The thing there that interested us most was the stone statue denoting victory which stands by the door as you enter.

So, we passed from this building, which had changed the history of Texas, out into the glaring sun, and with us came the spirits of those who had died there - the martyrs of liberty housed in a shrine of democracy.

We might say in closing that the Alamo no longer belongs to the Catholic Church, but is the property of the State of Texas, and is maintaine memory of Texas patriots






