BURGLARS LOOT EVANS STORE

Monday night Evans Food Store was entered by burglars who helped themselves to items including 75 cartons of cigarettes, 12 pairs of leather gloves, 3 dressed chickens, 5 pounds pork chops, 5 pounds of steak, about \$5 worth of razor blades, and about \$5 or \$6 cash from the register.

Sheriff Weir Clem, who investigated the robbery, stated at least three persons were involved, two entering the store and one staying on the outside to watch. Footprints were left in muddy ground near the store which indicated a large foot in a worn out shoe. They were trailed to the gin just south of Gotchers residence where tire marks showed a large car.

Sheriff Clem stated that from evidence gathered the robbery took place about 3:30 a. m., as at that time Gotcher's dog barked and growled, and broke his chain. Jim got up and put him in the house, and saw a man in the street. He could not tell if he was colored or white. Clem expressed his opinion that he thought it was the work of Negroes, pointing out that it followed a pattern of other breakins done by colored men—especially the pork chops.

Entrance was gained by breaking the front door lock, leaving by the back door by removing a wooden bar. At this time there are no clues.

A movie entitled "Careers in Business Data Processing" will be shown on September 9, 10, and 11 beginning at 7:00 p. m. in the administration building to all interested persons.

FALL EVENING SCHOOL OFFERS COURSES

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of July, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,550.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through July of 1963 shows a total of 53 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were nine persons killed and 46 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$35,510.00.

"There are many good jobs open in the Texas Highway Patrol for young men between 21 and 35 who would like to help prevent the tragic crashes and collisions that occur on the streets and highways," Sergeant Roberts said.

Postal Instructions In Case of Strike

Postmaster Hattie M. Sims announced today that planes, trucks and busses will be pressed into service to move air and first class mail to its destination and to move other classes of mail within a 150-radius of Ropesville in the event of a rail strike.

However, she noted that she had received instructions not to accept mailings other than first class, air mail and air parcel post which are destined for points farther than the second postal zone, which is generally approximately 150 miles from Ropesville for the duration of the strike, if it occurs.

But she cautioned that service will be temporarily suspended on 2nd class magazines and newspapers, third class matter and fourth class parcel post packages addressed to points beyond the 2nd parcel post zone—extending 150 miles from the point of mailing—as part of the national post office contingency plan for operating under the rail strike emergency.

Postmaster Sims advised mailers that any emergency shipment, such as medicine or badly needed spare parts, should be sent first class or air mail during the strike, if it occurs, and if the shipment demands delivery beyond the postal zone. Perishable items, such as baby chicks and honey bees, should not be mailed for the duration of the strike, if it occurs, she recommended.

Postmaster Sims noted that Amarillo, Big Spring and Clovis are among cities within the second postal zone of Ropesville which will continue to get full mail service from this post office if and when the strike occurs.

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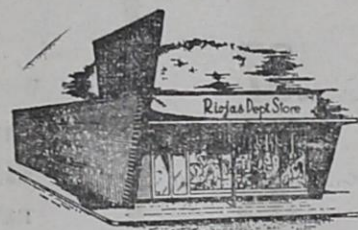

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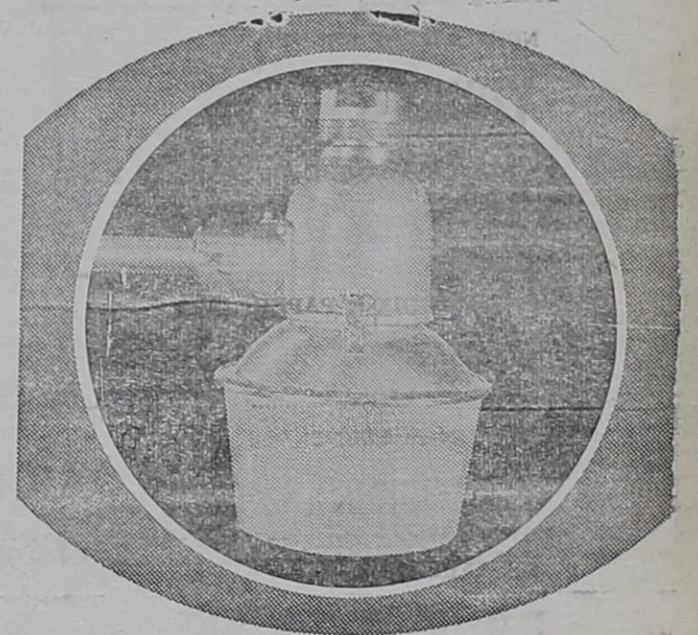
