Slaton Motor Company Has Business Increase

The Slaton Motor Company reports the delivery of twelve new cars during the month of September, and an increase in business generally, enough to warrant their addition of five men to their force, it now amounting to thirteen employees.

This is a good sign of the increase of business in Slaton vicinity, and also speaks well of the product and service they have to offer.

CITY PROFITED BY SALARY CUTS

The City Commission has made a saving in salaries and wages of City employees of approximately \$6,000 for the past year. Salaries and wages have been cut from \$16,000 to \$10,000 in the past two years.

Reductions in pumping rates and street lighting rates have saved approximately \$7,000 per year by these reductions and more efficient methods were partially the cause of this.

WEATHER PROPHECY HOLDS

The old time weather prophecy apparently holds good. Old timers early in August, when the first gentle breeze from the north fanned the South Plains country, to be exact August 13, declared that we would have our first frost of the season exactly two months from then.

Fast upon the heels of our first real norther, Monday night, the frost arrived on schedule time, meeting the entire section Wednesday morning; bringing in its wake clear skies, bright sunshine, and a resultant "spring in the step of Slaton citizens."

Dr. E. H. Boaz, recently added to the staff at Mercy Hospital, is enthusiastic in his praise of the equipment found at Mercy Hospital. "The equipment at Mercy Hospital is the best I have found anywhere this side of Denver, Colo.," Dr. Boaz said. "I have been in several states, and in a number of the best hospitals in this state," he continued, "and I do not know of a single one this side of Denver where the equipment equals or is better than that found right here in Slaton."

PANHANDLE LUMBER CO. MAKES RECENT CHANGES

The Panhandle Lumber Co., recently effected a change in the personnel of the local force. Mr. Emmett Waldrup, bookkeeper, has been transferred to a similar position in the general offices at Amarillo. Mr. E. W. Parchman, bookkeeper, at the Melrose, New Mexico, plant has arrived in Slaton to assume the same duties in the local office.

MRS. BOWNS HOME

Mrs. G. W. Bowns has returned home from San Angelo, where she was a patient in the sanitarium. Mrs. Bowns is reported much improved. She was accompanied home by her husband, G. W. Bowns, who motored to San Angelo for that purpose.

It is a very good time for tax payers that are behind with their taxes to take advantage of this saving, and catch their taxes up, before the 1st of January when the entire amount of Penalties and interest will be added.

SIX MEN GO ON EXTRA BOARD

The Santa Fe increased the extra board to six men Monday, which insures extra work, at least, for six men in Slaton. The news of this move spread like wild fire, so keen is the interest for any indication of renewed business activities. This leaves C. C. Young, the oldest man off now, and as a result he will go on the extra board next.

When interviewed on the increased activity of the Santa Fe, Mr. Charley W. Taylor, Chief Clerk, said: "This should not be taken as an indication that it's due to increased business. While our business has shown some increase it is not yet sufficient to demand an increase of the extra board. We had to put on an extra work train to do repair work between here and Sweetwater."

Mr. Taylor further said, "Two or three extra crews would probably have been called by this date if fair weather had prevailed the past two weeks instead of the prolonged wet spell which has resulted in slowing up crop movements."

Tech Matadors Are Pepped Up By Win

LUBBOCK, Oct. 6—Having satisfactorily disposed of the first two Southwest Conference teams on the schedule and with the third one yet five weeks away, the Texas Tech Matadors took things a bit easier this week in preparation for the game here Friday night against the Austin College Kangaroos from Sherman.

In one of the greatest triumphs in Texas football history, Coach Pete Cawthon's Matadors polished off the S. M. U. Mustangs, kings of the Southwest Conference, Saturday night to the tune of 6 to 0. It was the first victory a Tech team had ever won over a Southwest Conference eleven. A crowd of more than five thousand fans sat and stood through an almost constant rain to cheer the Bullfighters on.

With such a start, the Matadors plan to keep the victory ball rolling with a win Friday night over the Kangaroos, contenders for the Texas Conference championship. They are pointing to the game with as much enthusiasm as ever, for the motto is, "Take 'em as they come."

Pete Cawthon once coached at Austin College. Dutchy Smith and Del Morgan, assistant coaches at Tech, were on Cawthon's great teams at the Kangaroo institution. Weldon Chapman, Lubbock High Mentor also attended Austin College. The Kangaroos, then, inspired by the possibilities of beating a former Austin College coach, should put a great battle here Friday night. Once before, in the early days and when Tech boasted its first strong team, the Matadors and Kangaroos fought to a 3-3 deadlock on the Tech field.

Ticket prices have been reduced for this week's game, grandstand seats going for one dollar plus ten cents tax. The game will start at 8 o'clock, Friday night.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT GOOD

Mr. G. J. Catching, general superintendent of the Baptist Sunday School, recently closed a year's work which resulted in a splendid report.

