Community Chest Drive Starts Here Monday November 19

DECISIVE ACTION
OVERDUE IN
CUBAN CRISIS

Our great first President, George Washington, was a man of infinite wisdom, who possessed an amazing insight into domestic and international affairs. He set forth a credo for America which nearly two centuries later is still apt.
He said: "There is a rank due the United States among nations which will be withheld, if not absolutely lost, by the reputation of weakness. If we desire to be secure, it must be known that we are at all times ready for war."

Today our Nation faces a serious crisis. Cuba is an armed fortress against our flank. The ugly process of Communism has unfolded before our eyes. Many members of Congress are awakening to the fact that we must act. My opponent, unfortunately, is not one of them. Today I have sent the following wire to President John F. Kennedy: "I believe it imperative that the United States begin a hard-hitting negotiations with our Allies to stop shipment of war goods to Cuba. I urge that you invoke the Monroe Doctrine and establish a sea blockade around Cuba expressly to keep war materials from being shipped to that island. I also recommend that you give official recognition to a responsible free Cuban Government in exile."
This is a request for action. We have been watching and

waiting. What has grown from a simple agrarian uprising is now a development of great danger to the future of peace in the Western Hemisphere.

Communism has a pattern. Revolution disrupts Government. Pro-Communist locals take over. The Soviet Union moves in to stabilize and consolidate control. Then the nation is used as a springboard for subversion or invasion of other countries. Thus the cancerous blight of Communism has pushed its way into control of a third of our earth today. It's time we stopped it cold in this hemisphere.

Of course there will be risks. But there is a greater risk if we let an armed Communist camp become more heavily armed and the nerve center for Communist conspiracy throughout the Americas. We have seen the early stages of the Communist formula come to pass. Our Administration in Washington made a tragic blunder when it lost nerve and didn't crush Castro's brand of Communism when it was but a serpent's egg in the shell.

I believe the course of action which was outlined in my wire to the President would demonstrate to the world that we intend to honor our obligations and have the determination to keep foreign intervention out of our Hemisphere.

Our NATO allies and other recipients of our foreign aid largesse should be told bluntly that they must stop supplying ships to Russia to arm Cuba or face withdrawal of our aid. They must be reminded that our military alliances are just that. They must live up to their agreements to fight for freedom against the common foe of world Communism.

A naval blockade would be a dramatic and practical dis-

play that we intend to live up to the Monroe Doctrine. This policy has headed off the designs of despots in our Hemisphere since 1823. Recognition of a Government in exile would provide a focus, a rallying point for Cubans who desire freedom in their homeland.

Under the present Administration, the Doctrine has been allowed to deteriorate to a pact that no longer states what we will NOT TOLERATE, but one that merely sets forth what we will NOT LIKE regarding aggression in the Americas.

I want to contrast for you the difference between the Eisenhower and Kennedy Administrations. When the Reds threatened to launch a Cuba type seizure of Lebanon by directing an invasion by Syrian forces in July of 1958, President Eisenhower acted. He well knew the risks. He well knew the consequences if the Reds got what they wanted. He sent the Marines into Lebanon. The results were not spectacular because war was averted. So successful was Ike's move that we have already forgotten it amid the welter of today's troubles. Yet, he set the Red timetable back many years in the Middle East.

There was none of the hand-wringing we have today. The threat was met head on. We need this kind of intestinal fortitude in the White House today. We need a Congress that will pull the purse-strings of nations who want our aid but offer no help in return. I want to go to Congress to help establish a firm United States foreign policy—to support those actions which back up the Monroe Doctrine and freedom throughout North and South America.
