## FROM ONE TO TWO INCHES OF RAIN FALLS

While a little more than most farmers say they needed, the rain of Monday night was of untold benefit to most of the Ropes community, coming at a time when it was needed. However, there were farms southeast of Ropes washed out with four or five inches of rain.

According to information given the Plainsman, Crate Snider lost his entire cotton crop; Dal Jordan suffered a heavy loss, and others in that immediate vicinity also suffered losses.

However, Jess Dozier stated that he received over two inches, but so far as he could see his cotton crop is not damaged, although he might have to plant some feed over.

W. C. Patman, who had just returned from Waxahachie, stated that as far as he could tell no damage was done to his cotton crop, although better than two inches of rain fell in his neighborhood. He lives about five miles east of Ropes.

Mrs. Fletcher, at the Busterville store, stated they received 2.4 inches. "I don't think any damage was done, as a number of folks in the store this morning report no loss of crops," she said.

R. B. Bradshaw, west of Ropes, reported about 1.7 inches, and that while it was more rain than he needed, it did no damage to cotton or feed crops.

S. D. Buchanan, northwest of Ropes, received an inch, and stated that it came just right.

Farther west, in the vicinity of the Winston Jones and Newt Green places, it is reported a quarter of an inch fell.

At the Lockettville Gin, about eleven miles west of Ropes, 1.1 inches of rain fell, while on the Lockettville farms it varied from one-eighth to one and three-tenths. It was very beneficial to growing crops.

At the Bob Thomas place, about three miles east, a two-inch rain fell without damage to crops.

At this time we have been unable to contact any one on the Spade lands, due to lack of telephones.

The cloud first built up in the northwest and drifted to the southwest, then more clouds formed in the south and east. While it cannot be said we had a severe storm, yet the lightning was perpetual, sweeping across the heavens in white-hot streaks which lighted the heavens with celestial fire.

In this immediate vicinity there were no reports of hail, but there was heavy hail reported in Dimmitt and southwest of Happy.

The writer and wife drove in from Lubbock as the cloud was approaching, and we don't think that during the forty odd years we have lived on the Plains that we have seen a more spectacular display of electricity. At times the bolts made a completed horseshoe, while

## 4-H'ERS ACTIVE IN HEALTH AND SOIL CONSERVATION

Conservation is the keynote of two highly important 4-H projects vital to the future welfare of the nation. They are the national 4-H Health, and the Soil and Water Conservation program. Thousands of 4-H boys and girls are now participating in the activities which benefit themselves, their homes and communities.

Last year over a third of all 4-H Club members enrolled in the health program, according to the Cooperative Extension Service, while those taking part in soil and water conservation worked on a total of nearly 400,000 acres.

"Learning by doing" pays worthwhile dividends, too. At the wind-up of the 4-H Club year, members' records will be reviewed by the State Extension office, and recommendations made for individual 1957 awards. Based on outstanding program achievement and all-around 4-H performance, awards are given at the county, state and national levels.

All awards in the health program will again be provided by Eli Lilly and Co., of Indianapolis, Indiana. The soil and water conservation awards will be given for the 14th consecutive year by Firestone Tire & Rubber Co., of Akron, Ohio.

As many as four qualifying members in each county may win gold-filled medals. The top ranking boy or girl in the state will be a delegate to the national 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next fall with all expenses paid. The highest honor — a \$400 college scholarship — goes to the national winners.

Many splendid opportunities for community service are offered through these programs. Local volunteer 4-H leaders lend moral as well as active support in helping club members to develop good personal health habits and to improve health conditions generally. The soil and water conservation program covers a wide variety of undertakings ranging from erosion control to long-range plans that will eventually reclaim hundreds of acres.

According to information given us by Sheriff Weir Clem and Deputy Earl Ford, the two boys had started to the mail box. Both carried twenty-two rifles and were shooting lizards. Pat was in front, and stumbled. As he tried to catch his balance the rifle was thrown up and backward and discharged.

The bullet struck Albert in the breast and went directly through his heart. He was taken to a Littlefield hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

It was learned that the paving in New Home was a cooperative affair, handled by the folks of the county and the county commissioner. The commissioner built the roadbeds, and the folks of the community hauled in the caliche for the base. A contractor shot the hot top for 75c a foot.

Hulon Moreland, commissioner of this precinct, met with the Association and thought it was possible he could build the roadbeds with county machinery, but that the folks of the town would have to pay for the caliche and the hot top. He further stated he might be able to do the paving around the church property.

He explained this promise was made with the reservation that the Commissioners' Court would cooperate with him in the project.

Different contractors are to be contacted and prices for the caliche base and hot top obtained.

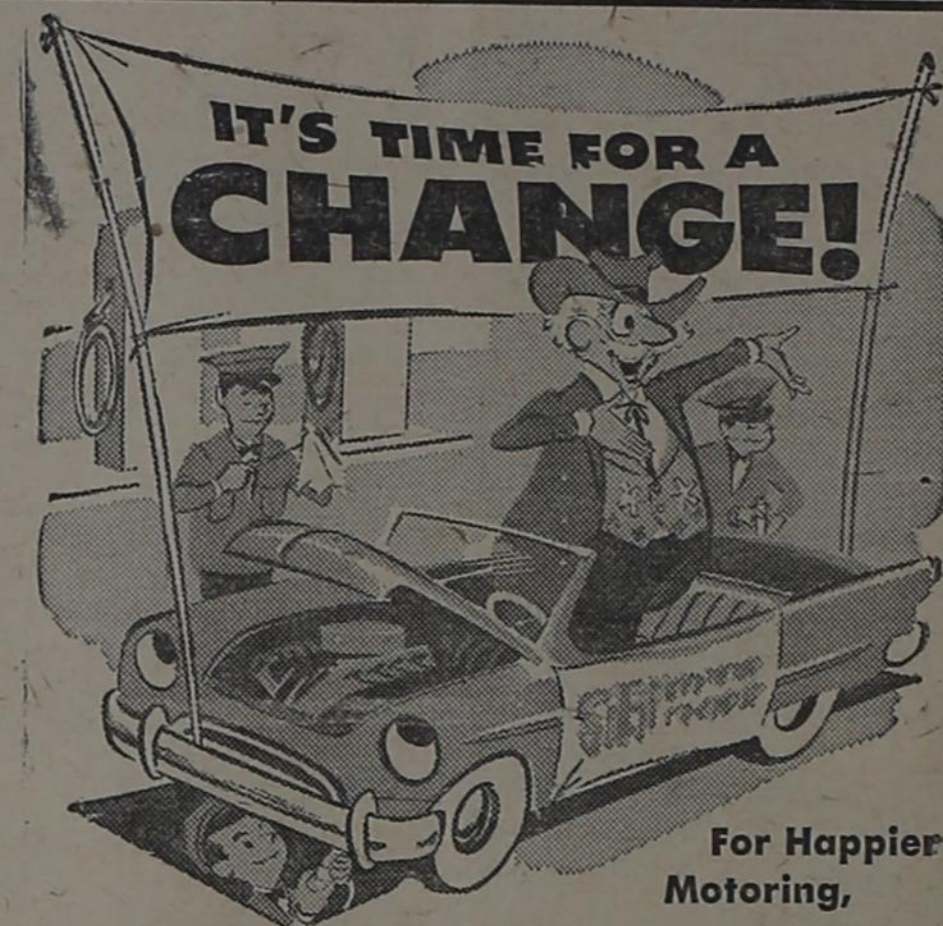
