Grand Political Rally--Country Music--Plenty Fun--Speaking

Gonzales to Speak In Ropesville At Rally Saturday Night-Hear him

It is here — the Ropes Political Rally — Saturday night, starting at 8 o'clock in front of the Plainsman office on Main Street.

All the county candidates will be present to meet you and tell of their claims and qualifications for office, and as an extra touch.

Senator Gonzales, of San

Antonio, who is making the race for Governor of Texas, will speak to those assembled here. In his campaign over the state, Senator Gonzales is creating quite a bit of interest, and that he is a man of the people is indicated by the fact that he is willing to come to a town as small

as Ropes to meet and speak to the people.

In the twenty years that we have been connected with political rallies in Ropes, this is the first time we have been able to get a candidate for governor to visit and speak at one of the rallies—and we've tried several times.

And another feature of the program is that the Martin brothers will furnish plenty of country music. These boys are among the most accomplished musicians on the South Plains having appeared on both radio and television. Clifford told us, "We love to make music." The fact

that they get satisfaction out of playing is one of the reasons they are entertainers of the first water. We feel very fortunate in being able to secure their services for Saturday night. We believe you will enjoy the music they bring.

This rally is staged pri-

marily so that candidates and voters can meet. It gives the voter an opportunity to see and hear the Candidates, and gives the candidate an opportunity to meet the voter. We know Ropes folks are interested in the men and women seeking office, and we know also, very definitely, that the candidates are interested in the voters of this section. TWENTY AREA YOUTHS TO GET AWARDS

Twenty Future Farmers of America from six chapters in Area II will receive Lone Star Farmer degrees at the annual Texas FFA Convention in San Antonio this week.

About 3,000 FFA members from throughout the state are expected to attend the convention, which opened on Wednesday and continues through Friday.

The announcement of winners of awards and scholarships and an address by Gov. Price Daniel will highlight the three-day meeting. Daniel addressed the convention Wednesday.

Clemon Montgomery, vocational agricultural supervisor of Area II, Big Spring, announced the boys who will receive Lone Star Farmer degrees from his area.

This is the highest award an FFA boy may win on the state level. Brownfield has five Lone Star Farmer degree winners; Wellman has four; Meadow, New Home, and O'Donnell have three each; and Seminole has two.

ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED

Highway Patrolmen investigated a total of 240 accidents during the first six months of 1958 in the Lubbock substation area comprised of Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Lynn and Garza Counties, Sergeant E. L. Stroud announced recently.

Of the above total, 4 were fatal accidents, 77 personal injury accidents, and 159 property damage.

Sergeant Stroud reported a total property damage of \$117,179.00 with 131 persons injured and 4 killed. This is an increase of 4 accidents and decrease of 11 deaths for the same period last year.

Stroud said the Patrolmen in his area contacted 8,628 drivers during this period for the following violations: D.W.I. 24, Speeding 3,074, Improper Passing 122, Wrong Side of Road 229, Defective Equipment 3,143, Disregard Stop or Warning Sign 923, and all other violations 1,113.

"During the vacation months, thousands of motorists are on the highways, and too many of them are intent on cramming as much activity as they can into one brief vacation," Sergeant Stroud said. "The result is often tragedy."

He cautioned vacationers to be on their guard against speeders, drinking drivers and drivers who disregard traffic laws. Traffic accidents take no vacation, so to stay safe, step up your vigilance on the roads, and slow down and live.

Sergeant Stroud also urged all motorists to check the expiration date on their driver's license to see that it has not expired. Patrolmen in this area are going to increase their activity in regard to driver's license checks.

STUDIES PROBE HERBICIDE HAZARDS

How serious is the danger of livestock's being poisoned by grazing on vegetation sprayed with weed or brush control chemicals? The veterinary research section of The Dow Chemical company has conducted extensive tests to shed light on this question.

Working with a mixture of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T, Dow researchers found that a 1,000 pound cow would have to consume 25 gallons of spray solution mixed at four pounds of herbicide in 100 gallons of water in order to show any symptoms of intoxication. This would be enough spray to cover 10,890 square feet of land at recommended rates. Using a spray concentration of a quarter pound per 100 gallons of water, the cow would have to take in 400 gallons — all the material which would normally be sprayed over 174,240 square feet.

All of these dosages caused only temporary sickness. Lethal doses are higher; in fact, death resulted only once in the course of Dow's testing. In this case a 650 pound steer was fed 10.3 ounces of a mixture of p,4-D and 2,4,5-T daily for three days. On the third day the animal became sick and died three days later. Enough herbicide chemical was involved to clear a half acre of heavily covered brush land.

Attempts to determine the lethal dose of dalapon in cattle failed. Three and a half pounds of dalapon were "pumped" into a steer at one time. In another instance, five and a half pounds were fed to a steer over a 10 day period and a comparable dose on a weight basis was given to a suckling calf. The worst reaction was a passing digestive upset. Researchers gave up trying to kill cattle with dalapon when it became apparent they would have to drown them with it.

Studies also delved into the possibility of increasing nitrate poisoning cases and the possibility of herbicide applications making poisonous plants more palatable to livestock. Results failed to show any increase in nitrate poisoning hazard following 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T applications. In a number of tests, livestock failed to show a preference for sprayed vegetation over unsprayed. In fact, sheep and cattle preferred untreated plants if they had a preference.

On a pound for pound basis, animals of various sizes showed about the same reaction to herbicide dosages. Any variation would probably go in favor of larger animals.

