The truth is liberating. There is no doubt about it! free." Knowing the truth acout any given matter, knowing the facts, always brings the freedom of thinking and acting on the basis of the truth. Restrictions are placed upon freedom wherever the truth is unobtainable or concealed. For example, one aspect of oppression under Communist domination is the strict control of the government over certain areas of truth which are considered unfit for public consumption. We know of cases in which the Soviet press either has failed to print certain facts or has editorialized them to suit the view of the state.

In America, we value the freedom which comes from knowing the truth; we honor freedom of the press to print the facts whatever they are, however distasteful they may be. 
