clothing and rent. Advocates of liquor-by-the-drink hope to gain \$7 1-2 million a year in tax revenues. If Texas would increase its beer tax from the present \$4.30 a barrel to \$10 a barrel (the same as Louisiana and Oklahoma) more than \$50 million a year would be raised in additional tax revenue. If Texas would just include beer in the 2 percent State Sales Tax, we would raise an additional \$13 million a year. This issue is not necessary to bring in more tax revenue.

Anytime you pass a law to serve liquor-by-the-drink you are okaying public saloons. We have seen towns where every other business was a saloon.

Recently Afton Richards, publisher of the Chronicle in Jayton printed a column concerning this and we are printing it in part. He says what we wanted to say, only clearer.

"Granting that the big cities and some of the smaller ones have numerous private clubs where the members and their 'guests' can buy liquor by the drink it is also true that they are kept under cover, and there are no big neon signs advertising their presence, and those who do not wish to drink, are not bothered with having to associate with them.

"We are told by about every one that favors having open saloons that it is better to have open saloons and keep them under control than to have the private clubs, which is also a false premise.

"If the State's officers, local, county and state, cannot or will not control and regulate the state's some 1000 private clubs, how can we even begin to think we could get even as good control and enforcement if we had 5000 or 10,000 open saloons all over the State, with big huge signs advertising their wares.

"Of course the argument of all arguments that is based on a false premise, is the one that says 'They are going to drink anyway, let's let 'em drink and tax 'em.'

"According to the same argument, we know we are not going to be able to stop robbing, killing, rape, etc. This would be the best thing to start issuing licenses to people to rob and to kill, if they will pay a big tax for the privilege? Not quite! But it is the same principle, and the same type reasoning.

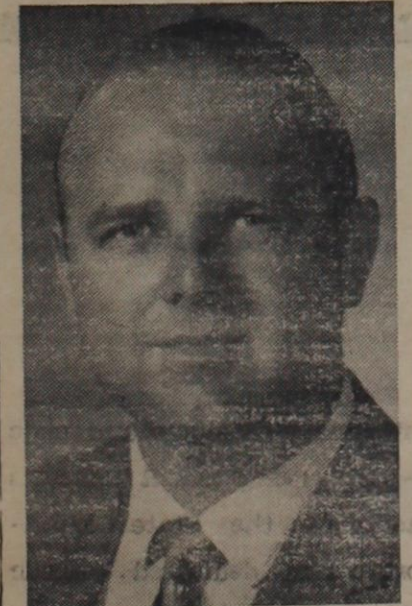
"It is perhaps true that we will always have liquor, drinking, gambling, and a great many other things, that some people count undesirable. But I consider it a defeatist attitude to say, because this is true, we who are opposed to such things should quit opposing them.

"Kent County ranchers, I am sure have no idea they will ever be able to stamp out the lowly coyote but they keep trying. I doubt if they will ever begin to try to domesticate them."

Did you know that 78 percent of the children supported by welfare now are on the rolls because of alcohol. Increased outlets will get more people started drinking, and make enforcement of liquor laws more expensive.

When you go to vote in the May 4th primary, consider your family, your home, your church and your community. Alcohol has never been recorded as serving a good purpose when these things are considered.

## PARI MUTUEL BETTING ISSUE

When pari mutuel horse race betting was legal in Texas in the 1930's, many working people were fired when financial troubles caused by their betting losses affected their work.

All those engaged in retail trade should carefully consider the effect pari mutuel horse race betting could have on their businesses.

The record in other states shows that many businesses suffer after horse-race gambling was legalized. Retail stores experienced decreases in time payments, increases in bad checks, and slumping sales during the racing season.

Profits from pari mutuel horserace betting do not go back into the community. They go into the hands of wealthy people who are able to finance a race track.

Some say it will create more jobs, however when taken a look at, it kinda goes like this: a few may be temporarily employed in building the track; a few may get service jobs during the short racing season; but the only permanent race track jobs will be for a few caretakers and maintenance men.

New industries are not attracted to an area where there is heavy horse race betting. Industry consistently shuns Nevada, where gambling of all kinds is wide open.

