Free Shots to be Given In Ropes Tues. July 11

IS YOUR CHILD SAFE FROM DREAD DIPHTHERIA

Is your child safe from diphtheria, small pox, polio and other diseases?

That is a question you should ask yourself, and if they are not you should take steps at once to see that they are.

To help you, to help the community, an Immunization Clinic will be held at the Community Center Tuesday, July 11th, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m., at which time any one living in this community may avail themselves.

According to Terry Redford, principal of Ropes Elementary school, these shots will be free. A health nurse and doctor will be present to give the shots.

It is noted that adults, as well as children, may take advantage of this clinic.

The epidemic of diphtheria which sprang into life in the Plainview community last year was made possible because so many children had not been immunized by shots—several children died. We do not want that to happen here.

You may not remember, but we do, before there was a vaccine to combat this illness, when an epidemic hit a community there was little that could be done—it was almost certain death and one of the most dreaded diseases of the country.

If you have ever gone thru one of the epidemics, you will not hesitate to take advantage of the immunization offered. Also, follow-up shots for polio is offered, free.

Keep this date in mind—July 11, 1:30 to 3:30, in the Community Center.

Freedom in Truth

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" Jno. 8:32

blood tests.

3. Both parties must have their birth certificate or driver's license proving their age, even when accompanied by parents.

4. In case either party is under age, the parents must be present to give consent.

5. No girl under the age of 15 nor boy under the age of 16 can be married in the state of Texas. There is a \$10,000 fine if a county clerk issues a license to a couple under these ages.

6. If either or both parties are under the legal marriage age of 18 and 21, there is a three day waiting period after the license is issued.

These are rules which Mr. Dennis says are not known to the general public.
