Mr. Foster said: "Folks talk of the beauty created by man, but none of it will compare with the beauty created by nature."

On the inside of rough appearing rocks are intri-

cate designs which would defy the brush of the most accomplished artist, and the desert rose is so delicate in design and structure that a sculptor could hardly imitate it. In other rocks appear six pointed stars in glowing colors, while others reflect sciences of ancient times.

If you study the rocks owned by Mr. and Mrs. Foster you will find a store house filled with things artists dream of but never created.

The editor and wife are the happy recipients of a necklace and string tie set with polished native Texas petrified wood made and given us by Mr. and Mrs. Foster. They are gifts we appreciate and will long cherish.

12 Inches of Rain Falls Here in June

According to records kept by L. A. Townsen, Santa Fe agent, approximately twelve inches of rain fell in Ropes during the month of June. The record shows:

June 2	1 1/2 in.
June 3	2 in.
June 4	1/2 in.
June 22	3 1/2 in.
June 23	1 1/2 in.
June 30	2 in.

During June of 1958 only one-half inch of rain fell in this community.

It was on June 2 that heavy hail accompanied the

rain and destroyed approximately 75 percent of the crops in this territory. No damage was reported with the rain which followed throughout the month.

This amount of rain is unusual during this one month, as the average rainfall here for the year is only 19 inches.

During the month of June it was also estimated that Hockley County, as a whole, lost more than 75,000 acres of crops to hail, rain and wind.

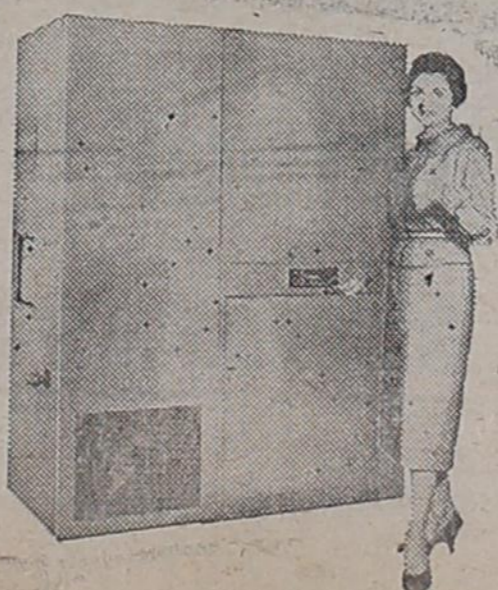

HERB-FRIED CHICKEN AND GRAVY

| 1/2 cup flour | 1 cut-up frying chicken
(2 1/2 to 3 lbs.) |
| 2 teasp. paprika | 1/4 cup hot shortening |
| 2 teasp. salt | 1/3 cup water |
| 1/2 teasp. pepper | 1 1/2 cups PET Evaporated
Milk (1 tall can) |
| 1 teasp. ground thyme | |
| 1 teasp. ground marjoram | |

Mix flour, paprika, salt, pepper, thyme and marjoram in shallow dish or on waxed paper. Set aside 1/4 cup mixture for gravy. Roll chicken pieces in rest of mixture. In 10-in. skillet brown chicken in hot shortening. Cover and cook over low heat 25 min., or until drumstick is tender when pierced with fork. To crisp chicken, remove cover and cook 5 min. more. Put chicken on warm platter. Take skillet off heat. There should be about 1/4 cup drippings. Stir the 1/4 cup set-aside flour mixture into drippings until smooth. Stir in water until smooth. Cook and stir until mixture boils and is thick. Stir in PET Milk gradually. Heat just until steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve with chicken. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
