THE CHURCH

The Church obtains her language from the world. This is proper and right since the Church proclaims her message to the world. This is how we got the very word "church". Church originated from the word "ecclesia". As the disciples moved out into the civilized world and became missionaries, they had to speak in the Greek language. They picked up the word ecclesia to mean the gathering of those persons who professed a faith in Christ. For the Greeks, ecclesia meant a gathering of people for a political means. The early Christians transformed the word.

In our world today we have lost the meaning the word Church should have. A Church is a gathering of those persons who profess faith in Christ. Too often in our modern world we think of a church as a particular building.

Last Sunday I heard advertised a funeral home in Lubbock. It asked that all come to visit it and its "Church of the Flowers". A funeral home cannot be a church. This is an incorrect title. It shows how much the word Church is mis-used today.

The Church of Christ in our midst understands our mis-use of the word church and this denomination has set out to correct the misconception in a fine manner. If you will notice, many Churches of Christ have a sign in front of their building which says, "The Church of Christ means here". This sign points up the fact that a building cannot be and is not a church. A Church is the gathering of a group of people (who are sinners) who profess belief, faith in, Jesus as the Christ.

It is true that the Church obtains her language from the world. But since this is the case the Church must always be on the watch because the world does one of two things with language.

First, it forgets words. The world tends to bypass certain words. For instance, in the King James Version of the Bible we read the term "bowels" when the translators wish to express compassion. This is a word which the world no longer uses to mean compassion and so modern translators of the Greek use other words for compassion like heart, or feeling, or depths.

Secondly, the world tends to distort the meaning of words so as to take away from them their depth of meaning. For instance, the world has distorted the ancient Christian word "love". The world tries to make this word stand for emotional sentimentality or for physical sexual desire. When the Christian uses the word love, he has an entirely different meaning. Love has to do with God's activity on our behalf and with our activity towards ourselves and others.

Language conveys meaning. Let us always guard against the world's attempt to lessen the power of a word by distorting the word.