The school shows an enrollment of 462, with an active membership of 416; new members 34, and only 46 inactive, or dormant members. During the year 534 letters have been sent out; 701 phone calls made and cards to members totaling 407 sent. This Sunday School has had 178 class meetings; read 62,319 chapters in the Bible, sent 1087 flowers; made 6008 visits and 4212 sick visits.

As an indication of the work accomplished the annual report from the Beginners Department, under the able leadership of Mrs. E. C. Foster, is given verbatim:

During the year 65 were enrolled, 8 moved away; only 3 inactive now. Last Sunday 30 were promoted to the Primary Dept., and to the second year class 16.

Letters and lessons leaflets sent out, 307; with 152 cards sent to absentees; phone calls about department work, 160.

This department held 14 meetings to plan the work, sent 68 flowers to members; made 428 visits and 93 calls to sick among members; made 517 attendance posters; 98 hand painted "Rally Day Tags"; and read 2812 chapters in the Bible.

This one department shows offerings made, \$357.54, Thanksgiving lunches sent, 6; Christmas baskets to families \$4.25; Box to Buckner Orphanage, \$9.13; Garments 21; May baskets, 49.

Mother Hill, who has operated a private boarding house on 9th street for several years, left Tuesday for Whitewright, where she will remain, perhaps permanently, with her daughter's family, Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Blanks who accompanied her on the trip. Mother Hill's health became precarious about 4 months ago, at that time she was carried to her daughter's home for treatment. Numerous Slaton friends will be glad to know she is now doing nicely, and will also regret to know she will remain indefinitely in Whitewright.

The City Tax collector reports that the City Valuations of all taxable property within the City limits has been reduced approximately one million, two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars, within the last two years. This means a saving of \$18,300.00 to the tax payers of the City.

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WILL THE FARMER ALWAYS REMAIN THE GOAT?

Obviously, it is because of his being unorganized, but, regardless of the reason, the vivid fact remains that the farmer in Texas is the "goat" in more ways than one. Like farmers of all other states, the Texas farmer is continuing to suffer from prices offered for his commodities far below his cost for producing them.

Concerted action on the part of farmers, applied to peculiar problems confronting them as a class, has long been recognized as the only means of solving these problems to his particular advantage.

Akin to the farmer being "the goat" as to prices for that which he produces, is the condition facing him regarding taxes.

How long will he remain docile in the face of these conditions? How long can he continue to "foot most of the bill" for State taxes? When will he awaken to true conditions and lift his voice against them?

If every farmer in Texas, (and every owner of real property) would send to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, and ask that Bulletin No. 458, titled, "Inequalities in Taxation of Farm Lands and City Property Due to Scope and Method of Assessment," after he has read this very enlightening bulletin, he would immediately raise his voice in such certain measure that the state's tax burden would be partially removed from his shoulders.

The introduction to this bulletin is worth studying, and is, therefore, reproduced below:

"An analysis of our assessment system reveals two outstanding weaknesses; namely, the failure to tax intangible personal property, and the failure to assess properties at uniform and comparable values.

"According to the State Controller's report for the past eleven years, 1921-31, the assessed value of intangible property has averaged only slightly more than 2 per cent of the total assessed value of all property. Deposits of state and national banks have averaged \$980,725,000 a year for the period 1921-31, whereas the amount of money on hand or deposit assessed for taxes for the same period has averaged only 2.7 per cent of this amount. A study of the probate records of Dallas, McLennan and Brazos counties for the ten-year period 1922 to 1931 shows that of all property probated in the three counties, real estate constituted 48.6 per cent, chattels 2.4 percent, and intangible property 49 per cent. The tax rolls for these same counties for the year 1931 showed that of the total assessed property valuation, real estate comprised 70.8 per cent, chattels 25.8 per cent, and intangibles 3.3 per cent.

"Authentic reports dealing with the sources of taxes and the sources of net income of individuals reveal the situation in which property yielding only one-fifth to one-fourth of the net income of the entire population of the state is the source of three-fourths of the direct taxes of the state and local governments. Gross inequalities were revealed in the assessment of individual properties. The more significant of these were: failure to assess property at full value, wide difference in assessment levels from county to county, extreme variation in the percentage of assessed value to sales price between individual properties, and tendency to tax small farms and small city properties at a higher rate than large farms and large city properties. For example, in the case of 917 farms, 75 per cent were assessed at 11 to per cent of their bonafide sales price; the average percentage of assessed value to sales price in each of eight counties studied ranged from 15.7 per cent to 46.8 per cent; the percentage of assessment to sales price on 177 farms sold in 1929 in a single county varied from 15 per cent to 118 per cent; and farms selling for an average of \$9,000 to \$10,000 were assessed at 20 per cent and less on their sales price, whereas farms selling for

an average of \$2,000 to \$3,000 were assessed at 50 to 70 per cent of their sales price.

