REPRESSION

—Ted Dotts

Those enlightened students of the mind—the psychiatrists—have done much since the days of Sigmund Freud to help us understand ourselves. Although psychiatry is a relatively new addition to the field of medicine, it has already made many gifts designed to help man in his daily living. Perhaps no gift exceeds the understanding they have given about repression.

We do not forget things that cause us trouble, we repress them. To repress a bad thought or memory or deed is to force it down into our subconscious. We do not forget it, rather it resides in us like a seed in the soil. Soon it takes root and grows.

Nor do we forget the good deeds we do. With our good deeds we have a choice to make. We can tell the world about them and this gets rid of them. They do not take root in our subconscious and grow. Or, we can keep our good deeds a secret and repress them so that they are like seed buried in the soil of our subconscious.

So, our subconscious is filled up with at least two kinds of things—good deeds and bad deeds. The Scriptures tell us to do two things in regard to our subconscious and the deeds we have repressed. In Matthew 6:3 we are to keep secret those good deeds we have done. Let them sprout and grow until our whole mind—conscious and unconscious—is filled with the joy of goodness. Then, in James 5:16 we are told to confess our secret bad deeds. If you want to root up the bad seed, then confess it. This stands to reason for if you tell a secret, then it is no longer a secret.

Thus, the Scriptures are telling us to root out the bad deeds in our unconscious by confession and keep secret the good deeds so that they may grow and make us into good men.

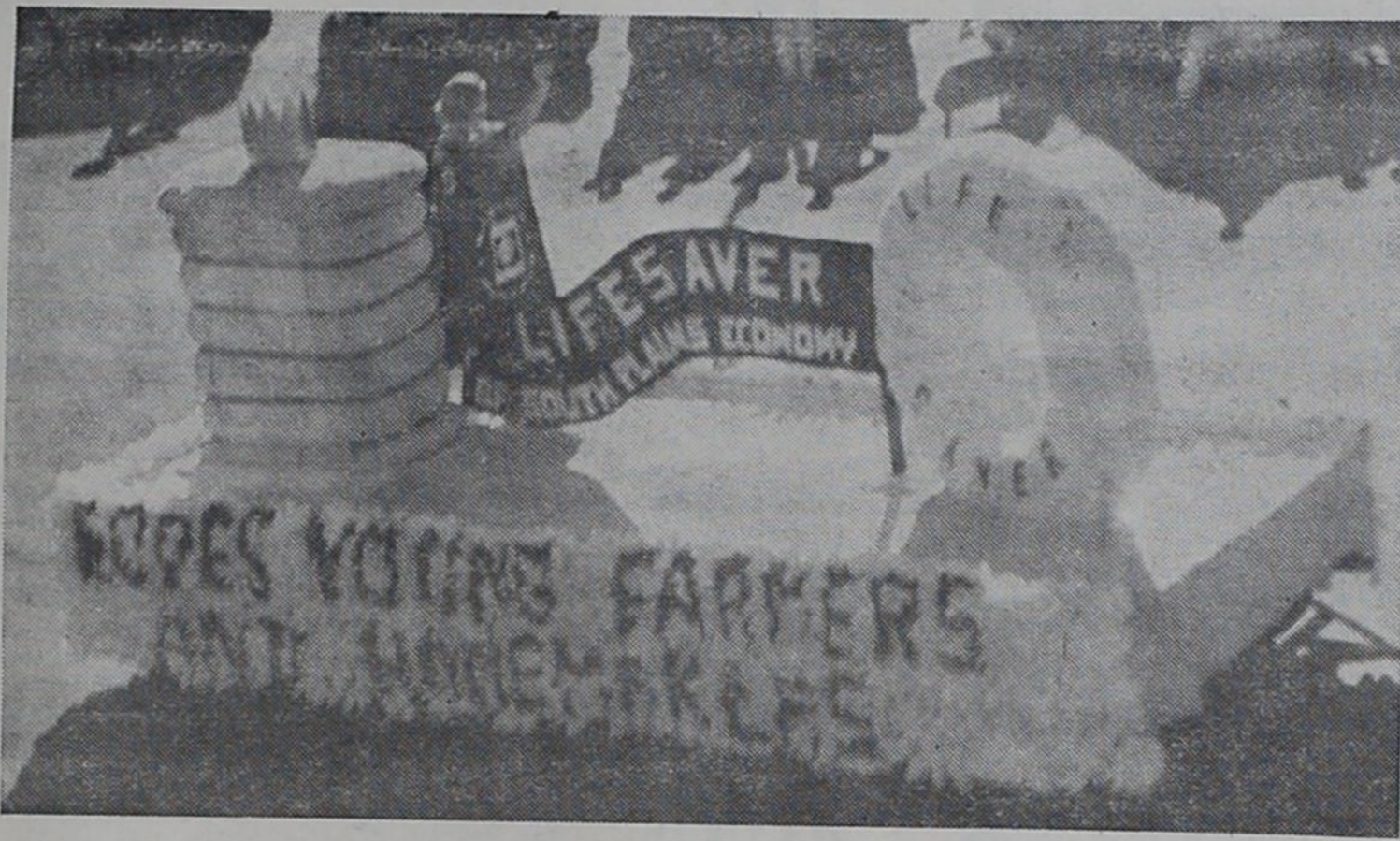
Today some great students of the mind are telling us the same thing. They have discovered that we are what we keep secret. As one of them puts the case, "We are our secrets." Whatever you repress will make you what you are. So, if we are to be healthy individuals, we must learn how to handle those things in our lives we keep secret, those things we repress.

