The Alamo—there is not a man, woman or child born on Texas soil that does not revere the name—the Alamo, cradle of Texas independence—an old rock building, grey with age, with a front peculiar unto itself, standing alone in the midst of the hustle and bustle of old San Antonio.

As you stand in front of it and gaze up at its sacred walls, you hear the automobiles whiz by, and from the clouds comes the roar of an airplane. At one time an almost impregnable fortress, in today's modern age a five-inch shell exploding within its walls would scatter it hither and yon.

As you stand here with people moving about you, it is hard to imagine there was a time when the wall around it had a cat walk on which riflemen stood; nor could you imagine that protruding from its wall small cannons spewed grapeshot and solid balls.

But, it is so.

When you enter the Alamo you enter a building which changed history and gave to the world the saying, "Thermopylae had its messenger, but the Alamo had none".

Passing through the portals of this house whose floors were washed and whose walls were sprinkled with the blood of heroes, we stopped just within to remove our hat; we stopped to look about us and gaze on the crowd who wandered about the main auditorium—there is no segregation here, black, white and tan ebbed and flowed through the massive portals.

The Alamo, as compared with other missions, is not a large building. In fact, the Alamo was never a mission—it was a chapel used by the surrounding missions. Its name lies buried in obscurity—Alamo, a popular tree; Alamo, a company of soldiers once billeted there. Two schools of thought, one says the name came from a grove of trees; the other that it came from a company of soldiers.

Now, no one will ever really know.

The Alamo is of later construction than the missions—the foundation of the Alamo was laid in 1754.

To one side was a room, padlocked, but within were displayed the flags under which Texas had been ruled—another room was visible but it, too, was locked. Only the main auditorium was available to the curious.

As we passed out into a garden of flowers and shrubs we saw, laying beside the path, a brass cannon. Again we thought of the part the Alamo had played in the history of Texas.

Momentarily the flowers and shrubs passed from view and we stood on the bare ground which was surrounded by a stone wall. Men, with rifles, stood on the catwalk, gunners stood at the cannons, while Col. Travis read the ultimatum given by Santa Anna—surrender or death!

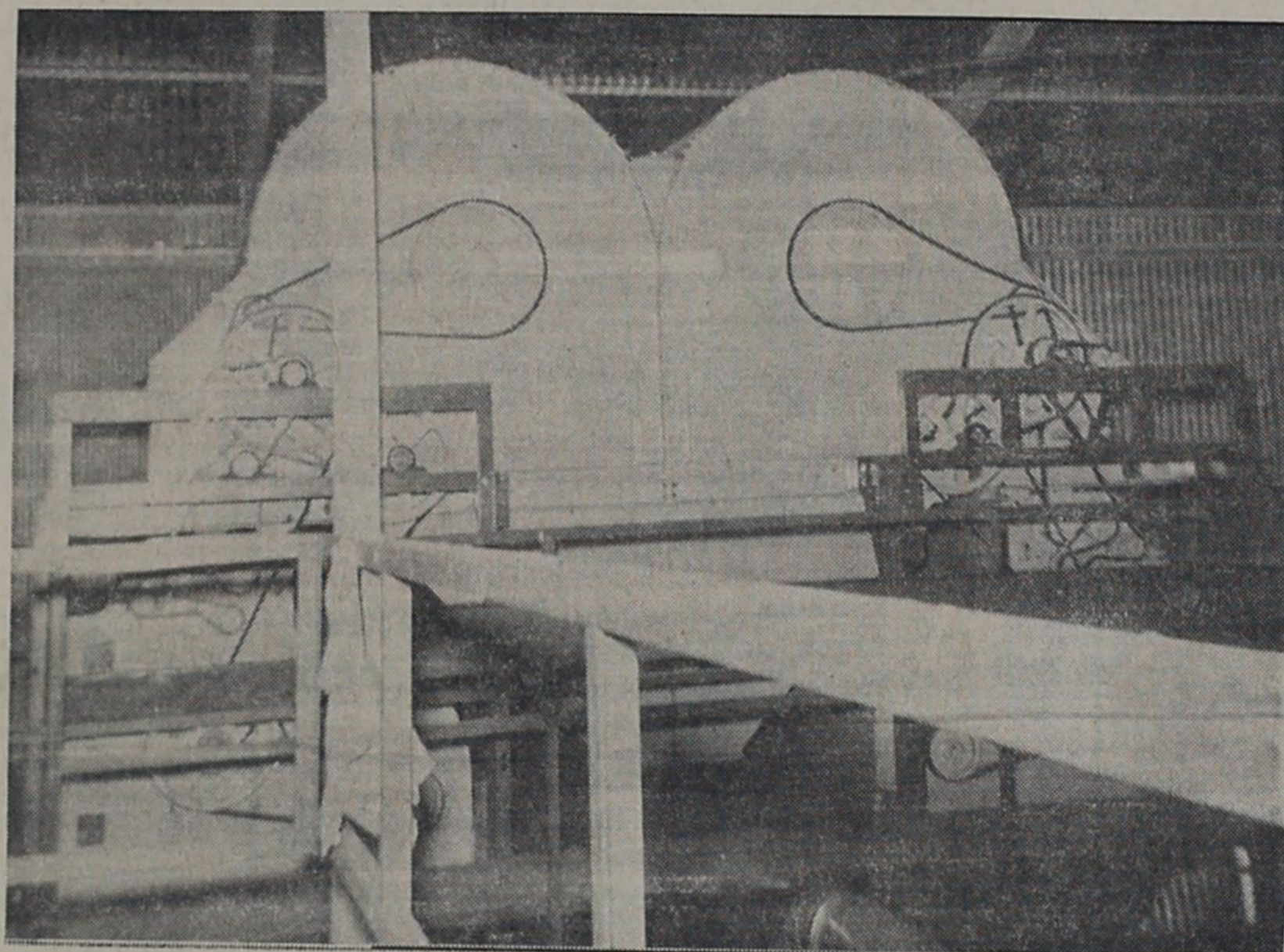

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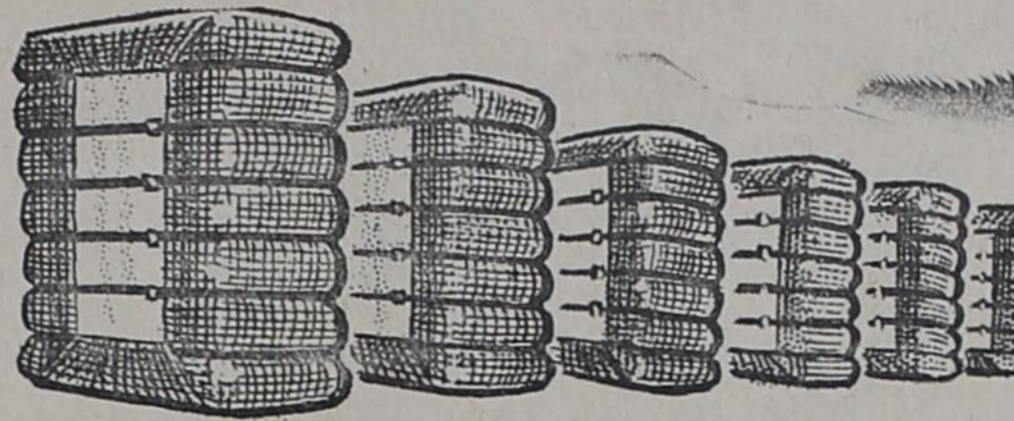