In summing up results, Dow researchers concluded that dalapon does not constitute a hazard on farms. Likewise, there is no practical hazard in the use of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T. If these compounds are used according to directions, there is a wide margin of safety. Directions and precautions on container labels are developed from a vast amount of similar research and always should be followed for safety and best results.

Hockley County Makes Statement of Policy on Taxes

All in attendance at this meeting know its purpose and the existence of the controversy which necessitated this hearing. You may not know, however, the extent, nature, or complexity of the problem which this controversy poses for the Board of Equalization and the other officials of Hockley County.

To be quite blunt, most, if not all, of you have acknowledged that Hockley County will require a total valuation on its Tax Rolls of 42 million dollars in order to properly finance the County Government for the year 1958. As representatives of your companies, some of you have demanded a reduction of approximately 7 3/4 million dollars in the total mineral assessments of \$32,785, 180.00 for the year 1958, as compared with 1957. You have likewise demanded that the officials of the County look to other classes of property, including automobiles and lands of all classes, for the remainder of the assessed valuation admittedly essential to the proper operation of the County for the year involved.

It is most unfortunate that these extremely heavy demands come at this time. It is true that the oil industry has suffered its greatest reverses in recent history. It is also true, of course, as you have so vigorously contended, that automobiles are subject to taxation under our system. It is likewise true, as you have repeatedly pointed out, that the Supreme Court of Texas has laid down the rule that if this class of property is deliberately omitted from the tax rolls of a taxing jurisdiction, complaining property owners whose properties are subject to taxation in the jurisdiction involved are entitled to relief from taxes on their properties, to the extent to which such property owners were or are damaged by reason of any such omission.

Experience indicates that citizens generally resent the imposition of this type of tax more than any other, and also that collections of taxes upon assessments of automobiles are uniformly poor. Indeed, many who have given careful study to the subject matter have concluded that collections to be normally anticipated from such assessments are ordinarily insufficient to pay the County the cost of compiling and recording assessments of this type.

Regardless, however, of the purely practical certainty that such a course as you have demanded with respect to this class of property is unlikely to produce any additional revenue for the County, together with the fact that limited personnel and facilities in our tax office preclude the possibility of any special effort at collection of such taxes, these properties nevertheless must be assessed on our tax Rolls. This comes about because

greater importance, by reason of our plans for litigation with Hockley County resisting the collection of taxes assessed against the properties owned by your companies for the year 1958. We are certain, however, as I have indicated, that very little, if any, revenue above costs may be expected from this source.

Turning then to the problem of supplementing the assessed valuation of mineral properties with revised assessed value upon lands and improvements of all classes, as men of experience in the field of taxation, you recognize, or at least should recognize, that a general re-

evaluation of lands in Hockley County for the year 1958 is utterly impossible of accomplishment at this time. Limitations of funds, facilities, and personnel make it absolutely certain that such an ambitious undertaking as a complete overhaul of assessments of properties generally in Hockley County simply could not physically be accomplished in the time available, and under existing conditions.

While this Board recognizes that there are undoubtedly inequities in the assessments of lands and improvements of all classes in this County, it nevertheless

is generally acknowledged that absolute equalization of properties is impossible of achievement. The maximum that you could possibly expect of this Board at this time, in rectifying alleged inequities, would be a beginning, and a very modest beginning at that. I am sure you realize that an over all re-evaluation of the properties subject to taxation in Hockley County would entail a consistent, vigorous and expensive overhaul of our records, which would extend over a period of years, not months. This Board is not prepared, and should not reasonably be

expected to be prepared, to undertake such a program. It is questionable whether the Board would even have authority to undertake such a program at this time.

This leaves the officials of Hockley County in the unenviable position of being compelled to solve their tax problems for the year 1958 within the framework of what we now have on our records, with such revisions as time and available facilities will permit the Board to make.

For this reason and many others, the Board has con-

cluded that in the exercise of its best judgment, it should and has rescinded its action in adopting a Resolution limiting the assessment of all properties for the year 1958, to a total of 40 million dollars. By virtue of this action, the entire question as to the distribution of the assessed values of properties in Hockley County for the year 1958 is now in its original position, and the solution of that distribution is the major problem which confronts Hockley County.

The Commissioner's Court of Hockley County, sitting as a Board of Equalization for the year 1958, will continue, as it has in the past, to endeavor to observe the rules of fairness and equality as between property owners, in fixing assessed valuations for tax purposes.

We are, however, as the managing directors of Hockley County, charged with the responsibility of administering of the finances of the County Government, faced with no mere theory, but an actuality, constituting a real crisis in the affairs of the people we represent.

In these circumstances, we cannot yield our best judgment to pressure from any source, but must be guided by considerations of practicality, necessary financing of County activities, and sources of revenue available under the circumstances.

We recognize that we are obligated to announce our intention and purpose to rectify alleged inequities in assessments as between classes of property. We decline, however, to tilt as windmills. It will be our purpose to attack the problem in an orderly fashion, unhurried by the emergencies of the moment, so that we may hope to achieve a creditable and workmanlike job. To that end, we pledge, within the necessary time limits, that we shall devote our best efforts to correcting any inequities which competent investigation and analysis may reveal, between the assessed values of the various classes of property subject to taxation in Hockley County. Until that program can be fully accomplished, we still must operate the County Government.

We do not request any suggestions which do not take into account the situation we face, but we do solicit suggestions of merit and good sense, which would implement the program we have visualized, which will permit our County to live, although modestly, in the meanwhile.

Gentlemen, we await your solutions to our joint problem.
