A PROGRAM TO GIVE YOUTHS EMPLOYMENT

City Marshal Dub Riney today issued an appeal to the people of this community to lend their support to President Kennedy's Youth Employment and Conservation Bill, sponsored by Senator Hubert Humphrey, which was passed by the Senate and is expected to go before the U. S. House of Representatives in the near future.

The Chief said: "Common sense and justice compel establishment of this program which will give many thousands of currently unemployed young persons a chance to find employment, to be paid for their services, and to acquire skills and work experience that will give them a solid start in their working lives.

"Provisions in this legislation provide a practical means of attacking the high school drop-out problem and the juvenile delinquency associated with that problem.

"Young men and women no longer in school constitute already 18 per cent of our total unemployment, although they comprise only 7 per cent of the labor force. These figures reflect a serious national situation. Idle youth on our city streets create a host of problems.

"During the 1960s an estimated 7 1/2 million youths will enter the job market with less than a high school education. Unless something is done to help to equip them to live in a skilled economy they will pile up helplessly against the rising barriers to

unskilled labor.

"In the last decade, juvenile delinquency cases brought before the courts have more than doubled, and arrests of youth increased 86 per cent, until they numbered almost one million arrests a year in 1960—15 per cent of all arrests.

"Favorable House action on the Youth Employment and Conservation Bill will provide work and training for youths from the age of 16 through 21.

"Members of the Youth Conservation Corps will receive \$60.00 a month in wages. They will be given lodging, board, work clothes, tools and equipment, medical and other necessities. The Corpsmen will be under the direct supervision of adult conservationists, foresters, rangers and others. They will work on, and receive training in, various jobs and projects involving general areas as erosion, stream control, reforestation, and construction of outdoor recreation and camp facilities.

"In addition, the Corpsmen will be given technical training and educational skills through classroom periods after work hours.

"The need for this new Youth Program is evident. It was designed to reduce unemployment and train more young workers who would otherwise be idle. They must be given a chance to work before they may take to crime instead."

ROPEVILLE COMMUNITY SKIPPED BY STORM

The storm of Sunday night, which plagued the South Plains, did little or no damage in the Ropes territory, so far as we have been able to learn.

While the country around Littlefield, Lorenzo and Ralls were being pelted by both hail and rain, Ropes received only a small amount of rain and no hail. However, the wind at times did reach hurricane force, one puff caving in a plate glass window at the Ropes Food.

It is apparent that we were only in the fringe area of the storm, which threatened for more than an hour, with the thunder and lightning and a roaring gale, then a few minutes of rain.

Ray Martin said he had just about reached home when the wind hit and that he could not see a foot in front of him for the swirling sand. Tree limbs were blown off in places and things, which were loose, were scattered over the countryside.

A storm later in the night, which did not hit Ropes at all, hit Levelland, destroying airplane hangars and an airplane at the airport. The Highway Patrol reported it was not a tornado but a straight wind, it carrying the hangar across the highway.

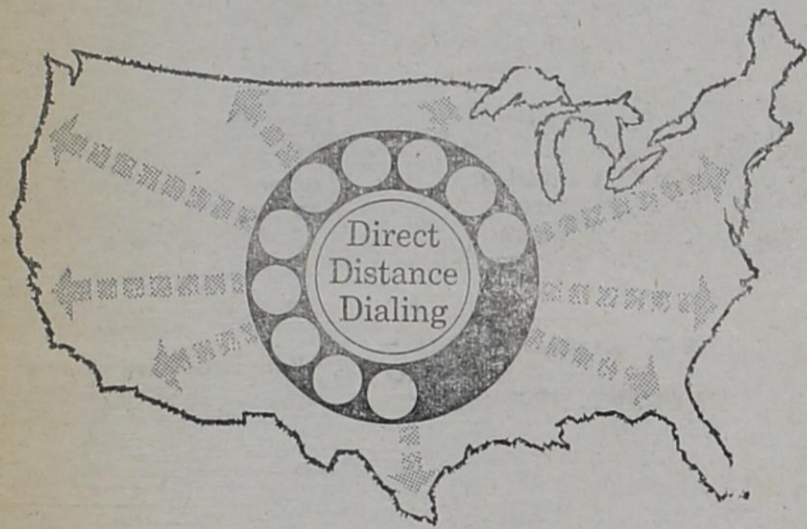
