Such tactics are for the winning of wars, but do not have a place in the lives of those who wish to be known for their act charm and graciousness.

"Tact wishes to remove the barbs and thorns and even the pinpricks that might hurt others, even slightly. Tact will enable you to think quickly — to steer a dangerously rocky conversation into smooth waters and a safe harbor. With it you will leave an impression that people do not stop to analyze, but which they do appreciate emotionally. You are then blessed with the good will of their hearts, which you will rather

The Observer and the Observed

It was first celebrated in 1621 by the Pilgrims at Plymouth, in gratitude for beautiful crops following a year of struggle in which 47 of the 103 members of the colony died. Thanksgiving is actually a harvest festival. It is the most truly "native" of all American celebrations.

The first Presidential Proclamation for Thanksgiving was issued by George Washington in 1789. This was a give thanks for the favorable conclusion of the revolution and the adoption of the Constitution. The celebration of a day of thanks was not regular, but by 1858, 25 states and two territories had issued proclamations.

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Mrs. Sara Hale in 1863, took her plan to President Lincoln after the Union had won the battle of Gettysburg, with the people in a general victorious mood, the President proclaimed the last Thursday of November as Thanksgiving. In 1939, Franklin D. Roosevelt designated November 23 as Thanksgiving Day. Many states refused to break with tradition. To settle the issue, a joint resolution of Congress in 1941 provided the fourth Thursday of November as the day of Thanksgiving.

It is just another day...but a special day when God's people get together and fellowship and direct their attention and prayers to God.

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Ropes Eagle Band Rated 'Excellent'

Ropesville's Goin' Band marched its way to a rating of "excellent" on November 19 in the Regional Interscholastic League Marching Contest.

The 48-piece band, directed by Mrs. Dianne Barbee, was among six Class B groups participating in the annual contest, held this year at Lowrey Field in Lubbock.

Other "B" schools were rated as follows: Wilson, superior; Sundown, Whiteface and Anton, excellent; and Whitharral, fair.

"I was very proud of our students," Mrs. Barbee said, "and I think our score was indicative of the many long, cold hours put into early morning rehearsals by the band."

The contest, like most of the bands

extra rehearsals, was held on a cold windy day. However, the Ropesville Band marched and played its best all year, according to the director.

The judges — Bill Bradley of Big Spring, G. T. Gilligan of Kermit, and Phil Hewett of Kansas — thought so, too, as they were very complimentary on the band's six-minute show.

Officers of the band include Ricky Blackmon, president; Roma Arp, vice-president; Larry Shannon, secretary-treasurer; Dwain Davis, drum major; and Kathy obbs, majorette.

"It was a happy day for our band," Mrs. Barbee continued, "but we are glad to be back inside a warm band hall working on concert music — sitting down!"

Eagles Win Second In District 5-B Play

Sundown broke open a 6-6 game with 20 points in the third quarter, and went on to blast Ropes, 34-12, in 5-B's title game at Ropes last Friday evening.

Robert Edwards and Jesse Perez each scored twice and Edwards tossed a touchdown pass to Fred Helms as Sundown won the playoff rights with a perfect 5-0 loop slate.

The Roughnecks finished regular season play at 8-2 and Ropes, which had a 4-1 league slate, had a 5-4-1 overall mark.

Edwards hit Helms on a 20-yard scoring toss in the first quarter but the kick failed. Ropes trailed in the second stanza as Lynn Searcy hit

Larry Shannon from 18 yards out but the kick missed and it was 6-6 at the half.

Edwards hit home from three and five yards out after Perez' 18-yard jaunt tput Sundown in front for good and Helms booted a pair of PATs to make it 28-6 entering the final eight minutes.

Searcy hit Shannon from 25 yards out for the Eagles final score and then Perez raced 12 yards for Sundown's final tally. Vic Bounds hauled in a two-point conversion pass from Edwards after the last Sundown score.

Sundown will meet Wilson in Bi-District play.


