

Ropes Schools to Open Monday Morn

--Elementary Assembly at 9; Jr, Sr. 10

The 1958-59 session of the Ropes schools will open on Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Buses will run on schedule, and will return the students to their homes at 2:00 in the afternoon.

Assembly for the elementary school will be held in the high school auditorium

at 9:00 a.m., and for the juniors and seniors at 10:00 a.m.

Lunches will be served in the lunch room.

Principals of the school will meet at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday (today). The faculty will meet at 9:00 a.m. on Friday.

Due to the fact that the Band director resigned to accept a place at Sudan, a new director is being hired. Mr. Fuller stated that he will know who will take his place by this weekend.

The buildings, during the summer, were completely renovated by the custodians,

and are in first class shape for the opening of school. Along with improvements, one new bus and two new chassis have been purchased, giving the school eleven buses, which means that they have two spares in case a bus breaks down. Also, a new calculator has been

bought for the bookkeeping department.

Also, it was stated that the science equipment for the school will be installed about the 10th of September.

THE ROPES PLAINSMAN

"It Was Like a Picture From Hell," Says One Witness

One Plane a Flaming Ball of Fire Makes a Funeral Pyre For 2-Officers and Cadets Escape Second Plane

Reese Air Force Base near Lubbock is short two planes and two Air Force pilots.

Both planes fell in or near the Ropes territory. The first one crashed Thursday night near the Loyd McNabb Gin, killing its two passengers. On striking the earth the big plane burst into flames and was completely destroyed.

The plane caught fire in the air, it was reported, and

plunged into the earth while attempting a complete turn.

According to witnesses who saw the crash the plane exploded when it struck the earth, skidding along the ground until it disintegrated. The wreckage was scattered over more than an acre of ground, and cotton was seared and burned.

The flyers, according to eye witnesses, were laying clear of the plane. One of

the parachutes was open, while the other was partly open.

The flash from the explosion was visible for miles. Chester Stephenson was one among those who saw it. Two Latin American families living on the Bill Savage farm south of Smyer were the closest ones to the crash.

Adolpho Figuero and Elfego Gutierrez said they saw the plane "burning in the

sky" south of the Savage farm.

"It was turning from south to north and getting closer to the ground," the men said, describing the sight to a newsman.

"It was burning big in the air. When it hit the ground there was a big flash and a sound like thunder, then a big cloud of black smoke," Adolpho said.

Both men rushed to the

scene of the crash.

"There were about three cars there when we got there," Figuero continued. "There was wreckage scattered all over the field and it was still burning. We searched through the wreckage and found the bodies."

"It was horrible, like a picture of hell," Gutierrez said. "I don't want to see all that death any more."

The other bomber fell just

north of the Community building Monday afternoon about 2 o'clock.

John Kimberlin, who was standing in front of the Evans and Sims Grocery saw the plane when it went down. "I knew it crashed," he said, "for immediately there was a black plume of smoke in the sky."

Mr. Foster, at the Foster Grocery just across the road from the Community building and less than a hundred yards from where the plane hit the ground, said, "The plane came in from the east, circled back to the north, then turned east. All the time it was losing altitude. It was so low as it came back that it was almost on top of a drilling rig by the Community building. There was a noise resembling thunder when it struck the tarth and a livid ball of fire shot up into the air. The fire went straight up and then there was howling black smoke.

The driller at the rig, at the time talking to Sam Whitner, saw the plane coming in, and exclaimed, "What is he trying to do?"

Seemingly the plane was coming directly at them and they turned and ran out into the road, reaching about the middle of the pavement when the plane crashed. It scooped out a hole in the earth only a few feet from the drilling rig, bounced into the air, and dug another hole in the ground as it disintegrated.

The plane was scattered about an acre of ground, destroying the cotton. The body of the plane rested against the trees surrounding the Community building.

The Ropesville Volunteer Fire Department answered the call to the burning plane and put out the fire.

The Lieutenant and two cadets, who were operating the plane, parachuted to safety, and with the exception of being jarred up a little, were uninjured. A helicopter returned them to the Base.

Hundreds of people gathered at the scene, but when the Air Force police arrived they were dispersed.

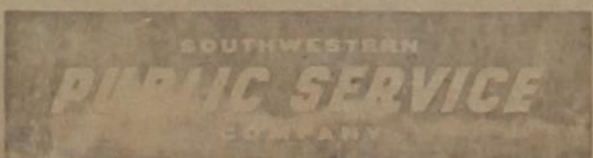

TEXAS DEPT. OF PUBLIC SAFETY

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, made a personal appeal to Texas motorists recently urging them to join an all-out attempt to make Labor Day a historical event free of traffic deaths.

In his statement, Garrison said that he was talking to each driver when he asks them to join the DPS, Gov. Price Daniel, and business and civic organizations throughout the state in a drive to make Labor Day a yet unobtainable deathless holiday. He said such a traffic record for a holiday in Texas would be recorded in the history books.

"I would like for every driver to realize that his chance of becoming a motorist this holiday is greater than he would imagine. On an average throughout the 72-hour Labor Day period, we estimate that one fatality will occur in Texas every two-and-a-half hours; a

traffic accident will occur every two-and-a-half minutes. This will be the rate of our accidents and fatalities if records of past holidays hold true."

Earlier the Texas Department of Public Safety had predicted that 29 persons would become motorist victims during the three-day Labor Day holiday extending from 12:01 a.m. August 30 thru 11:59 p.m. Sept. 1. The state police organization has planned an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday weekend, alerting all available patrolmen for an around-the-clock vigil.

The Texas DPS has labeled its program "Operation Motorist" and will run its usual count of traffic fatalities.

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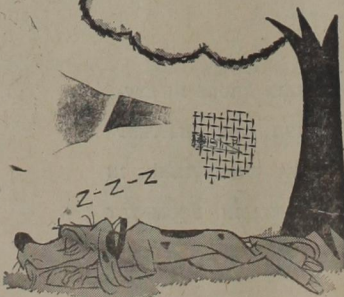
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
