COUNTY TAXES ARE EQUALIZED TO SUIT ALL COMPANIES

The long discussed problem of equalizing taxes in Hockley County to satisfy demands of the oil companies has been settled, and according to reports the oil companies are satisfied.

In the equalization real property owners will pick up a tab of from two to three million dollars extra taxes, while the oil companies will cease paying taxes on two million.

Louis Owens, county judge, told the Plainsman that the decrease in the oil company taxes was brought about by depreciation on machinery.

The tax valuation of the county is now set at \$42 million, twelve million of this being allotted to property tax payers with thirty million allotted to the oil companies.

At the time we talked to Judge Owens he stated he was unable to give a breakdown on farm land valuation and property in the cities and towns, but that there would be an increase in taxes paid by the land and homeowners.

TEXAS LEGISLATURE WANTS SALES TAX

Lobbyists from the major companies in Texas and other states have evidently convinced the Legislature of the State of Texas that they are more important than the people who elected them to office.

The one mandate which Texas Legislators carried with them to this session of the Legislature was "no sales tax". Yet, since the session opened the cry has been for a general sales tax. Tax the little man—leave natural resources alone—as one legislator, Doc Blanchard of Lubbock, put it, "Oil and gas built Texas, and now you're trying to bankrupt them." Doc is the guy who got caught on traffic violation in Abilene some time back and claimed immunity because he was a member of the Texas Legislature. Doc is listening to the voice of the \$ and not to the voice of people who placed him in office. Waggoner Carr, who thinks he is Lieutenant Governor timber and will likely make the race in 1960 for that office, has also deserted the people, as has about 90 percent of the law makers.

Such men as Blanchard and Carr, along with their college boy associates, are the ones who make the legislature of Texas the laughing stock of the nation. Of course, unless Blanchard runs for some state office, the voters of this county will have no opportunity to vote their disapproval of his action, but since Mr. Carr has the ambition to serve "all" the people as he has served them in this session it may be that folks of Hockley County will have a chance to go to the polls and register their dissatisfaction.

In the meantime, there may be just about enough "big money" influence in Austin to saddle us with a general sales tax.

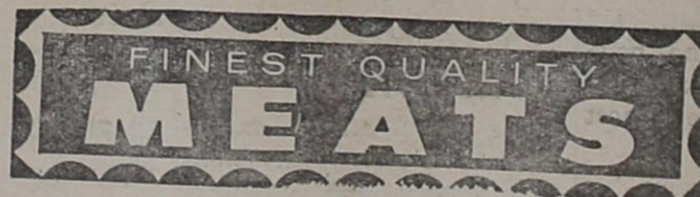
