THE OBSERVATIONS OF A PILGRIM

I observed a dream being fulfilled Monday: Richard Milhous Nixon, 56 year old former poor boy, became the 37th President of the United States of America. In a way, it's the most incredible event of this century.

So often the prize seemed close. In 1955, for instance, the serious heart attack of President Eisenhower made Nixon acting leader of this nation. Everyone thought Ike would surely retire the next year and not seek re-election. He not only sought it, but won it handily. During this second term of office, Nixon was forced into preparing himself day and night literally to take over in case Ike's battered heart failed.

Finally 1960 arrived! This was Nixon's big opportunity. Never in the history of the madness we call "election time", did a man campaign harder than Richard Milhous Nixon.

The very first day of that 1960 campaign was typical of the entire nine weeks: from Baltimore to Indianapolis to Dallas to San Francisco, all in the space of 24 hours. To say that he drove himself, is an understatement. He pushed his staff, his wife, his family and himself to the brink of exhaustion. Only the value of the prize at the end kept him going. AND THEN HE LOST! By an eyelash, he lost: 118,574 votes — less than two-tenths of one percent of 69 million votes cast. But even more unbelievable than this loss, was Nixon's 1962 defeat in California for the governorship by Edmund G. Brown.

On November 16, 1962, the "Times" magazine said: "Bartering a miracle, Nixon's political career ended last week."

Then came 1964. The dead politician was resurrected. Backers ran him in three different presidential primaries. And even Nixon himself seriously considered a bid for the Vice - Presidency under Barry Goldwater. As all his efforts failed and the Republican bid crumbled under the onslaught of Lyndon Baines Johnson, Nixon was reported to have said to a certain news commentator: "As a practical political realist, I do not expect to be a nominee again."

On January 31, 1968; this practical political realist declared: "America needs new leadership — and I believe I have found some answers. I have decided, therefore, to enter the Republican presidential primary in New Hampshire." And as irony would have it: this once political has been captured the coveted prize from the incumbent party by a margin very similar to that close count of 1960.

This Pilgrim then wonders aloud: "Is this character of tenacity in Richard Nixon, that drove him through defeat after defeat to the Prize, a mark of 'Greatness'?" Let us hope so! It's a long, long walk back from Washington

FHA Report Beaty-Clem Vows Read Saturday Night

During fiscal year 1969, 158 Hockley County farm families availed themselves of Farmers Home Administration operating loan credit, Horace D. Gilmore, County Supervisor, said today.

Gilmore said that \$1,332,770 was advanced during the 12 months ending June 30 for such expenses as new machinery and equipment, livestock, fertilizer, feed, seed, pasture improvement and fencing. Operating loan funds also were used to refinance debts and pay family living expenses.

"This type of credit," Gilmore said, "has enabled many small farm operators to stay on the land."

As the fiscal year ended, farm families that included nearly 440,000 people nationwide were benefiting from the program which serves family farmers who can find no other source of necessary operating loan credit.

Loans are made through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration serving all rural areas of the United States. All loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and financial management. The local FHA county office is located at 809-3th Street, Levelland.

In addition to operating loans, Farmers Home Administration makes loans to purchase and develop farms, to develop community water supply systems, to obtain housing in rural areas, including housing for farm laborers and senior citizens, and to meet the emergency credit needs of the farmers suffering from a natural disaster such as hail, flood or drought.

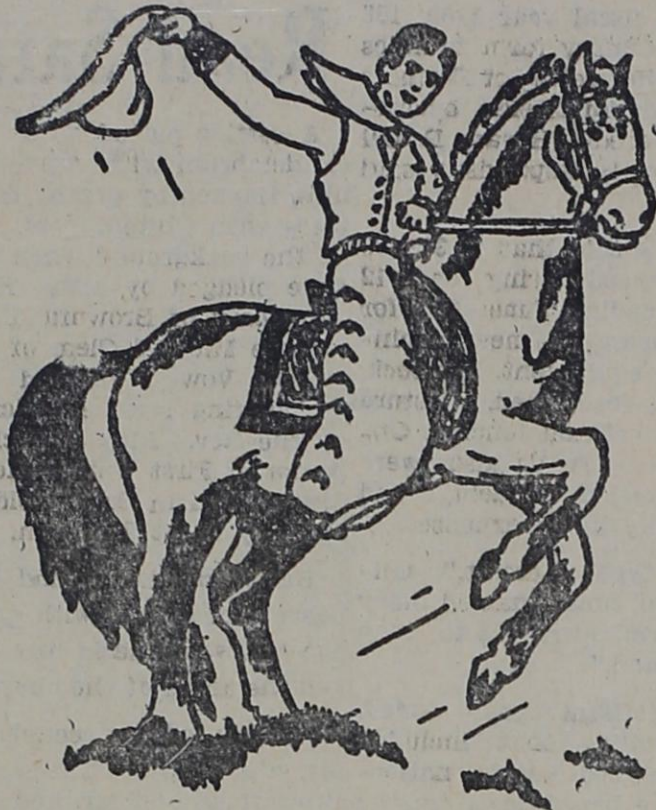

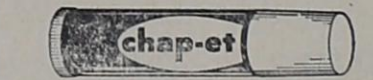

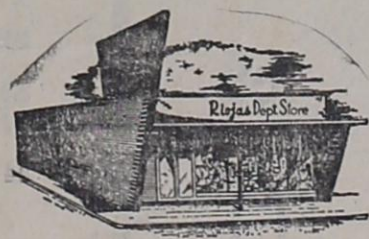