"The gross inequalities in taxation revealed in this study suggest the need for drastic changes, not only in our methods of assessment but in the fundamental principles of our tax system. Among the more important changes possible are: broadening of the base of our tax structure so as to include a personal income tax to be substituted for taxes on intangible property, and reduction of the general property tax by the amount of revenue derived therefrom; selection of county assessors on the basis of competitive examinations under Civil Service rules; provision for central control and supervision of assessment by a state tax commissioner or commission; and requiring that much greater emphasis be placed on the technique of assessing individual properties."

WELL-TO-DO CANDIDATES

George Washington was the wealthiest man in the United States when he was elected President in 1788. A good many other Presidents have been men of considerable means, and a good many of them have been poor men. Theodore Roosevelt probably had the largest personal fortune of any President since Washington, when he entered the White House. President Hoover at the beginning of the war was worth several million dollars, but had spent a great deal of his capital in Belgian relief work and other philanthropies, and lost more of it through unfortunate investments, before he became President, according to the interesting and expensive magazine called "Fortune," which sells for \$1 a copy.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Democratic candidate for President, has an income of about \$17,500 a year apart from his salary as Governor of New York, says Fortune. About \$12,500 of this is from investments made by himself and his wife of money which they inherited. Governor Roosevelt's magnificent home at Hyde Park, New York, is owned by his mother, who is estimated to be worth about half a million dollars.

Both of the candidates for Vice-President are also well-to-do. Both Mr. Curtis and Mr. Garner have been the architects of their own fortunes. We do not see that it makes much difference whether a Presidential candidate is rich or poor. Even Norman Thomas, the Socialist candidate, who presumably represents the poor, married a considerable fortune. Perhaps, on the whole, the country is better served by putting in office men who do not need the jobs, but are able to devote their lives to public service.

SPORTSMANSHIP

The thing that distinguishes a genuine sportsman from a "bum sport" is that those who have the spirit of sportsmanship not only know how to win gracefully, but how to lose uncomplainingly. The difference between a genuine sportsman and the other kind is that your real sportsman never tries to shift the responsibility for his failure upon somebody else.

We have long believed that the sporting attitude toward life is the soundest of all philosophies of living. Try your best to win, but if you lose don't be too quick to blame somebody else for your failure. Nine times out of ten, people get whatever rewards their individual ability, character and industry entitle them to. But it is our observation, also, that about nine times out of ten the man who fails is ready to lay the blame upon the Government, or the capitalists, or the boss, or anybody else but himself.

True sportsmanship does not imply taking defeat lying down. The true sportsman never knows when he is licked. He never accepts defeat as final, but continues to strive to the end of the game. He observes the rules of the game rigidly. If he does not like them, he may try to have

The discussion centered mostly on the amount of money being appropriated to the B. C. D. or Chamber of Commerce, as well as salaried

positions that could be consolidated or eliminated entirely, until such time as business conditions will permit. While no action was taken at this meeting as to the exact course to be taken in reducing expenses, it has been indicated that an extensive campaign will be waged to bring these plans to a completion within the next few months.

Confidence has been expressed by the sponsors of this tax reduction program that it will be carried out successfully, as the tax payers of Slaton are realizing more than ever that when the city is unable to meet the bond obligations it is putting their property at stake. Meeting these bond obligations and reducing taxes can only be accomplished by cutting down government expenses, and lowering taxes so they can be paid.

Shop Craft members are looking forward to their next bi-monthly shop craft meeting to be held this month. Mr. B. E. Clark is to be the chairman of this meeting, as Mr. Clark is a good musician we are sure to have plenty of entertainment. As yet the exact date of this meeting has not been announced.

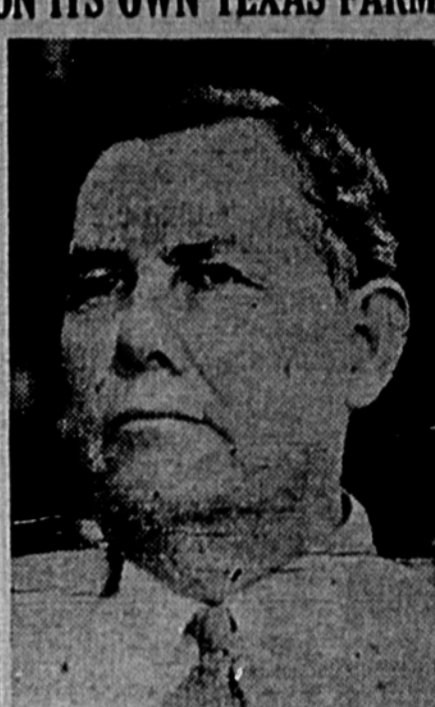
LOCAL LADIES ATTEND LUBBOCK CLUB MEETING
