Learn About Your New Telephone System Now

(2nd Article about DDD)
When Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) is inaugurated here June 27, telephone subscribers will not only be able to dial some -- million telephones across the nation, they can dial the information operator in many distant cities as well.

So if you wish to call a friend in Washington, D. C., and do not know the number, you may obtain it by dialing a special number, which will connect you with the Washington information operator. (A list of cities where you can dial the information operator will be included in a special DDD booklet which you will receive prior to June 27).

According to Paul Farrar, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, such a call is made in the same manner as a long distance call, except there are no charges on calls to information operators in distant cities.

It works like this:

You want to call the in-

formation operator in Washington, D. C.

1. Dial the access code, 112.

2. Dial the area code of the place you are calling, which in this case is 202.

3. Then dial 555-1212, the special information number. At this point you will hear a "zip-zip" tone, indicating that an operator has come in on the line. After you give her the number from which you are calling, the distant information operator's number will begin ringing within five to ten seconds.

Farrar explained that while a ticket will be made on the call (since there is no way of initially distinguishing whether the call is an information call or a regular call) the telephone subscriber will not be billed for it.

When it is not possible to dial the information operator in a distant city, dial the long distance operator ("O") and ask for information in the place you wish to call. For example "Dallas, Texas, information please."

Saturday's Cloud Brings Heavy Dust and Tornado

While folks of the Ropes community watched with some misgivings the cloud which formed in the southwest Saturday afternoon, especially when the heavy sand storm formed in front of it, it was thought it was over when the sand came and the dust settled.

Behind the dust was a small tornado which passed

between the homes of James L. Means and Kenneth Means with a driveway, garage and yard between, located about two miles west of Ropes. Mrs. Means Sr. gave this account: "I was ironing when I noticed it was getting dark and realized something was happening. I ran out on the back porch just as the twister struck. The force of the

wind blew me to the ground. I couldn't stand up, so I crawled toward the garage. Just as I reached it the glass in the door showered all over me. And the door, which we had been unable to open for several days because it was swelled from the wet weather, swung open.

"I managed to get around the car by holding to it, and

by that time the tornado had passed. I saw it rip shingles from a corner of Kenneth's house. They whirled in a circle upward and then scattered everywhere.

"Then I saw the tornado. It had lifted some and was moving over the field."

Mr. Means told us, "The tornado missed our house, but I was in the barn and the high wind lifted the roof and supporting timbers holding up the front of the building were bent backward. For a moment it was so dark I could not see my hand before me.

Curtis, their son who was running a tractor, saw the twister and tried to get to the house, but he got as far as the chicken house, and said the wind was at least a hundred miles an hour, it was dark with black dirt and he could not get to the house until it passed.

Evidently that was the only time the tornado dipped.

So far, up to Wednesday morning, there had been no damage to crops. The cotton, which was wiped out, is up again, and unless another hail storm or washing rain comes, we still have prospects for a bumper crop.

CROP INSURANCE WEEK PROCLAIMED

"Crop Insurance Week" June 16-22 has been proclaimed by Texas Gov. John Connally.

The occasion is the 25th anniversary of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., an agency of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. Texas participation has doubled since 1961, and nearly 12,000 Texas farmers now carry more than \$30 million FCIC protection on their production costs of cotton, grain sorghum or wheat against disastrous losses from all natural causes. In Hockley County some 300 farmers carry approximately \$2,000,000.00 in FCIC protection to help return them their investment costs if the crop doesn't.

Editor's Note — While we give publicity to the proclamation of Governor Connally we in no way approve of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. It is just another instance of the government in business against private enterprise supported by tax money paid by the tax payers of the nation. When people wake up to the fact the government is extending its tentacles into all lines of business, and thus killing off free enterprise, which means killing off the American way of life, the better off we will all be.

TEXAS DEPT. OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Highway Patrol investigated 12 rural accidents in Hockley County during April according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for five deaths, 11 injured and property damage of \$7,115.00.

The rural accident summary for Hockley County from January through April of 1963 shows a total of 37 crashes resulting in nine persons killed, 25 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$20,070.00.

If you travel the rural roads this month, you will meet up with lots of slow moving farm machinery. The Patrol Supervisor reminds motorists to be ready to slow down in plenty of time to avoid collision - and pass only if you are sure you can do it successfully and safely. Remember too, where there is a farm house, there is a driveway - even though it may be hidden from view. So be prepared to yield, if you must, to traffic entering and leaving. Yielding right of way costs you nothing. Demanding it can cost you an accident.

The Sergeant also stated, "Owners of boat trailers should check to see that they meet the State's Motor Vehicle Laws. If they do not, you are asking for an accident or both."

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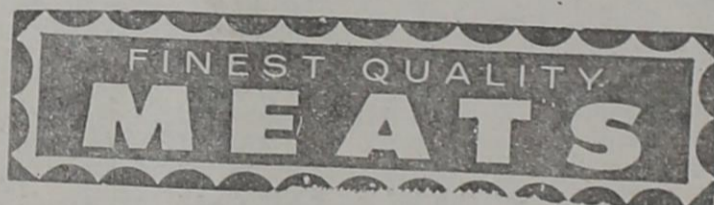

NEWS FROM GENERAL TELEPHONE COMPANY

Telephone users in Texas will get their second reduction in station-to-station late night (after 9 p.m.) long distance rates effective June 15, according to a General Telephone Company spokesman.

The new rates will apply to calls within Texas (intra-state calls).

Earlier this year long distance rates on station-to-station calls made to other states (interstates calls) after 9 p.m. were reduced, with some exceptions, to a maximum of \$1.00.

When the newest after 9pm rates become effective June 15 the maximum charge for a station-to-station call to any point in Texas will be 80c; however, generally speaking, the calls will cost less than the maximum. The new

after 9:00 p.m. intrastate rates will not apply to collect calls or calls charged to a third number.

The company spokesman emphasized that night rates will continue to be in effect between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. and that the additional reductions will apply to station-to-station calls made to other points in Texas between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m.

The actual savings to customers range from 5 to 30c, depending on the distance of the call.

Listed below are some sample rates which will apply to intrastate after 9 p.m. station-to-station calls for the first three minutes:

The first amount will be the old night and Sunday rates; the second amount will be the new night rates in effect 9 p.m. to 4:30 a.m.:

Sherman - Brownsville, \$1.20 - \$.80
Brownfield - Corpus Christi, \$1.15 - \$.80
Lubbock - Dallas, \$.95 - \$.60
San Angelo - Big Lake, \$.55 - \$.50.

Funeral services were held Wednesday in Lindsay, Calif., for G. V. Lindsey, aged 62, former Ropes community resident who died Saturday.

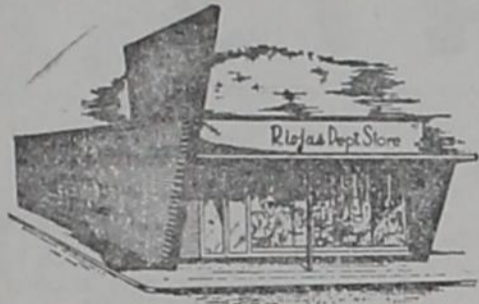
Mr. Lindsey was a brother of R. K. Lindsey of Morton, also a former resident of Ropesville.