We do not wish to add to Texas' population the undesirable persons who invade every state which has this type of gambling.

There is no even trade at the race tracks. Better to work for your money and get something worthwhile than for the few exciting moments of a race that will probably leave your pockets empty.

Following pari mutuel betting at racetracks being legalized, illegal off-track betting is started up by bookies. The bookies are financed and controlled by organized crime — known variously as the Syndicate, Mob or Mafia.

Attracted by the millions of dollars easily milked from betters who are too weak or too uninformed to resist, organized crime moves into every community.

This doesn't sound like a very desirable place to live.

## New Highway Needed

To be or not to be — this is the question of the road bonding election coming up May 4th in conjunction with the primary election.

There has been much controversy on this subject. Not only in Ropes, and Anton, and other communities that think this road does not concern them, but also in Levelland, where the road should certainly be pushed.

It has been alleged that some of the merchants in Levelland are against the road. They seem to think it would take business out of Levelland. We have never seen it fail that if people want to shop elsewhere they would take a single lane dirt road to where they wanted to go, if this were the only means.

Any road runs two ways, they might pause to think that if a better road were leading into Levelland it would bring business, instead of thinging of the road as leading out of Levelland only.

We would like to remind our own area residents that you are not only a resident of Ropes, and should be for progress here, but you are also a resident of Hockley County, and any election for the betterment of this County should be backed.

As far as personal use of this particular road, we do not travel it very much. We make it to Levelland about an average of once a week, but some times even when we are already in Lubbock we journey back to Ropes and take the Farm to Market road to Levelland, because it seems safer.

The highway from Levelland to Lubbock is a little too wide for a two lane road, and too narrow for a three lane road. It is very dangerous, and makes for many accidents.

Also, South Plains College should be considered. This college has been a boon to our entire county. It does not just benefit Levelland. The taxes are not high. In comparison to what it has done for the residents, the taxes are very low.

If you reside in Hockley County, you can attend this college, or send your son or daughter for higher education cheaper than you can put them through their senior year of high school.

Not only is this college a big advantage to the youth of our county, but there are many adults, even from the Ropes area, who have taken advantage of this institution.

Information given us states there are over 280 students of South Plains College who commute daily from Lubbock. This

is quite a bit of business coming into Hockley County. For there is tuition, fuel and oil, meals, and supplies for personal needs, and scholastic uses. Some of these are bound to be purchased in our County.

Regardless of whether a person is going to Levelland, or from Levelland, or what their business is on the highway, this road bonding election is well worth what it costs if only one life were saved.

In an article last week in the Plainsman we printed an article given us by the Commissioner's Court. It pinpointed the proposed road as follows:

NOTICE  
TO ALL QUALIFIED TAX  
PAYING VOTERS OF  
HOCKLEY COUNTY  
RE: ROAD BOND  
ELECTION

Due to the many varied opinions and discussions we have had since calling this road bond election, we think it best to stop the road at a point one mile east of the present city limits. To pinpoint this location, it will be stopped on the Southwest portion of the Elmer Barton Tract of land being Labor Eleven (11) League Number Twenty-seven (27), Montgomery County School Land; or at the East fence of the Euel Palmer residence. Enough bonds will be sold to cover approximately 13.5 miles of Right of Way if the issue is approved by a 2/3 majority of voters.

We think it best to end the highway just before Levelland. This way there is no bypassing of our county seat. Also, most interesting to the taxpayers and voters is the fact that stopping the road in this manner rather than the other side of Levelland as was originally planned, will likely cost about one-third less than the price set at first of \$395,000.

When you go to the polls this Saturday, you will receive two ballots, one large, and one small. The small ballot has nothing on it except "FOR" and "AGAINST" The Issuance Of Bonds And The Levy Of Ad Valorem Taxes In Payment Thereof.

The phrase that has had so many different words substituted could go something like this Saturday "If every Hockley County citizen were just like me, how progressive would this County be?" Regardless of the way you vote, go and vote. This is your privilege as an American. Let the majority rule, and the minority accept defeat gracefully for better relations in your county and mine.

## Hockley County To the Voters
