First Load of 1958 Grain is Received

PRODUCER IS ADDED TO ROPES FIELD

Another producer was added to the South Ropes Field in Hockley County on Wednesday with the completion of Honolulu Oil Corp. and Signal Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 J. W. Matthews, six miles northwest of Ropesville.

The well flowed 888 barrels of oil per day plus 1.2 per cent water through a 24/64ths-inch choke.

Gravity on the oil is 40.5 degrees; gas-oil ratio, 54 to 1. Tubing pressure is 120 pounds and casing pressure zero.

The project was acidized with 2,000 gallons. Total depth is 9,570 feet, plugged back depth 9,534 feet and top of pay 9,388 feet. perforations 9,390 to 9,407 feet. Five and one-half inch casing is set at 4,405 feet.

Exact location is 525 feet from north and west lines of Labor 11, League 13, Howard CSL Survey. Elevation is 3,409 feet.

On the ballots on which the Ropes folks will mark their choice there will be but one county race, that of county judge, the runoff being between Paul Williams and Louis Owens, and a precinct race, Minnie Fewell vs Minton Roberts, for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1.

Nine Amendments to be Voted in November

In this issue of the Plainsman there appears the full text of four of the nine Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 4). So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows:

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1) — Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the

compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6) — Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

NUMBER THREE ON THE

BALLOT (HJR 30) — Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31) — Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48) — Provides that a Home Rule City

may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 17) — Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4) — Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36) — Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 3) — Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

ATOMIC BLAST

FIRED; FLASH

LIGHTS HAWAII

HONOLULU — An atomic warhead missile exploded over Johnston Island Tuesday with a flash so bright it lit up the heavens over Hawaii, more than 700 miles away. The mushroom cloud of the nuclear blast was also seen plainly in Hawaii.

It was the second known firing from the U. S. nuclear testing range at the South Pacific base.

There was speculation the tests attended development of an anti-missile missile.

Edward von Geldern, a civil engineer, calculated that Tuesday's atomic blast occurred at a height of "at least 60 miles".

HEALTH NOTES

A special eight-member committee within the State Health Department is now at work trying to unravel one of the knottiest problems of the day: What causes accidents and how can they be prevented?

Accidents are the fourth leading cause of death in Texas and the nation generally. Of all the patients in America's 6,000 hospitals, almost seven percent are victims of accidents. Thirty-two of every 100 patients in hospital emergency rooms are accident cases. The care of accident victims in hospitals cost upwards of \$350 million every year.

If it were not for preventable accidents, our shortage of hospital beds would not be nearly as acute as it is. At least 50,500 beds are presently devoted to accident patients — beds desperately needed for sufferers of non-preventable chronic diseases.

There is one bright spot in the accident picture, however. State Health Department records show a noticeable decrease in death rates from motor vehicle mishaps for the past few months. Perhaps this is due to state and national educational campaigns.

As for accidents of other types, little improvement can be seen, despite the time and money spent on massive educational drives to alert the public to hazards of their environment. Accidents still happen with appalling frequency even where no hazards exist.

We know the ages most susceptible to accidents, the most prevalent types, and that males are more liable than females. We know the results—how accidents maim and kill—but much of their cause and methods of prevention remain puzzles yet to be solved.

This is the mammoth task assigned to the new health department committee. With each member an authority in his own field, the committee is composed of specialists in nursing, health education, vital statistics, occupational health, engineering, mental health, maternal and child health, and foods and drugs.

Studies by competent researchers show that only 15 of every 100 accidents happen purely by chance. The rest are products of human failings—haste, inattention, preoccupation, distraction — all of which may result from the emotional strain of anxiety, anger, fear, frustration, hate aggression, or guilt.

As a start on their enormously complex task, the new health department committee will attempt to correlate accidents with biologic conditions such as fatigue, temporary stress produced inattention, impaired vision or hearing, or underlying disease.

Their findings may open up a whole new approach to the control of accidents.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 56, to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have been eligible any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legitly married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

Such pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies in the Offices of Judges of Superior Courts to Be Filled by the Governor. "Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #4—Number Seven on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 46 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter, Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for the issuance of a form of ballot and the election of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when their term of office under the laws of this State or the United States has not expired, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled."

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its officers or appointive officers shall elect only the members of a governing body

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

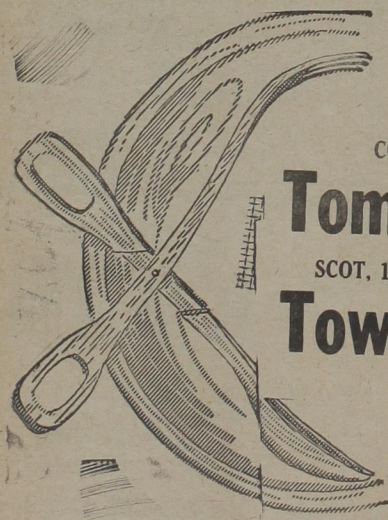
