In the wee sma' hours of Monday morning, around 3 a.m., light sleepers, then heavy sleepers, were awakened by a bombardment of thunder—windows rattling and wind which cut around the corner of the houses with a whistleing noise—and, then the welcome sound of rain drops on the house tops.

We don't suppose anyone saw the cloud—we all went to bed with the assurance that their would be no cloud—the weather man said so and who would argue with the weather man—whether it was vicious and turbulent or just mild and gentle, we do not know. However, the electrical display to the south and east of Ropes was something to write home about. And the canonading of the thunder was perpetual one rolling blast fading into another.

And, glory be, there was no hail—just water, with an average of a half inch falling all over the Ropes territory.

Mrs. Tom Price, who lives some eleven miles west of Ropes told us, we had six-tenths of an inch of rain. Wilson Campbell, some ten miles west, reported more than a half inch. H. S. Abston reported six-tenths of an inch.

East of Ropes Mrs. Bob Thomas said their gauge registered six-tenths of an inch. At the Busterville Store, east of Ropes, more than a half inch fell. At the Bill Patman place, about five miles east, Bill said, "My gauge registered eight-tenths, but I don't trust the gauge. I think I had just over a half inch."

E. E. Nix, about 4 miles west, reported a half inch of rain, while at the Bill Foster Store, 4 miles northwest, reported six-tenths.

Charley Ward reported six-tenths on his place west of Ropes and eight-tenths on a place he is working northwest of Ropes.

The good part of it is that it was not a "spotted" rain, but general in character. While not a gully washer and trash mover, it was just what was needed as most of the cotton is just above the ground and a dashing rain would have covered most of the crop.
