**Texas Dept. Of
Public Safety**

The Highway Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety investigated 4 rural traffic accidents in Hockley County during the month of February, according to Sergeant E. L. Stroud.

In making this announcement the Sergeant reported 2 property damages, 2 injuries and no fatal accidents. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$2,236.00.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor reminded motorists that Texas law requires all registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight, April 15. "In addition, all trailers registered in Texas which exceed 4,000 pounds gross weight must be inspected," the Sergeant said.

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Program, since its inception in 1951, has reduced the state's traffic accidents by almost 10 per cent, the Sergeant explained. Before the Inspection Program was started, mechanical defects in vehicles was a causative factor in 13 per cent of the state's accidents. However, only four per cent of the traffic accidents are caused by mechanical defects now.

The Patrol Supervisor stated that only 44 per cent of the vehicles in this county have been inspected and that patrolmen will be stopping all vehicles not displaying a valid sticker after the April 15 deadline. The best way to avoid the long lines expected in the last minute rush is to have your vehicle inspected now.

Appointment of crew leaders for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing in this area was announced today by Supervisor Earl E. Kerr of the Census Bureau's temporary district office.

Each crew leader will supervise about 20 enumerators in the big nationwide census which begins April 1. Crew leader training began on March 9 for rural crew leaders while their city counterparts started March 14. Topics covered in the training sessions include procedures for recruiting of census takers, how to train their census takers, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

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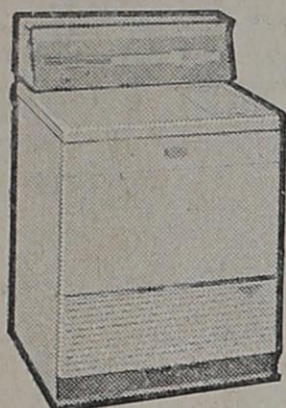

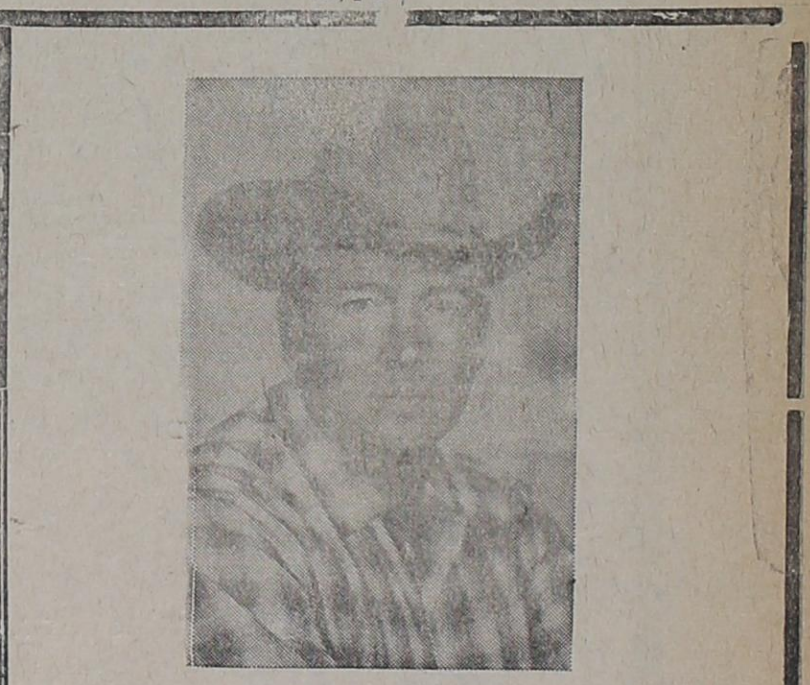
