You want to know the entire truth about Lyndon Johnson, his record in Congress, and the reaction of the Southern Newspapers when he was chosen as vice presidential nominee, take a squint at the Plainsman next week.

Ropes Eagles Trample Frenship As Winning Streak Continues

A wide-open scoring game in the first half turned into a defensive stalemate in the second, but the Ropesville Eagles got touchdowns

while the getting was good to win their first game from the Frenship Tigers in five years, 12-6, here Friday night.

The second half, which saw penalty after penalty kill Ropesville drives, lacked the sparkle of the all-stops-out scoring of the first

half. Ropes' ferocious ground attack ripped out 264 yards for an average of 7.5 yards a carry, but 105 yards in

penalties dragged the Eagles to a halt on two long, second-half marches—one of them that penetrated to the 19-yard line before the Eagles took two 15-yard penalties in as many plays.

Junior Wilson, Buford Moore and quarterback, Bob by Bevers paced the Eagles' victory, aided by hard-nosed line play from Jehue Price, three-time All-District tackle, and guard Johnny Castaneda.

Quarterback Jim Stapleton, along with backs Vernon Ray and James O'Donnell sparked the losers' efforts, with end Dwaine Smith and tackle Jerry Peek pacing the line play.

Stapleton and Rae provided the spark that brought the Tigers their only touchdown. Frenship took the opening kickoff and moved 67 yards in 12 plays to the score, with Stapleton hitting back Mike Burgamy with a quick pass on the goal line and Burgamy shoved over for the touchdown. The play originated on the four.

Ropesville, quick to move back into the contest, got its touchdown before the crowd of about 1,500 had time to sit after the Frenship kickoff. Moore picked up five yards in the first play from scrimmage and Wilson raced around right end on the second play, outran the secondary and went in for the score 48 yards later.

Ropesville's second touchdown was almost as sudden and even more spectacular. The Eagles moved 72 yards in four plays for the score, with end Jackie Weatherly—who kept Frenship on its end of the field all night with booming punts—picking up the score on a fancy razzle-dazzle effort.

Weatherly took the ball on a double-reverse end-around, went to the right sideline and then cut back through the Frenship defense to go 38 yards into the end zone.

The victory was Ropesville's fourth against no losses for the year, while Frenship was left with a 2-2 mark.

Hog Cholera Reported in County

According to reports received from Hockley and Cochran Counties, there has been some hog cholera in both counties in the past few days. Mr. Owen Young, Agriculture Teacher of Morton, has found cholera on two farms, and Mr. Deryl Coker, Assistant County Agent of Hockley County, has reported some in Hockley County.

Hog cholera is usually fatal to all animals that con-

tract the disease. There is no known cure. Vaccination will prevent it 100%, but once a hog is infected, death is sure in a few hours. The new types of vaccination are safe, easy to use, and inexpensive. There is no longer need to vaccinate all hogs born or brought in after vaccination is started. The new vaccine is injected at the rate of 2 cc. per animal, regardless of the size of the animal. It will not

spread cholera to those not vaccinated. The hog that is vaccinated is immune for life.

The vaccine usually costs about forty to fifty cents per animal. This is very cheap insurance. It is easily injected by anyone with a vaccination needle. Everyone who has any number of hogs is advised to vaccinate all of those that are not already vaccinated. Once cholera breaks out, it usual-

ly kills all hogs that are not immune within a few days.

Anyone interested in vaccinating their animals may contact Mr. C. T. McCormick, Agriculture Teacher of Ropes High School, and he will tell them where to buy the vaccine and the brand names recommended. The school phone is 3241, and his home phone is 3892.

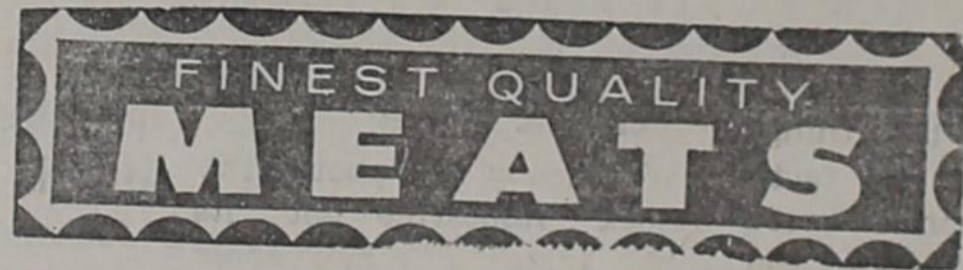
Mr. Dalton was operator of a barber shop in Ropes some twenty years ago, and Mr. Proctor was a barber here about two years ago.

The Texas Highway Department has announced from Austin the first step in setting up a 1961-1962 Federal Aid Secondary Program for Texas.

Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Lubbock has stated that the following farm-to-market roads in this area are scheduled for work under this program:
County of Hockley:
Road No. FM 168 - From FM 41, 1.0 Mi. W. of Ropes-

ville, N., 2.4 miles; grading, structures and surfacing, estimated cost \$23,000.00.*

Road No. FM 597, from FM 168, West, 0.3 miles; reconstruct base and surface, and raise lake fill, estimated cost \$12,000.00.

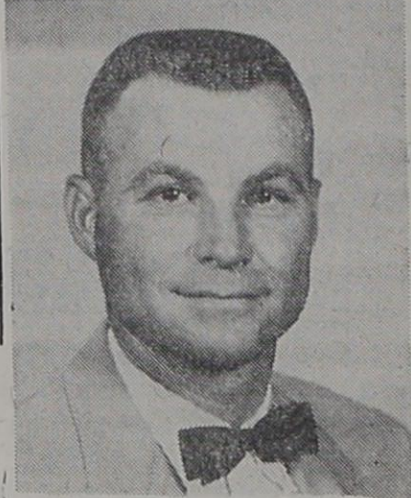
