SURVEY OF ROPES SCHOOLS TO BE MADE AT EARLY DATE

With the harvest hands trekking back home, the enrollment — attendance — of the Ropes schools is leveling off, with the number now 593, which includes the Negro school.

On Wednesday night of last week Pat Patterson, O. V. Fuller and Terry Redford attended a Small School meeting at Costello. The object of the meeting is the improvement of the small schools of Texas.

Supt. Fuller told us, "We are making plans for a survey of our school because we want the help of the community to determine the needs and desires of the school district — in other words, what they want and expect of their schools.

"In the near future we will send out survey forms to parents on which they will have an opportunity to express their opinion on all phases of the school program. We will appreciate it if parents will take a few minutes and attempt to express themselves in a frank and honest manner.

"We want to know what the people want so we can do a better job of meeting their needs and desires. At the same time, the entire school staff will be making a self-evaluation of our instructional progress in school. We will try to evaluate our strong areas as well as our weak areas in our instruction program and in that way will attempt to set up a program to improve on whatever weaknesses are noted. We will try to have available a summary report of total evaluations for all who are interested.

"Our last self-Evaluation was made in 1954 and as a result we found that all areas of our instructional program was strengthened, especially in our science and physical education areas."

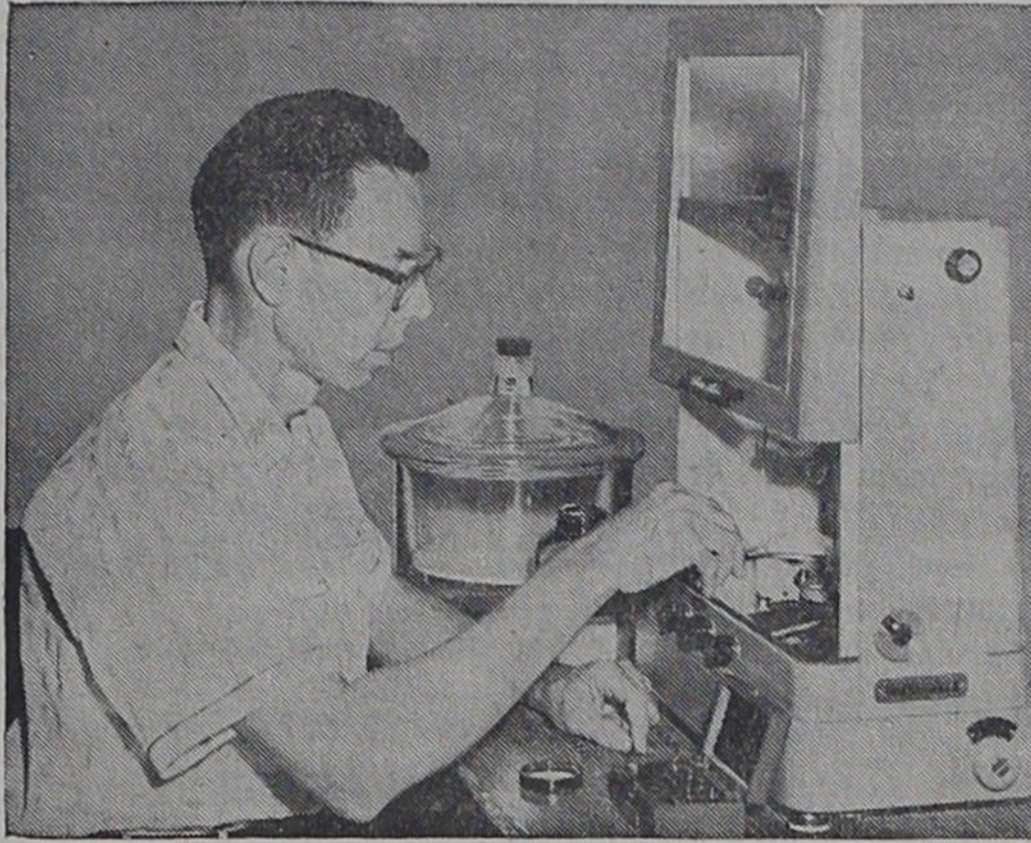
Loses Living Room Suite

Area Soil Chemist James H. Valentine, A&M College, Agricultural Extension Service, has completed preparations for the formal opening of a new Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock. Above, he is making a final check of the delicate chain balance which is used to measure the minute quantities of chemicals required in running a soil analysis.

A native of Wills Point in Van Zandt county, Valentine is a former Future Farmer of America. He received both his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M College with a major in Agronomy and minor in Plant Physiology. The overseas veteran of World War II served for 5 years as Soil Scientist with the Soil Conservation Service and for the past 9 years has been director of the Soil Testing Laboratory at Stephen F. Austin College at Nacogdoches.

Valentine says the new laboratory, which he heads, will devote full time to fertility problems of farmers in the Panhandle and High Plains areas of Texas. County Agent Bill Taylor urged local farmers, home gardeners and others with fertility problems, to take advantage of the laboratory's facilities. The cost per sample is only \$2. Vocational Agriculture Teachers and Soil Conservation Service technicians, as well as the county agent, will be glad to assist in obtaining samples.

TELEPHONE COMPANY IS GRANTED RAISE IN RATES

The City Council was told in regular session last Friday night that starting Jan. 1st, 1961, the General Telephone Co. would locate a man in Ropes. It will be his duty to look after the offices in Ropes, Wolfforth, Meadow. Paul Farrar, district manager, met with the Council to ask for a raise in the company was losing money in Ropes. To meet their legal demand, the rates would

have to be raised to \$15 for business telephones. The Council turned down this rate and offered the company the same rate as charged in Meadow: \$11 for business phones on private line, \$9 for business phones 2 on a line, residence phone private \$5.75, 2 on line \$4.75. This rate has been submitted to the phone company but, as yet, they have not accepted it. The balance of the business meeting was routine.
