## Scholastic census shows increase of Ninety-nine in Ropes school District

Setting a new record for the school district the scholastic census just completed showed Ropes school had 745 white and 30 Negro scholastics. The white scholastics is 90 more than last year and Negro nine, giving an increase of 99 over last year.

This increase brings to mind the necessity for new facilities to take care of the increase. It was thought when the new high school building was erected that we had sufficient room for years to come. However, the increase in the number of pupils has been such during the past three or four years that the present capacity is not only taxed but the number in the three buildings is far above what they were originally supposed to take care of.

While we can understand the hesitancy on the part of some of erecting a new building and the ensuing taxes, the education of the children is foremost and paramount. You can say, well, I have no children in school — perhaps you don't, neither do I, but my interest is that children of today and the children of future generation have the very best that can be offered them.

In my day education was not looked on as important as it is today. As a matter of fact, in the past twenty years a completely new world has been created and a new way of life, and in this new order education is not only desirable, but is a must if one is to keep up with conditions which now prevail. In getting this education it is necessary that the public school lay the foundation and if that foundation is to be solid these schools must have the very best, the very latest in equipment to meet the challenge of the world.

Some time in the near future an election will be called in this school district to vote bonds for a new building, and the time to start thinking about it is now.

### SUBSCRIPTION PRICE IS TO BE RAISED SOON

The continued rising cost in the things necessary to produce a newspaper now makes it necessary that the Plainsman increase its subscription price from \$2.04 per year to \$2.94, plus state taxes which will make a total of \$3 per year.

This is the second time in twenty-five years that the subscription rate has been raised. Each time it has been brought about by rising costs in material and production.

This time the raise is partially caused by the increase in postage rate. Heretofore, newspapers have been mailed free in the county in which they were published.

Very few newspapers make a profit from their subscription lists.

This new rate will take place June 1, 1963. All subscriptions taken between now and that time will be sent at the present rate of \$2.04.

We are making this announcement well in advance so those who want to renew at the old rate may have an opportunity to do so.

## FFA Takes Two Firsts In County Stock Show

The members of the Ropes FFA and 4-H who showed in the Hockley County Stock Show last week found the competition well prepared. The local showmen did rather well considering the small number of animals in the show from our community compared to those from the other schools. Blue was a hard color to come by, but the red was plentiful.

Mickey Smith of the Ropes FFA showed his lightweight Spotted Poland China barrow to first place in the class, and then went on to become champion of the Spotted Poland China Breed. The judge made his comments that the barrow was about as fine a specimen as you would expect to find in the Spotted Poland China Breed.

Bobby Rowland showed his crossbred barrow to first place in the ALL OTHERS breed. He was beaten out by a larger one for champion.

The FFA and 4-H boys and girls placed twenty-eight animals in this sale. This included a very high percent of those shown.

The sale was even better than last year's. Most of the animals brought over 40c per pound. Mickey Smith received more than the grand champion, so the buyer of the grand champion raised his price to equal it. The price was 85c per pound.

The FFA and 4-H members thank all those who helped with the show and those who made it the real success by buying the animals for a good price to make 1963 the best sale ever.

**NEWS REPORT FROM  
REP. OLEN R. PETTY**

As far as the next two years of our State Government is concerned, it is growing more and more interesting every day. This week as we come closer to the end of the session, Governor Connally submitted his proposal to the legislature Thursday, March 7, at a joint session with the House and the Senate. The governor explained his budget with the recommendations of expenditures for additional tax revenue.

On Wednesday there was a breakfast held with the legislature and members of the press, radio and television so the Governor could present the estimated resources available for money expenditures for 1963-65. The Governor presented very clear points on where our money comes from to where it goes and just how much money is

available for the state's operation in its legislative process. Governor Connally reported that our State Government is the biggest business in the State of Texas. During the 1963-65, per annum total an estimated resources available for expenditures will exceed three billion dollars and 366 thousand teachers and employees in the public schools and in higher educational institutions. Activities are conducted by 167 State departments, agencies, boards, commissions and institutions.

Governor Connally went further to say that during the past twelve years a total cost of the Texas State Government increased 156 per cent from \$522.6 million in 1950 to \$1,339 million in 1962. Major increases are in the following programs: Public schools 152 per cent; highways and roads 215 per cent;

welfare 87 per cent; higher education 182 per cent; eleemosynary and correctional 182 per cent; retirement systems 338 per cent and other programs 106 per cent.

Governor Connally stated that nearly 80 per cent of the estimated \$3.1 billion dollars in state resources available for expenditures in the 1963-65 biennium will go for three major functions of government: Public schools, highways and roads and public welfare. The level of spending for these major programs is automatically determined by the Constitution or by pre-existing law.

**CROP INSURANCE**

Hockley County farmers who haven't done so already are eligible now to apply for insurance on their 1963 crops of cotton or grain sorghums or both, according to Joe L. Matthews, district director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., an agency of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Matthews said that already more than 150 Hockley County farmers carry nearly \$1 million in FCIC protection on either their cotton or grain sorghums or both, and that in Texas more than 7,000 farmers carry Federal Crop Insurance on one or more crops.

"Cotton coverages are considerably higher, and the program generally is improved over any before," Matthews said. "FCIC representatives are visiting farms in the county now and will continue for several weeks, and information also may be obtained from the Lubbock District Office, 1219 - 13th Street in Lubbock. Farmers are urged to not delay, because time is limited."

Matthews said Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance is a non-profit government program offered to help farmers protect their production costs against disastrous losses throughout the growing period from all such hazards as wind, hail, excessive moisture, insects, heat, freeze and many others. No such insurance is available elsewhere, he pointed out.

"With today's normal crop-profit down to about 20 percent, a farmer's high investment (the other 80 percent) is vitally important, and it takes a farmer these days about five years to recover from a crop failure," the FCIC official explained. "More and more farmers are turning to Federal Crop Insurance to protect this big investment dollar."