Now, if you are one of those rare persons who doubts that he ever represses anything, then you might find yourself enjoying the study of dreams. Dreams are the manifestations of what we repress. But dreams come out all distorted and meaningless, because our subconscious does not dare to shock our conscious with the reality of the strong feelings that lay hidden in our subconscious. For those who would like to investigate their dreams further, I would recommend Freud's book, "The Interpretation of Dreams" (Modern Library \$1.95). Although Freud wrote this book in 1900, the basic ideas and approach will give even a beginner a good insight into the whole field.

Finally, the study of repression is important because it requires what I call "psychic energy" to hold things down in our subconscious. The discipline of keeping a good secret helps us grow into strong, mature, happy Christian individuals. But, the energy required to keep

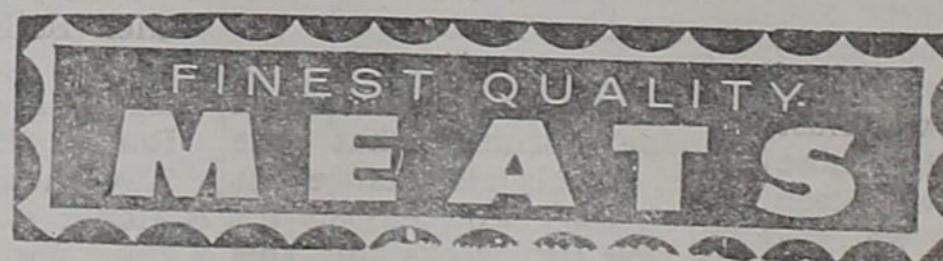

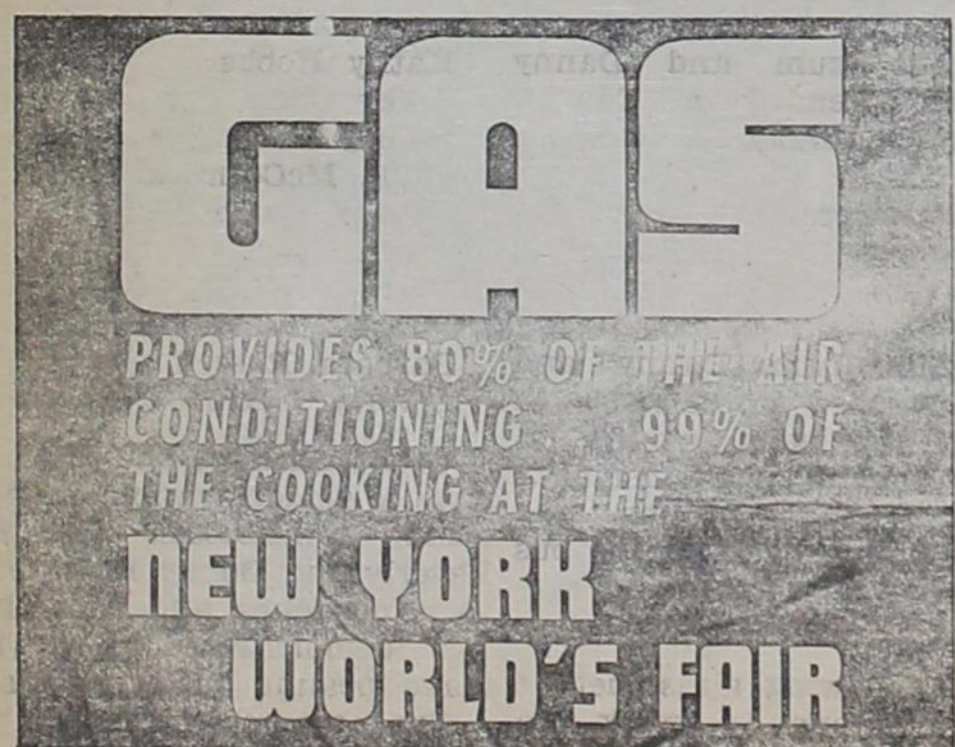
