In his attempt to put Ladybird as near the White House as possible, Lyndon Johnson has embraced the Democratic platform which, first, nullifies Texas' Right to Work laws. In the platform this time the Democrats are for the closed shop and for denying any individual the right to work unless he belongs to a union—what we mean is: "The federal government will be empowered to use its law enforcement agencies to see that all working men join a union."

As things now stand, the States have controlled such laws, and most states have laws which allow a man to work whether he belongs to a union or not—Texas has one of the strongest Right to Work laws in the nation—no union can dictate to a man whether he shall or shall not belong to the union. If such a law as this is put into effect, the government will be subject to the union leaders.

Mr. Johnson has tried to soft pedal this part of the platform and declared, it is alleged, that if he and Kennedy are elected, that they will not pay any attention to this plank. But, what did Mr. Kennedy say in Detroit—according to his speech, the closed shop law is his pet baby and it will be enforced, which caused the union leaders to fall on his neck as if he were a long lost brother.

Since the Texas Legislature has made it possible for Johnson to run for two offices at the same time, and the higher courts have upheld their decision, it now but remains for the voters of Texas to march to the polls and vote for John Tower, the Republican candidate. Such action on the part of the voters of Texas would demonstrate to the Texas Legislature and Lyndon Johnson that they at least have the right to express their opinions at the ballot box and that when they are stepped on they will do just that.

While in Texas Johnson is telling the voters that they need not worry about the oil depletion plank, in the Northern states Kennedy is yowling that it will be a main issue—he has to, the Northern states demanded the plank be placed in the platform.

In this political campaign Kennedy and Johnson are playing both ends against the middle—if Kennedy and Johnson are defeated, Johnson wants to retain his position in the Senate. We think the time has come when Texans should retire Johnson to his ranch and give him time to hob nob with his friends in Duval County—where they vote the dead as well as the living.

We don't think Texans are going to allow Kennedy and Johnson to chain them to the stake of greed and barbecue them with the fire of ambition. First and foremost, candidates for the office of the presidency and vice presidency should have the good of the people at heart—their personal ambitions should be laid aside and they should be willing

News of Our Schools

Enrollment Climbs—New Science Department for Junior High

The old Home Economics room in the Junior High has been converted into a modern laboratory, with all new equipment.

"We're proud of our Science department," Pat Patterson, Junior High Principal, told the Plainsman. "We have visited the laboratories in several schools and our equipment is ahead of any that we have seen."

"Custodian Robert Hall this past summer re-wired the room, put in more electrical and gas outlets, and completely redecorated it, making it suitable for our laboratory."

Already the pupils are

taking an interest in the science department, a number of them having different kinds of plants growing, among which is an orange tree, started from a seed; another is a log in water which is developing a bud. Mr. Patterson said one pupil brought a careless weed, but that he sent it back as he had spent most of his life trying to kill that kind of weed.

One thing new about the school this year is the fact that science is being taught in all grades.

ENROLLMENT GOES UPWARD

This past week the en-

rollment in Ropes schools increased some eighteen over the report of last week—the elementary now has 296. Terry Redford, elementary principal, said that he now has 29 pupils in 1-A; 30 pupils in 1-B; 28 in 1-C; 27 in 2-A; 27 in 2-B; 30 in 2nd and 3rd C; 28 in 3-A; 28 in 3-B; 35 in 4-A; and 34 in 4-B.

Enrollment in Junior High is 148 and in High School is 111. And pupils continue to register. It is thought that the Ropes schools will have the highest attendance this year in its history.

Added to this 555 is an enrollment of 45 in the Ne-

gro school, which brings the total to an even 600, and the first six weeks have not yet been completed. With the enrollment continuing to climb, it is likely there will not be sufficient rooms to take care of those who want to attend.

NEW DRIVER'S CAR RECEIVED

The school's new driver's car was received this week from Jack Bailey's Chevrolet, of Brownfield.

While it is necessary that the school buy this car outright at the beginning of the school term, at the end of the term the firm selling it to the school will buy it

back, less \$250.00.

Supt. O. V. Fuller told us that the school had sold one bus, and that with the new bus they would have two spares.

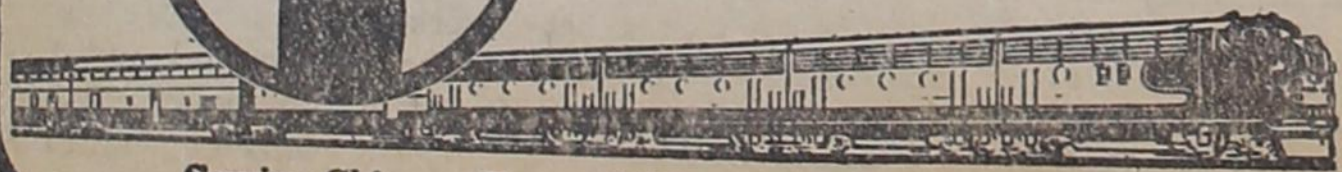

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News On

Aging Problems

Austin — A blueprint for action, containing 60 recommendations on how many of Texas' aging problems can be solved, was adopted here at the Governor's State-wide Conference on Aging.

State Senator Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro, steering committee chairman, said the Governor's Committee on Aging hoped the recommendations would serve as a guide for local communities desiring to share the responsibility for making golden years truly golden for the elderly.

The final conference report, representing the views of more than 600 delegates interested in the aging problems, also contained recommended action by the various levels of government.

The major recommendation for federal government action was that the Old Age

and Survivors Insurance law be changed so that the level of earning permissible be set at a more realistic level commensurate with the present inflationary cost of living.

On the state-level, these recommendations were made
 1. That the constitutional ceiling for Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children and Aid to the Needy Blind be raised from \$47 million to \$57 million.

2. That the Legislature appropriate funds to put into effect a medical vendor payment plan, which already has been approved by the people, and that such a plan include payments to nursing homes as well as hospitals and physicians.

3. That a financial arrangement be worked out so that 3,000 elderly seniles can be transferred from State hospitals to licensed nursing homes.

Other recommendations included: consideration of a state bond issue to get loan

money for the building of dwellings for the aged; activity centers in both urban and rural counties where need is evident; establishment of a permanent State Commission on Aging and a State Committee on Employment for the Aged; removal of the State Constitutional requirement for a "pauper's oath" in order for a person to receive county aid; flexible rather than mandatory retirement at 65.

On the county level, these recommendations were approved: more full-time health units; an increase in regional neuro - psychiatric out-patient clinics; re-analysis on the county level of welfare programs; establishment of county Commissions on Aging; greater efforts by churches, labor unions and fraternal groups in the social welfare field; and more home-care programs, visiting nurse and homemaker services and rehabilitation programs on the local level.

These recommendations were the direct outgrowth of a series of almost 200 grassroots county meetings in which approximately 4000

Texans participated and at which resources and needs were studied. They represent not only the thinking at the local level, but the views of recognized experts in the various fields of aging.

Speakers at the Governor's Conference included Gov. Price Daniel, Congressman Wright Patman of Texarkana, Welfare Commissioner John Winters, State Senator David W. Ratliff, and C. M. Lambright of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Eighty-eight delegates of Texas will present the recommendations to the White House Conference on Aging in Washington, D. C. in January for incorporation into national recommendations.
