

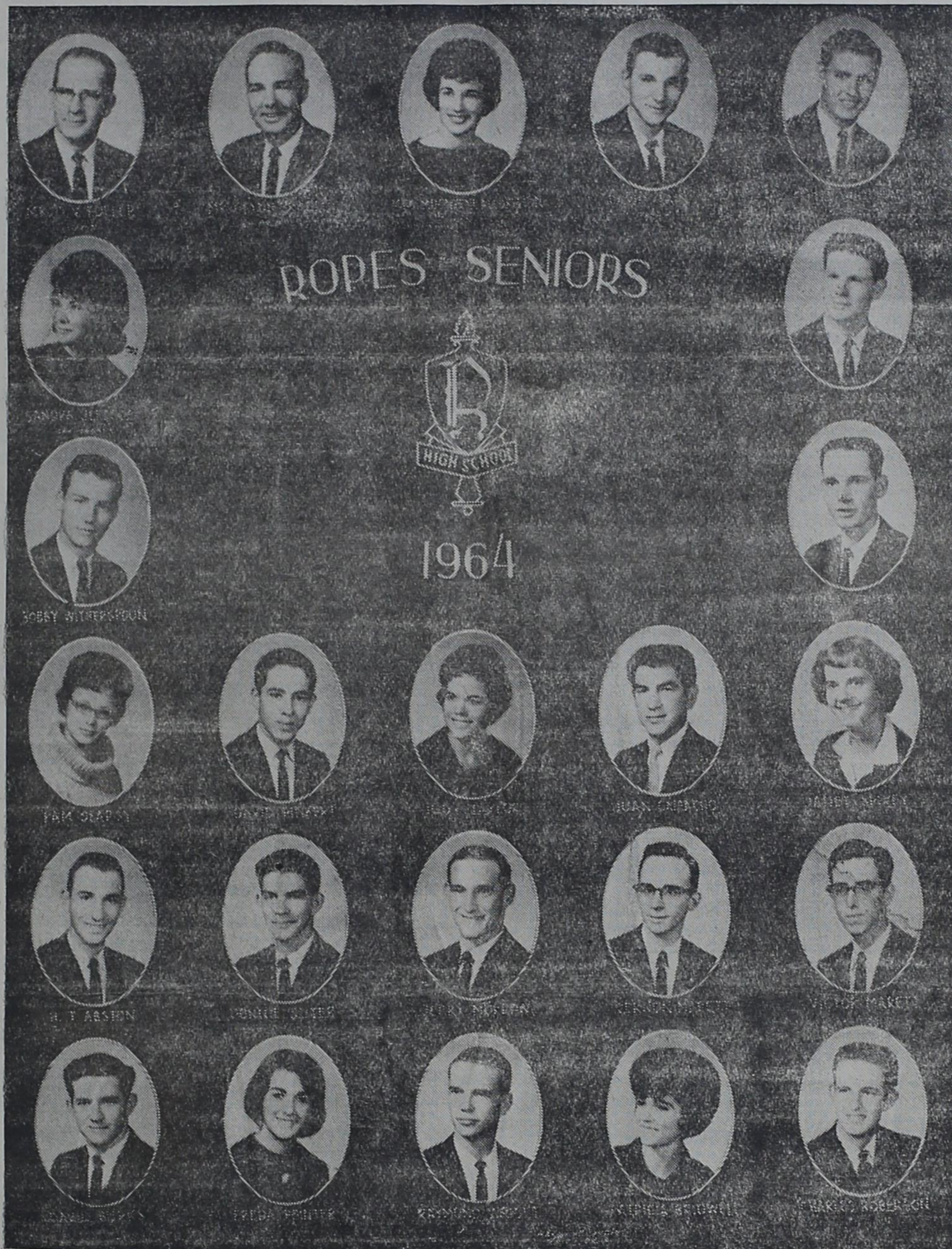

## Ropes Dry But Storms and Hail Over County

At least we now know the sky has not completely dried up—Friday night of last week most of the sections around Ropes registered from one-tenth to a quarter of an inch of rain.

The cloud bringing the moisture came in from the northeast and for a time it appeared we were going to get a gully washer and a trash mover, but the best we did was one heavy squally which seemingly let loose all the water at one time—then it quit.

With it came wind, plenty of wind. At times, it is said the wind reached a velocity of more than seventy miles an hour. This lasted for a period of some three hours, and that was it.

As far as damage in the Ropes area we have heard of none—there was no hail and no tornadoes. However, over at Arnett, northwest of Ropes, a tornado was reported. The funnel, sighted by F. E. Gresham, swept down on the community about 6:00 p.m. It destroyed the burr catcher at the Arnett Coop Gin and also carried away some well houses. What is said to have been another tornado dragged its tail across the Smyer community, tearing roofing from the post office building. At a point about six miles north of Levelland, a barn on a farm worked by H. Lopez, was destroyed.

Whitharral also had freakish winds which swept across a gin yard, turning trailers over and then setting them upright again.

On the irrigated farms, we understand, planting is getting underway, but dry land farms will have to wait for more moisture.
