

This first snow was preceded by sleet and rain in the early hours of the night. The snow was powdery and held very little moisture. However, the sky cleared Monday and a great deal of the snow

Monday night the skies became overcast again and in the early morning hours we were treated to a heavy fail This later snow contained more moisture

than the first. According to the weather man this last snow storm was not to be as heavy as the last, but would continue until in the afternoon. But Mother Nature took a different view and by 9 a.m. Tuesday the sun was bright and melting the snow. However, it will take two or three clear warm days to get rid of it all.
