Naturally, in the dead of winter, even if at the time it seemed as if it were summer, we didn't travel very far—just over to the county seat for a brief visit in the county's metropolis.

Wandering up and down the west side of the square we found a pharmacy had closed since we were last there, and a big dry goods store was in the process of closing out stock in a big Quit Business Sale. We were curious so we went in where, at that hour of the morning there were exactly three people shopping, and clerks were looking longingly toward the door with the hope that more would come in.

A saleslady asked us, "Can I help you, sir?"

We explained our sad condition to her, telling her we were broke, disgusted and so on. She wasn't busy so we talked. She told us the sale was a whale of a success and they had moved an enormous amount of merchandise.

Being curious we inquired, "Who would you rather wait on, a man or a woman?"

"Are you kidding?" she asked. "Why, I'd rather wait on a half dozen men than one woman. When a man comes in the store he knows what he wants; when a woman comes into the store she has not made up her mind."

She grinned and said, "I'm going to qualify that. I tried waiting on a fellow yesterday. He was about six foot six and as broad as a barn door. He wanted a shirt, and I took down some shirts, conservative in color, and he snorted: 'Shirts like that might do for George Price the Undertaker, but not for me. I want something bright and flashy. That's what bright colors are for, to wear.'"

We took ourselves out of there and went into Abell & Rutherford. They have a dry goods store where the late Ray Watson once had the same kind of store which was later changed to a sporting goods store. After retiring from business Mr. Watson devoted his time to hunting and fishing, and his trophies are still in the store. The one which impressed us most was a huge grizzly bear. We wouldn't want to meet that fellow in daylight or dark—he stands looking at you with front legs spread wide as if he would love to hug you.

We struck up a conversation with Raymond. We remember him well when we first went to Levelland, some thirty odd years ago. He was in his early twenties and worked for Mr. Watson. "I remember when I came to Levelland," said Raymond. "I was twenty years old, and the old fellows around me were about fifty or more. I thought they were old men. Now we are taking their place. Mr. Rutherford came along, and his cap of grey hair showed he wasn't getting any younger either. Raymond remarked that he could well remember when the writer had a heavy head of brown hair—it is neither so heavy nor so brown—the years have taken their toll.

We were reminded that a lot of time has flowed by since we came to Hockley County in 1931 and that many changes have taken place. We moved out of the store and joined a stranger helping to hold up the wall of a building. We asked him if he didn't think it was a fine day and he said yes, considering the time of year. We learned he had just retired from farming and was finding it mighty hard to pass the time. "But I have solace of the Lord," he told us. "I have known the blessed Savior for the past twenty-eight years and during all that time He has looked after me."

Knowing that God loves us and that Christ has interceded for us is a bright spot in life—we think the happiest people we have ever known are those who trust in God fully and without reservation.

NEWS REPORT FROM

REP. OLEN R. PETTY

Strong opposition developed Wednesday night against Governor John Connally's proposals to combine the State Park Board and State Game and Fish Commission under a three man board. The proposal was heard in the State Affairs Committee as one of the most major pieces of legislation that Gov. Connally is concerned with, went to a sub-committee.

There were many other hearings this week as the committee processes is still in its busiest times. The Appropriations Committee, of course, is still meeting regularly, as well as the major committees of the House. More and more legislation is therefore being passed out of the Committees on to the floor and floor action is again stepping up over last week.

One of the bills that was passed by the House was the Bill by Rep. McIlhany which would require correct labeling of fertilizers so that when a farmer bought a certain kind of fertilizer, with certain components in it, that it would meet its specifications under a test, to see that the farmer is getting his monies worth.

Other legislation that was passed on the floor of the House this week was primarily local in nature and not too controversial. The issues will become more controversial in the near future as the sub-committees are having time now to report back and possibly next week we will get in to more floor action with controversial issues.

LINDA KAY WHITTEN IS CHOSEN HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

Linda Kay Whitten is Homemaker of Tomorrow for our school in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Having achieved the highest score in a knowledge and attitude test given senior girls Dec. 4, she now is eligible, along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of state Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills, sponsor of the program. The runner-up receives a \$500 scholarship. The school of each state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow, accompanied by her school advisor, also will join with other state winners in an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring. During the tour, the 1963 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and national runners-up will be named. The Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will have her scholarship raised to \$5,000, with second, third and fourth place winners being awarded scholarships of \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

COLLEGE ELECTION IS SATURDAY

An election will be held on Saturday, Feb. 16, throughout the county to determine whether or not South Plains College, in Levelland, shall issue bonds in the amount of \$650,000 for making improvements and bringing up to date the college plant.

It has been figured that the cost to tax payers will be an additional 5 cents on the one hundred valuation, making the college tax 14c on the one hundred dollar valuation instead of the present 9 cents.

There is no doubt but the college needs the improvements if it continues to grow, but the Plainsman does take issue with the promoters on the manner in which the election was "railroaded" thru; it also takes issue because of the fact that no data was furnished newspapers until the very last minute; and also that the order of the election was not printed in the county newspapers at least four to six weeks before the election was to be held.

As it is, there is a mere handful who know what the election is for, or who even know such an election is to be held.

We live in a democracy and the life blood of such a way of life is that the people be informed. Notices of the election were not printed in newspapers but were posted. This may be completely legal, but it is a poor way to let the people know what is going on. If they read the order of the election they would have to stand in line a mile deep—and they were posted in such places as school houses where the only voters were the caretakers and teachers. If the notices had been published in the newspapers, as we were told they would be, the voters could have taken it into the quiet of their homes and read it, studied and come to an intelligent conclusion.

As it is now, the voters are voting blind. Not only that, there won't be one-third of the qualified voters go to the polls because they are not aware that an election is being held which will raise their taxes.

We are hoping this one article, the only one we have time to run, will bring out voters in the Ropes community.

SNOWSTORM CLOSES SCHOOLS TWO DAYS

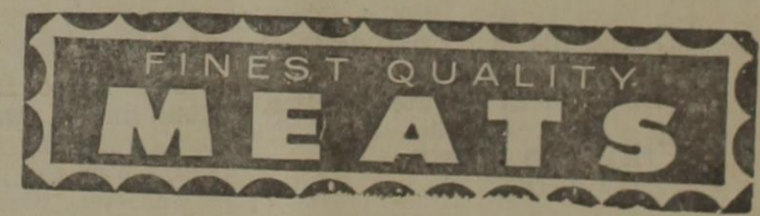
